both of these sparrows were new state highs. The White-throated Sparrow returned to the list after missing last year. The Blue Jay, despite dropping from 15th position last year to 17th position this year, did experience a net gain of 819 birds since last year; however, it's still only 55% as abundant as it was at its peak year (1984). The American Crow, which ranked 22nd this year and has been in the top 20 all but the last two years, was reported to be only 45% as abundant as it was during its peak year (1991), but did experience a 6% statewide gain since last year (at least according to Spring Bird Count data). The Brown-headed Cowbird has always made the top twenty and sits in position 11 this year. The Double-crested Cormorant now continues to be a regular in the top twenty after barely being reported anywhere in the state some 30 years ago. The Barn Swallow, Yellow-rumped Warbler, Tree Swallow and Mallard round-out the top twenty list and continue to be in the top twenty more often than not. Over the count's 34-year history, 43 species have now appeared in the top twenty; the White-crowned Sparrow was the only addition this year. Overall, nine species have been on this list just one time.

Table 7 provides the maximum species details including the number of counties reporting the species, the total number of birds of each species reported, the highest number of each species recorded in a single county and the county in which that number was recorded. In regards to this latter category, the highest species counts in a single county, it's worth noting that many of these numbers were only slightly larger, in some cases only one or two birds more, than the runner-up counties. The 21 species reported from a single county appear in **bold face**. Some of the notable single-county records were the Purple Gallinule (Champaign County), Piping Plover (Bureau County), Laughing (4), Thayer's (4), Iceland, Lesser Black-backed and Great Black-back gulls (Lake County), Scissor-tailed Flycatcher

(Johnson County), Swainson's Warbler (Wabash County), Nelson's Sharp-tailed Sparrow (Cook County) and Red Crossbill (Mason County). Some of the better records of the 9 species reported from only two counties were Greater Prairie-Chicken, Merlin and Marbled Godwit.

Table 7, at the end, also acknowledges those species reported on the Spring Bird Count that are not officially countable as Illinois species. For the purposes of this report those species have been identified as "exotics" and "others". Of course, the Trumpeter Swan certainly is not an "exotic" in the basic sense, but, until it meets the minimum Illinois Ornithological Records Committee requirements to be a countable species, it will continue to appear as
