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One of the more interesting data sets is one that shows how common species are through time. Though this can be difficult to interpret due to differential effort through years, one approach is to simply rank how common a species is in a given year and compare that rank to previous years. Red-winged Blackbirds continue to retain the designation of being the most common along with American Robin, which continues to be the second most common species detected.
