the park, this is the area to go to pad your site list, scooping up woodpeckers and flycatchers, wrens and thrushes, warblers and sparrows. Carolina Chickadee is a bonus bird for those visiting from the northern half of the state, that can be easily found in the local woodlots.

When to visit... Like birding itself, the best time to go is when you can, and depends on what you want to see. Waterfowl concentrations are typically most impressive from late January to early March. Raptor activity runs high from November through March. Peak singing activity of the grassland and shrub-nesting birds comes from mid-May to mid-June. Songbird migration is best in southern Illinois from late April to mid-May. Though Pyramid isn't a rock star destination for warbler-ing like the more extensive and diverse forests elsewhere in southern Illinois, the birding is likely to be very good.

How to get there... For most of us who live well away from Pyramid SRA, the most direct path is via I-57. Exit onto Illinois Highway 14 at West City-Benton, and head west to DuQuoin. Join U.S. Highway 51 north a few miles to Illinois Highway 152, and drive west to the junction with Illinois Highways 13/127. Follow the Pyatt-Cutler Road (well-marked with signs) to the headquarters of Pyramid SRA. From St. Louis and the metro east area, take I-64 and exit onto Illinois Highway 127, and go south through Nashville and Pinckneyville. From Carbondale, Pyramid is an easy half-hour trip north on Illinois 127

from Murphysboro. If time is on your side, consider a slower-paced back road trip to enjoy the southern Illinois countryside. Chances are, you'll see something you'll never forget.

If you go... Camping is permitted in the original portion of Pyramid, located just off the Pyatt-Culter Road. The rest of the site is limited to day use. Lodging, food and fuel can all be found nearby in Pinckneyville and DuQuoin. For the non-birding companion, virtually every form of outdoor recreation is accommodated at Pyramid. Nearby small towns are great for looking for antiques and visiting one-of-a-kind shops. The DuQuoin State Fair runs from Aug. 26 to Sept. 4, 2006.
