Twenty-two Illinois counties had 20 or more participants compared with 23 last year. Cook had 115. DuPage had 100. The total party hours and miles walked and driven approached record levels (Tables 1 and 2). The county coverage for 1996 was 96, one less than for 1995. Those counties not reporting were Marion, Pulaski, Putnam, Randolph, Stark, and Wayne.

Species of Interest (See Table 3)

One species, Whimbrel, was added to the all-time list, and with the return of the Bullock's Oriole to species status (reported in 1994), it brings the Spring Bird Count up to 318 species for the 25 years of count records. At least two Whimbrels were seen, with two reports from Cook (which could have been the same individual), and one from Lake.

New highs were recorded for 51 species plus 6 ties. There were 31 new highs of individuals of a species seen within one county plus 5 ties.

All-time high counts were recorded for Pied-billed Grebe, American White Pelican (triple the previous high), Double-crested Cormorant (almost double the previous high), and Snowy Egret. Great Egrets tied for the high with 1995.

Waterfowl numbers were strong, probably due to the early date and cool weather. Thirteen species were found in all-time record numbers, about half the species in the group. They were Greater White-fronted Goose, Wood Duck, Green-winged Teal, Blue- winged Teal, Northern Shoveler, Gadwall, Redhead, Greater and Lesser scaup, Surf and White-winged scoter, Bufflehead, and Hooded Merganser.

Also counted were record numbers of Osprey, American Kestrel, and Peregrine Falcon, plus ties for Northern Goshawk and Merlin. Northern Goshawk was found for only the fourth year. American Coots were also at a new high by about 4,000.

Among shorebirds, gulls, and terns we had all-time highs for Lesser Yellow-legs, Willet, Long-billed Dowitcher, Laughing, Glaucous and Great Black-backed gulls,
