

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President's Message

Dear Members:

One of the issues that puzzles us is why many of the local bird club members do not also belong to IOS. Roughly 30 percent of the membership of the CAS, COS and DuPage Birding Club are IOS members. A substantial percentage of Illinois' American Birding Association members are not IOS members, and the same thing goes for IBET. The question is why not?

I have heard it said that our name, Illinois Ornithological Society, is the problem and that we should adopt a more friendly name like the Illinois Birding Club. It is interesting that COS, one of the state's more successful clubs, is going through this same debate after 93 years as the Chicago Ornithological Society.

Some think IOS is just for expert birders. We do have experts as members, but many of us are also less than expert. One of the great things about being a member and attending our Annual Meeting or going on an IOS field trip is the chance to meet and learn from the experts. In my experience these experts are uniformly approachable and more than willing to help a novice birder.

An IOS offering, Lister's Corner, (see our Web site at www.illinoisbirds.org <<http://www.illinoisbirds.org/>>) shows that of those with totals under 300, approximately one-fourth are not members. Quite a number of these listers can thank IOS for their lifer Smith's Longspur and Yellow Rail.

We're expanding our offerings to provide the leadership and support for programs that enhance birding. We want to focus our field trip program on specialty birds like Smith's Longspur and Yellow Rail, and on educational events like the Gull Frolic.

At the request of the organizers, IOS assumed the organizational responsibility this year for Jim Landing and Dave Johnson's highly successful annual Gull Frolic at Winthrop Harbor. As in previous years more than 100 birders had a wonderful time enjoying winter gulls with our experts pointing out the finer points of aging and identification.

Our thanks go to Dennis Bohm and Dave Johnson for a great event.

Later this year we will be offering another program patterned after the Gull Frolic, a Shorebird Weekend featuring a program on shorebird identification followed by field trips with the experts.

Future years' programs may focus on raptors, warblers or other confusing difficult-to-identify families. Empids anyone?

This year's Annual Meeting is in Rockford the weekend of June 3-5. Bob Montgomery and Dan Williams have a wonderful program planned. Check the program and field trips on our Web site, www.illinoisbirds.org, and sign up online. See you there.

Letter from the Editor

A goshawk in my backyard

Every once in a while a great bird appears in your yard. My latest great yard bird is an immature male Northern Goshawk. He's been here for several months and as I write this, he's hopping on the ground and jumping up onto a log pile and then onto a telephone wire, turning his head, watching, listening, waiting for the kill. House Sparrows meanwhile are chattering their two-syllable alarm calls. Earlier he sat in a silver maple and at least four American Goldfinches perched in various branches above him, surrounding him, it seemed, in a circle.

Today, I also heard a male Northern Cardinal singing as snow flurries gently fell on his back, and the Red-winged Blackbirds are returning, sampling sunflowers from my feeder. The birds in my backyard in late February reflect an interesting avian season, the one poised between winter and spring.

This is bird watching! Not listing, but bird watching, and I get to do it right in my own backyard. What happens when you watch birds, as opposed to count them? You learn about their behaviors and you feel as if you are part of their world for just a bit. Plus you learn more about their plumage characteristics. The goshawk has four tail bands, visible when perched, as opposed to three on a Cooper's Hawk. The bands may be slightly to very wavy. My goshawk has wavy bands on the underside and just very slightly wavy bands on the outside. He also has the characteristic fluffy white undertail coverts, much fluffier than what you'd see on a Cooper's Hawk.

The squirrels seem much warier of him than they do of the adult Cooper's Hawk that has also been visiting my yard, allowing for great comparisons.

Dave Johnson showed me my first goshawk several years ago. It was perched far away on private land in Lake County so we didn't get a great look at it. I added it to my life list and now realize it truly wasn't a lifer because I couldn't identify it myself. So, now I can safely say that Northern Goshawk is on my ABA list, Illinois list, Lake County list and backyard list.

Oops, I've turned back into a lister. So it goes in the world of birding. We can be listers, watchers, behavior specialists, citizen scientists and identification gurus. That's what's so great about this hobby. See you in the field.

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
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About Our Cover:

Mottled Duck at Lake Springfield: first state record

Although I occasionally see tardy American Black Ducks in spring in Sangamon County, I always check them closely to make sure they are not hybrids with Mallards. While making my rounds 21 May 2004, I spotted a dozing "black duck type" at the Lake Springfield Beach. Several drake Mallards were present but not near the sleeping duck.

The "black duck" perked up as I approached allowing me to immediately see a black gape and yellow bill. I backed away slowly and went for my scope and digital camera. I approached the duck, which was again asleep, and I could only get so close because it was on the other side of a chain-link fence.

