counts are interesting it is also important to note the species that were recorded in very low numbers. Here are observations that were gleaned from Table 3.

- An all-time high count of Trumpeter Swans was detected, with the majority of these being in Warren County.
- Four ibises were found (3 Whited-faced and a single Glossy).
- All-time highs of Great Egrets were found both throughout the state and within a single county (DuPage).
- Only 197 Black-crowned Night-Herons were found far below their all-time highs.
- Nine Ospreys in DuPage County tied for the all-time high for a county.
- Bald Eagle numbers continue to increase setting a new all-time high for the third consecutive year. Their numbers have gone from 220 in 2009 to 233 in 2010 to 259 in 2011.
- Merlins (5 in Lake County) and Red-shouldered Hawks (31 in Union County) set all-time highs for a county. In addition, there was an all-time high for the state set with 8 Merlins.
- · Black-necked Stilts continued to increase with an

- all-time high for the state and county (39 in Mason County). However, in general it was not a good year for high numbers of shorebirds.
- An all-time high record was set for the number of counties that found Pileated Woodpecker.
- Fayette County was the only location for Bewick's Wren.

Given several new all-time highs were set for different sparrow species, we thought it would be interesting to map out the hot spots in Illinois. (Figures 5-9) Some of the species that are early migrants are, as would be expected, more common in northern Illinois (e.g. White-throated Sparrow). While other migrants like Clay-colored Sparrow are more common in the north they appear to be more widespread in the western part of the state. The widespread White-crowned Sparrow is more common in the eastern part of the state. Other breeding species are more common in their core breeding range (e.g. Vesper Sparrow and Lark Sparrow).
