same or a nearby perch. However, it moved extensively around the large prairie, rarely flying over 100 meters in a single flight. It usually perched on grass stems that could support its weight or on small shrubs, rarely flying into the tops of taller trees surrounding the prairie. It often associated with Eastern Kingbirds, another recent arrival from its nonbreeding grounds in South America. These two species sometimes flock together at fruiting trees in Amazonia (P. O'Donnell, pers. comm.) and it is conceivable that the Fork-tail could have arrived with a group of Eastern Kingbirds.

Thanks to the ease of communications in the technology age, over one hundred birders saw the bird despite the fact that it goes down as a "one day wonder." The bird was initially discovered at 9:30 AM; at 9:34 a message about it appeared on Illinois' birding listserve, IBET. The first twitchers arrived forty-five minutes later and the bird was watched nearly constantly the rest of the day. Despite many people searching the following day, it was not seen again.