I took several photographs of the duck which finally awoke and lifted its head so that I could note a yellow bill with a greenish tinge around the edges and nostrils and a black nail; a fairly extensive black gape; head and neck delineated from a darker body; an unstreaked, buffy-ochre colored throat; a well-defined supercilium caused by a dark streak from the upper edge of the bill which narrowed and ended well behind the eye; a light brown crown, the color which extended down the nape; brown eye; dark brown body with each feather broadly edged in buff; darker back; mottled (not white) tail; bluish speculum with black edges and a thin white trailing edge, (later in certain light the speculum would appear aqua); orange tarsi; and white underwings when the duck flapped its wings.

As I checked Sibley's field guide, these characteristics added up to a Mottled Duck (*Anas fulvigula*). After Beckie Dyer put my photographs on the computer I was sure it was a Mottled Duck. And when I looked at Websites with both Mottled and American Black Ducks, my bird definitely looked like a Mottled. Bob Montgomery e-mailed me after the photos were posted on the Illinois State Museum's Website. He said they looked good, but that I should consult a monograph by Stutzenbaker (1988) on the Mottled Duck. In the monograph, the frontispiece shows a male in which the bill was not as yellow as the Springfield duck, but was otherwise very similar. The book also eliminated a possible Mallard hybrid based on the fact that the Springfield duck did not have curled upper tail feathers, or white on the leading edge of the speculum or grayish undertail coverts (Stutzenbaker 1988).

The origin is another matter since waterfowl fanciers keep every kind of waterfowl. This duck had no bands or clipped wings. It appeared very tired and kept away from the Mallards at first. Mallards are the only puddle ducks present at this time of year and the males loaf on the beach or near the boat launches. The Mottled Duck, being a male by bill color (females have

black on an orange bill), naturally fell in with these Mallards and it appeared fairly tame, but cautious most of the time, allowing people to approach only so close.

I saw the Mottled Duck 18-21 May and again 29-30 May, and 6, 8, 10, 13, 14, 16, 18, 19, 20, 21, and 22 June. Sometimes, I could not find it. On 19 and 20 June I saw it at the north end of Lake Springfield, but it eventually returned to the Beach House area. Many other observers saw the Mottled Duck during its stay.

An inland population of Mottled Duck extends to central Kansas and northeastern Texas (see AOU, 1998). Stutzenbaker (1988) notes records from band recoveries of adult females from Sac County, Iowa, 11 October 1970 and Wisconsin in 1974 (presumably in fall), as well as specimens from Oklahoma and Kansas. Apparently

there are records from Arkansas and North Dakota as well. The fact that Cinnamon Teal are seen every year in Illinois constitutes practically the same event except the male teal is much more obvious, migrates farther north and might have a larger (?) population.

Kevin Richmond reported two Mottled Ducks in the Illinois River Valley in the summer of 2003. The Springfield Mottled Duck constitutes the first Illinois documented record with photographs, pending the Illinois Ornithological Record Committee's vote. This record might be just the beginning of many more in Illinois.

Postscript: The Mottled Duck spent July, August, September and most of October in the same locations but I lost track of it after 24 October 2004. I relocated the duck several miles to the north at a sewage pond during the Springfield

Christmas Bird Count week, 21 December 2004, and photographed it.

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Tufted Duck in Sangamon County: fourth state record

On 4 February 1973 I had the pleasure of viewing an adult male Tufted Duck, (*Aythya fuligula*) that Charlie Clark had picked out of a large flock of Greater Scaup at Chicago Harbor. This was the first to appear in Illinois; the record was 3 December 1972 to 10 April 1973. The second duck was in the same place, again found by Charlie Clark 23 - 27 December 1973; and Charlie found the third record, an immature male, at Lake Calumet, 17 March

1974, (Bohlen, 1989). A hypothetical record also exists for two males and two females for Jackson Park, 20 February 1980 (Mlodinow, 1984).

On 30 March 1985 at the Buffalo sewage pond, Sangamon County, Illinois I saw an *Aythya* duck that I thought could be a tuftless Tufted Duck female. After much study and observation I arrived at the conclusion it was a Greater Scaup. In fact, Indiana's records for Tufted Duck (both tuftless) turned out to be probable aberrant scaup, and had to be deleted from the state list, (see Brock 1990). Obviously "tuftless" Tufted Ducks are difficult birds to identify. Other records of Tufted

Ducks from the Midwest include 19 records from Ontario, three from Michigan, one from Ohio, one from Kansas, four from Nebraska, and one from Kentucky (from Mid-Continent Rare Bird Records, Bob Domagalski).

After the March 1974 Illinois record, none was recorded in the state until I was checking ducks along Lincoln Gardens at Lake Springfield, Sangamon County 15 March 2004. There was an influx of ducks that day. I spotted a duck with no white on the face, which was about an estimated 50 yards out on the lake. What drew my attention most was an obvious tuft!

