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Remembering Arlo Raim, *continued from page 1*

is to the ornithological community as well as to his friends and the conservation movement.

Arlo lived with his cherished dogs in a trailer partially heated with solar energy near Kickapoo State Park. He practiced a life of simple frugality only buying what he absolutely needed and recycling or making use of what others would call trash. He recently helped construct radio towers, which were brought to Mexico and erected to track the signals of neotropical migrants entering the Yucatan. Arlo, I'm told, climbed the 50- to 75-foot high radio towers to make sure they were set up properly, while younger ornithologists stood on terra firma in amazement.

Arlo also followed crows in early spring from their Champaign winter roosting areas all the way to northern Michigan. He tracked a Sora that took off in the middle of a spring thunderstorm in Champaign and flew northwest until it landed in a marsh near the Quad Cities.

There are people all around us doing great things quietly and sometimes considered to be different and therefore not to be well regarded. We should embrace all the Arlo Raims of the world and not wait until they are gone to realize how important they are.