I had started to scan the bird with my scope when a Bonaparte's Gull flew at the duck startling it into flight. The duck flew across the lake and landed on the other side. I noted a Greater Scaup-like white wing stripe and whitish belly in flight. I quickly ran back to my truck and drove around to the other side of the lake. After a short search I found the bird asleep (the tuft was obvious) with a small flock of scaup about a quarter of a mile out on the lake. It awoke a couple of times and I had fairly good scope views and took several not very hopeful photos. I saw the dark head, contrasting brownish, somewhat rufous sides, and dark back. Suddenly the bird got up and flew toward the islands and out of sight. I noted the whitish underwings and again the white stripe on the wings when the bird flew.

I searched for another two hours without finding the bird. Several observers were present that evening, but it was windy and visibility was not good. A search of Lake Springfield 16 March failed to produce the duck.

On 17 March I drove east of Springfield and was checking for waterfowl on several ponds. At the Buffalo sewage ponds one mile southwest of Buffalo I observed the female Tufted Duck again. This pond is about 11 miles northeast of Lake Springfield as the duck flies. Lots of waterfowl feed at the ponds during the day and come back to Lake Springfield to roost. I was able to get several photographs, one of which was probably 25 to 30 yards away from me.

I also took additional notes: A brownish-orange eye (I knew already that it was light-colored); whitish undertail coverts; and gray bill with black margin along the front edge. I also noted that the tuft was at times more noticeable than others depending on whether the duck was diving (less obvious).

The duck stayed on this pond from 17-20 March and was seen by many observers. Two other observers, (C. McDonald and P. Weber), noted that there were no bands on the legs and the wings did not appear clipped, which helps to eliminate ducks as escapees.

This March 2004 Lake Springfield Tufted Duck appears to be a typical adult female with no white in the face. As far as I could tell there were no traits that would indicate this bird was a hybrid. This bird, which has been accepted by the Illinois Ornithological Records Committee, represents the fourth state record for Illinois.

On Sunday, 21 March after a cold night and west wind the, Tufted Duck could not be found.

Substantiating Audubon's Washington Eagle


Most Americans know that statesman Benjamin Franklin lobbied for the Wild Turkey to serve as the national ornithological representative, but few know of the species that the great naturalist John James Audubon would have promoted had he had a voice in the matter. His preference can be gleaned from the following excerpt from his early writings, in his *Ornithological Biographies*:

...it is indisputably the noblest bird of its genus that has yet been discovered in the United States, I trust I shall be allowed to honour it with the name of one yet nobler, who was the saviour of his country, and whose name will ever be dear, to it. To those who may be curious to know my reasons, I can only say, that, as the new world gave me birth and liberty, the great man who ensured its independence is next to my heart. He had a nobility of mind, and a generosity of soul, such as are seldom possessed. He was brave, so is the Eagle; like it, too, he was the terror of his foes; and his fame, extending from pole to pole, resembles the majestic soarings of the mightiest of the feathered tribe. If America has reason to be proud of her Washington, so has she to be proud of her great eagle (Aud. 1999 220).

Audubon had studied, resided with, and painted both Bald and Golden Eagles, but this "mightiest of the feathered tribe" and "great eagle" that he lauded was neither of these. Though North America was once home to no fewer than seven species of eagles, the emergence of humans onto the continent and the demise of the great mega-fauna that once dominated the New World landscape whittled the number of native species to two long before Columbus arrived (Domazlicky 1992). That is, unless one considers the historic writings of the early 19th century; it is here that archivists find Audubon's (and others') detailed descriptions of a possible third American eagle species surviving into the modern era: the "great eagle"—the Bird of Washington.

For many decades, this bird was academically referred to by several substantial names: Washington's eagle, Washington's sea-eagle, Washington eagle and the great sea-eagle. Audubon's most frequently used moniker, though, was simply the "Bird of Washington." For simplicity in pluralizing, the bird will hereafter be referred to as the Washington eagle.

This eagle became an instant favorite of Audubon's, eliciting an almost poetic expression of his feelings after sightings of the species:

It was in the month of February... that I obtained the first sight of this noble bird, and never shall I forget the delight which it gave me. Not even HERSCHEL, when he discovered the planet which bears his name, could have experienced more rapturous feelings (Aud. 1999 217).

Later, upon finally acquiring a specimen, Audubon described himself as being filled "with a pride which they alone can feel, who, like me, have devoted themselves from their earliest childhood to such pursuits, and who have derived from them their first pleasures."

Acceptance of the Washington eagle (*Falco washingtonii* Aud. 1831) as the ninth and largest of the worldwide species of sea-eagles persisted throughout Audubon's lifetime and for several years thereafter. Eventually, though, a tide of personal controversies caused many skeptics to question the scientific integrity of his work.

When Audubon illustrated mockingbirds for his *Birds of America*, he depicted them defending a nest against an arboreal rattlesnake attack. His enemies and detractors—of whom there were surprisingly many—used this to discredit him, noting that rattlesnakes cannot climb trees. Future observations, though, justified Audubon's artistic license and showed that rattlesnakes can indeed climb trees, though they rarely do (A.I.R.M.). Likewise, until his death Audubon was accused by botanists of having fabricated the existence of the "yellow water-lily," which he included in his *Birds of America* under the name of *Nymphaea lutea*. It was only decades later, in 1876, that his defiant refusal to retract his description was justified by the "discovery" of the long-lost flower in the Florida Everglades (Blavatsky 1888).

Surrounded by so much contention in his lifetime, it is not surprising that the skeptical scientific community of the late 19th century, bolstered by the initial debunking of the Washington eagle in 1870, relegated this already exceedingly rare bird to the realm of inveracity (Allen 4:524-27).

Today, it is universally believed that the few Washington eagles that Audubon saw and expounded upon were not members of a previously unidentified species of eagle, but were rather a common bird known long to naturalists: the northern bald eagle (*Haliaeetus leucocephalus alascanus*) in its immature state of development. Critics explain that Audubon was unacquainted with the geographic, developmental, and sexual-dimorphic variations in the Bald Eagle's size and the multiple plumages of its juvenile development (Durant et al 1988). While it is true that the immature stages of the Bald Eagle are generally brown, it would be hasty to unquestioningly conjoin the two birds without a thorough discrimination of their traits. And it would be unjust to such a noble bird, if it were to have existed, to brush it aside with so little ado.

To prove the Washington eagles were not immature Bald Eagles, it is necessary to show that the former's distribution, morphology and ethology lay outside the accepted range for the latter, especially those of its juvenile stages.

If indeed the Washington eagles were simply immature northern Bald Eagles, they should have been seen and noted quite frequently in Audubon's winter travels along the Mississippi, Ohio, and Missouri rivers. His river journals are actually replete with sightings of "brown eagles," but Audubon's writings demonstrate he was aware of Alexander Wilson's theory of the "brown" and bald eagles being the same species (Audubon 1929), and even noted for the uninformed reader that the term "brown eagle" is used "meaning the White-headed eagle (*Falco leucocephalus*) in its immature state" (Audubon 1999). The sole time within his 1820-21 journal that he references the then unnamed Washington eagle, the addendum "i.e. S. Eagles" [sea eagles] was added to the label of "brown eagles" to enable a differentiation. Here he noted that the "S. Eagles" he had seen previously—the Washington eagles—were "at least 1/4 longer" than the bald and brown eagles he was encountering on the lower Ohio River (Audubon 1929).

Unlike the abundant bald/brown eagles, Audubon had only five sightings of the Washington eagle in his lifetime. In chronological order, these were on the Mississippi and Ohio rivers near the cities of Grand Tower IL, Evansville IN, Henderson KY, Clarksville IN, and Mound City IL. The five sightings encompassed ten birds (never more than two adults in any one area), yielded a close observation of a mated/nesting pair complete with two nestlings, and resulted in the acquisition of one spectacular specimen.

Geographically, the Washington eagle was described by ornithologist Dr. Thomas Nuttall as a rarely encountered, year-round resident of the northern Great Lakes and a winter visitor to southern Illinois/western Kentucky (Bilby 27).

Ironically, it was near his residence in Henderson, Kentucky that Audubon, who claimed to always carry a gun, finally managed to bring a Washington eagle down as it scavenged at a pig slaughter. Audubon tells in his writings how he, like a schoolboy who stumbled upon a treasure, quickly wrapped the bird up and ran with it to the home of Dr. Adam Rankin. Rankin, who was described as a life-long resident on the Ohio River and an experienced hunter, proclaimed that "he had never before seen or heard of it" (Audubon 1999). Together they undertook a meticulous study of the specimen and recorded the following qualitative description:

Tarsus and toes uniformly scutellate in their whole length. Bill bluish-black, cere yellowish-brown, feet orange-yellow, claws bluish-black. Upper part of the head, hind neck, back, scapulars, rump, tail-coverts, and posterior tibial feathers blackish-brown, glossed with a coppery tint; throat, fore neck, breast, and belly light brownish-yellow, each feather, with a central

blackish-brown streak; wing-coverts light greyish-brown, those next the body becoming darker; primary quills dark brown, deeper on their inner webs; secondaries lighter, and on their outer webs of nearly the same light tint as their coverts; tail uniform dark brown (Audubon 1831).

This delineation and Audubon's painting that corresponds to it expose two significant anatomical anomalies that differentiate the specimen from the Bald Eagle.

1) The Washington eagle's cere is conformed in a manner unlike any known variation in Bald Eagles.

2) The uniform scaling found on the Washington eagle's tarsus is unknown at any stage of Bald Eagle development (Mengel 1953).

Audubon described the Washington eagle as being not only staggeringly large, possessing a wingspan of 310 cm (10 feet, 2 inches), eclipsing any raptor native to North America and matching that of any known worldwide, but also being brown in its feather coating—uniformly and without blemish. There are two known brown eagles in America today: the Golden Eagle and the immature Bald Eagle. Therefore, some have hypothesized that some of the birds Audubon labeled as Washington eagles were actually oversized Golden Eagles. That speculation, though, is undermined by the fact that Audubon was quite familiar with the distinguishing extended leg feathers of the Golden Eagle, which clearly reveal it to be of a genus separate from that of the sea eagle (Audubon 1831). The Washington eagle's preference for, and skill at, fishing clearly places it amongst the genus of sea-eagles rather than with the Golden Eagles (Audubon. 1999).

It is worthy of note that in Audubon's descriptions of his five sightings, there is no mention of any deviation in the birds' appearance or size. Because he penned his *Ornithological Biographies* entry on the bird long after his last sighting, it must be assumed that the eight adult birds he observed

were similar to the type-specimen he scrutinized.

Through their first four to five years of life, Bald Eagles undergo six distinct plumages. Two of these are poorly differentiated, are collectively known as the juvenile stages, and occur within the first year of life. Immediately following are four distinguishing molts in as many consecutive years, culminating in the well-known adult plumage (Gerrard, Harmata 1984).

The only Bald Eagle developmental stages that demonstrate any degree of superficial affinity to the Washington eagle are the juvenile plumages of the first twelve months of life (Figure 1). As American ornithology entered the 20th century, this similarity, coupled with an insistence that this stage of development can possess a wingspan "often a foot or more" greater in length than either of its parents, emboldened T. Gilbert Pearson to establish "misidentification" as the official Audubon Society stance on the Washington eagle (Pearson 1926).

Statistics have not supported Pearson's claims, though, as the differences between immature and mature Bald Eagles' wing spans average only two to five centimeters, depending on the bird's sex (Harmata, Imler). These differences in wing feather length are insufficient to account for the size differences measured and observed between the bald and Washington eagles.

Developmentally, two arguments must be presented against the idea that the Washington eagles were oversized first-year Bald Eagles:

1) All immature Bald Eagles have some degree of white mottling, definitively at the wing pits (Domazlicky 1992, Stalmaster 1987). Additionally, first-year bald eagles have contour feathers with white bases (McCollough 1989).

2) Audubon observed a breeding pair with nestlings. While it is known that fourth- and rarely third-year Bald Eagles—the appearances of which are quite different from the Washington eagle—are occasionally capable of reproduction, there is no recorded instance where both parents have been sub-adults (Stalmaster 1987).

The sheer size of Audubon's randomly collected specimen places the Washington eagle outside the realm of what is known of Bald Eagle's sizes at any stage of development. The most astonishing element of his specimen is that it was a male. With Bergmann's law of reverse sexual size dimorphism applying to eagles, the measurements of Audubon's specimen are quite likely smaller than the species' potential. Consider the following comparative measures (all Washington eagle measurements are from Audubon's *Ornithological Biographies*):

1) The Washington eagle, from beak to tail, measured 110 cm. The known range for northern Bald Eagles is 71-96 cm (Palmer et al 1988.).

2) The Washington eagle's wingspan of 310 cm surpasses the largest known bald eagle by 66 cm. The wingspan range for northern Bald Eagles is 200-244 cm (Stalmaster 1987).

3) The average length of an adult male northern Bald Eagle's hallux is 3.98 cm while the Washington eagle's measures 6.35 cm (Bartolotti 1984).

4) In northern Bald Eagles, the range of bill lengths is 4.17-6.06 cm, with a male juvenile mean of 5.04 in length and 3.22 in depth (Bartolotti 1984). The Washington eagle possessed a bill 8.26 cm in length and 4.45 cm in depth.

5) Immature northern Bald Eagles have wing chords ranging from 54.1-69.2 cm, with northern males averaging 60.1 cm (Bartolotti 1984, Freidmann, 1950). The Washington eagle's wing chord was 79 cm.

They nested not in trees, but rather in ground nests built on rocky cliffs adjacent to water (Bilby 1887). Surveys of 899 Bald Eagle nest structures east of the Mississippi River revealed an absence of ground nests (Stalmaster 184-5). Ground nests are used by Bald Eagles only in treeless areas, which doesn't describe the lush lower Ohio River valley in which Audubon observed the Washington eagle's nest (Buehler 15).

It was also noted by Audubon that the Washington eagle's flight was:

...very different from that of the White-headed Eagle. The former encircles a greater space, whilst sailing keeps nearer to the land and the surface of the water, and when about to dive for fish falls in a spiral manner, as if with the intention of checking any retreating movement which its prey might attempt, darting upon it only when a few yards distant. (Audubon 1999)

The Washington eagle also did not share the Bald Eagle's bullying and piratical behavior toward the Osprey (Bilby 1887).

Robert Mengel argued against the Washington eagle's existence because there is no fossil record of any other species of *Haliaeetus* in the United

States. His error, though, was referencing only a search of Pleistocene tar pits in Rancho La Brea, a location some 3000 km from the Washington eagle's habitat.

Many authors even imply that Audubon was the sole observer of this species; the truth is, though, that he was not. Dr. [Lemuel] Hayward of Boston, Massachusetts acquired a live Washington eagle specimen and was said to have kept it for "a considerable time"; while in captivity, he described the bird as being "docile" (Bilby 1887). The bird was eventually poisoned and delivered to the Linnaeum Museum in London. Another preserved male, as long as and heavier than Audubon's 6.6 kg specimen, which Audubon later unsuccessfully attempted to buy, was displayed at Philadelphia's Brano Museum (Audubon 1999). The eventual purchaser of this bird was none other than Audubon's close friend, and the author of *Fauna Americana*, Dr. Richard Harlan, of the same city. The whereabouts of this specimen today are unknown, but it is very likely that upon his death the bird was given to the Peale's Museum of Philadelphia. This institution claimed to have such a specimen, but its collection of curiosities was lost when the museum was consumed by fire. Literature concurrent with Audubon's implies that multiple birds were known to have been kept and raised in captivity (Bilby 1887).

Finally, many current biographers have cited the Washington eagle as but one more proof of Audubon's self-aggrandizing and over-zealous temperament. An early writer reinforced this, but also defended him by reminding readers that he did have a weakness for being careless in statements of matters of fact and that this did lead to a pervasive attitude of distrust in even his correct writings (Burroughs 1902). What Audubon did prove in his lifetime though was that he was definitely not rafinesque.

While few men's names become adjectives, few men deserved it as

much as the brilliant but misunderstood 1818 houseguest of Audubon's, Constantine Samuel Rafinesque. In short, he was a naturalist who had come to America to fulfill his obsession: discovering new species. He was convinced that in America they were everywhere. This included one comical scene in which he destroyed Audubon's violin while using it as a weapon to procure a bat—he was convinced it was an unnamed species—that had flown in through an open window of the guest room. To poke fun at his

mania, Audubon spitefully fabricated and sketched ten non-existent, fanciful fishes that Rafinesque, to Audubon's embarrassment, later published in Europe and attributed to him (Eisenbeis 1965). After having suffered such a scientific discomposure in the 1820s, it is doubtful that he would have risked a similar fate a second time by describing a new species within his specialty without being confident of its authenticity.

This conviction was reinforced in 1820 as he procured, studied, and painted a Bald Eagle specimen for four straight days, often forsaking sleep. Upon completion of this marathon and the completion of his painting of a juvenile Bald Eagle, he recorded in his journal that he was—as perhaps we today should also be—convinced that the Washington eagle was indeed a unique and separate species (Audubon 1929). This grand eagle appears to have been lost to time, but deserves, at the very least, the status of a hypothetical species: *Haliaeetus washingtonii*.

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Birding Rockford in early June: a primer for the IOS annual meeting

Editor's Note: *The annual IOS meeting for 2005 will take place in Rockford, Illinois June 3-5, the perfect time to bird Boone, Winnebago and Ogle Counties, all of which have preserved many fine parcels of high-quality habitat containing many uncommon Illinois bird species. Field trip leaders will visit some of the best spots in these counties during the meeting. Here's a primer on birding this terrific northern Illinois hotspot. Winnebago County, of which Rockford is the county seat, is dominated by its four rivers. The four feature different habitats, and, therefore, a nice variety of breeding birds. (See Figure 1)

The Rock River, largest of the four, has its headwaters at Horicon Marsh in Wisconsin and empties into the Mississippi River at the Quad Cities. It passes through Winnebago County, beginning at South Beloit, Wisconsin, and serves as the conduit into which the other three rivers drain.

The Sugar River begins in southwestern Wisconsin, entering Winnebago County in the northwest, and joins with the Pecatonica River (which also comes from southwest Wisconsin, but enters the county more directly from the west at the town of Pecatonica) at the town of Shirland. From there, the Pecatonica flows east-northeast, joining the Rock River at the town of Rockton. The junction of these two rivers contains some recently preserved properties that become more excellent for birding each year.

The Kishwaukee enters from the northeast, passing through the city of Belvidere and then southeastern Winnebago County, before joining the Rock River just south of the city of Rockford.


Winnebago County

Rock Cut State Park, with its expansive 3,100 acres, contains two

man-made lakes, lots of upland hardwood forest, and many grassland and shrub areas. Target birds at this Illinois Department of Natural Resources property include breeding Henslow's Sparrows, which nest in the cool season grasses (that formerly were cut for hay), Sedge Wrens (in the same fields), Wood Thrush, Veery, both cuckoos, Dickcissel, Orchard Oriole, and Blue-winged, Cerulean, Kentucky, Hooded (rare) and Chestnut-sided Warblers. Also breeding here are Yellow-breasted Chat, Bell's Vireo (difficult to find some years), and Willow, Least (occasional), and Acadian Fly-catchers. Broad-winged and Cooper's Hawks nest in the park, and occasionally, Black-throated Green Warblers are singing in June. A Black-and-white Warbler was here on a recent July 1st, but no nest was found. Just north of Rock Cut is the Kieselburg Forest Preserve, part of the Winnebago County Forest Preserve District, which now has more than 12,000 acres in its ownership and continues to pursue a plan of acquiring all of the high-quality habitat along these river corridors, as well as preserving wetland and other diminishing habitats in the county. Kieselburg holds one of the few sedge fens in the state. Sedge Wrens and Orchard Orioles nest here, and Bell's Vireos and Yellow-breasted Chats are frequently seen and heard in summer.

The Natural Land Institute, a private not-for-profit agency created by George Fell, one of the founders of The Nature Conservancy, has recently acquired over 700 acres of river bottom and wetland at the confluence of the Rock and Pecatonica Rivers, near Rockton, and is restoring the grassland and wetland habitat, including re-routing Raccoon Creek to its original course based on aerial photographs that predated its straightening. This area, the Carl and Myrna Nygren Wetland Preserve, provides habitat for many species of birds, including Sandhill Crane, Dickcissel, and Grasshopper and Savannah Sparrows.

The Sugar River Valley is biologically interesting, and the preserves along the upper section of this river are extensive. The Winne-

bago County Forest Preserve District has acquired extensive holdings of excellent habitat, running from the Wisconsin state line to Shirland.

Several major private land holders have not disrupted the forest and marshes on their property, and one has embarked on a program of wetland set-aside that will restore extensive habitat for non-game species, although it will be hunted in the fall. The Sugar River Alder Tract is one of the highlights of the area, featuring nesting Lark Sparrows on the sand prairie, along with Grasshopper, Vesper, and Savannah Sparrows, plus Sandhill Cranes back in the wetlands near the river. After sundown, it features the displays of American Woodcock, plus the songs of Whip-poor-will and Barred Owl. The pines here once attracted one of the two records of Chuck-will's-widow in the county. (The IOS Annual Meeting in June will feature a Friday night trip here.)

Just downstream, Sugar River Forest Preserve is best known for its nesting Yellow-throated Warblers, which have bred here for nearly 20 years. Cerulean Warbler, a species of special concern, can easily be found in the forest at the yoke of the loop road. Barred Owls are often heard, and sometimes seen, during the day, and fly-by or calling Pileated Woodpeckers are a real possibility. Other species of interest include Acadian Flycatcher, Kentucky and Mourning Warblers, Prothonotary Warbler, Ovenbird, and an occasional Summer Tanager. Red-shouldered Hawks nest on private property across the river.

Pecatonica Forest Preserve, on the Pecatonica River, is the most reliable location for Prothonotary Warbler in the bottomland oxbow swamps. Plus you'll find other river bottom species, including Yellow-throated and Red-eyed Vireos, Pileated Woodpecker and Barred Owl. A trip here should yield Sandhill Crane, plus a view of Bald Eagle (a pair nests on private property near here, and are sometimes

visible from the road). Pecatonica Wetlands Forest Preserve holds 1400 acres which have been recently acquired over the past six years. Wetlands are being restored with help from Ducks Unlimited, providing excellent new birding opportunities. The grassland and wetland restorations now feature both Sedge and Marsh Wrens, Sandhill Cranes, occasional Red-shouldered Hawks, Prothonotary Warbler, Louisiana Waterthrush and, at this season, both Willow and Alder Flycatchers. A pair of Brown Creepers nested here in 1999. Western Meadowlarks can often be found in the western portion of the county in the Pecatonica area.

The preserves along the Kishwaukee River including Black-hawk Springs Forest Preserve are excellent for Sandhill Crane, as well as several locations for flycatchers, and warblers, including Yellow-throated, Chestnut-sided, Black-throated Green, and, rarely, Northern Parula. Trips to the Kishwaukee River might produce Osprey at this season, but no nests have been confirmed yet. The Espenscheid Forest Preserve holds White-eyed Vireo and Yellow-breasted Chats in early June.

Boone County

Garden Prairie Slough, near the town of Garden Prairie, in Boone County, is privately owned, and usually birding must be done from the road. (IOS hopes to have confirmed permission to enter for the Annual Meeting field trip.) This wetland has attracted its share of rarities in the past (Garganey and two records of Black-necked Stilt) as well as more

commonly American and Least Bitterns, Virginia Rail, Sora, and Yellow-headed Blackbird. Sandhill Cranes also nest in the surrounding wetlands, and this is the most likely place to find lingering migrant shorebirds in June.

Ogle County

Lowden Miller State Forest really hit the birding map when Dr. Scott Robinson and his crew from the Illinois Natural History Survey did the first thorough field work on nesting birds in the forest. (See *Meadowlark* 4:16-18). Roughly 20 species of warblers have nested here including Black-throated Green, Prothonotary, Hooded, Blue-winged, Canada, Golden-winged, Chestnut-sided, Mourning, Kentucky and Yellow-throated. Wood Thrush and Veery nest here, too, plus Least and Acadian Flycatchers. Singing Blue-headed Vireo, Golden-crowned Kinglet, Brown Creeper and Winter Wren have also been recorded here during the breeding season. As this former tree farm continues to undergo habitat change, the bird life will change with it. For more information, call (815) 732-7329.

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The Spring Bird Count, scheduled annually for the Saturday which falls on or between 4 and 10 May, was held 8 May 2004. The count, formalized through the Illinois Audubon Society in 1972, has run for 33 consecutive years. Several individuals have served as county compilers for the first count in 1972 and are still serving as compilers today. That's dedication. Through the years county compilers have also garnered newspaper accounts from their local papers and submitted them along with their reports. These articles have not only informed local folks about the dedicated efforts and accomplishments of count compilers and participants, but also helped them learn more about birds and birding, and, in several instances, attracted them as new count participants.

Count day 2004 was like 2003, a very pleasant and rewarding day for birding, perhaps a bit windy in some areas, but, nevertheless, a good day. (*I have a feeling, though, that some of you in the 2003 tornado alley in central Illinois may have a different opinion.*) Early morning tempera-

tures for 2004 ranged from the low 50s in the north to the mid-to-upper 50s in the south and climbed to the low-to-mid 80s in the north and mid-to-upper 80s in the south, certainly one of the warmest ever Spring Bird Counts. The sky, for the most part, was clear or mostly clear throughout the day in all but the extreme northern portion of the state where it started off partly cloudy then did change to mostly clear. The wind ranged from negligible to gusts up to 30 mph; the majority of southern reports had south to southwest breezes less than 10 mph, middle counties had winds from the south to southwest in the 10-20 mph range and northern counties had winds from the southeast to the southwest in the 5-30 mph range then changing in the late afternoon to north and northeast (especially Lake and Cook counties).

Owling and nocturnal counting began precisely at midnight (0000) in three counties (Clinton, De Kalb and Franklin), had begun by 3 a.m. (0300) in ten more counties, and by 5 a.m. (0500) in another 52 counties. In all, 66 counties reported at least some (owling time normally referred to as owling hours prior to dawn. Owling time was also reported by 27 counties after dusk (from approximately 8:30 p.m. to midnight).

Spring Bird Count goals include having at least one team (preferably two or more) and five or more observers in all 102 counties, and receiving a confirmed list of 100 or more species from every county on count day. Based on that, we did reasonably well. As noted in times past, these goals are a challenge, but, achievable. In 2004 we did manage

to have at least one team in 101 counties (99% success — in seven counties the team consisted of just a single observer), five or more observers in 70 counties (69% success) and 100 or more species in 80 counties (78% success — which ties the best we've ever done). However, on close scrutiny, you will note that the records of two counties have been included in these results that did not meet the minimum duration of count standard of eight or more daylight hours of counting. So, in reality, if we based the results on the minimum standards, the success rate of the first part of the first goal would be only 97%. [*Editorial comment: it's obviously important that all results submitted each year be included in these annual reports; however, it's also important that the minimum standards for doing the count should be met.*]

Results and Discussion

Highest County Counts. Since count day was only two days short of being as late in May as it could be, the northern counties were, once again, at an advantage and, as expected, achieved the highest totals. Cook County, which recorded the highest species total in 2003 (192), was nosed out by Lake County this year, 184 to 183 species, despite having 2(times as many observers. Du Page County was right there, too, with 181 species. Twenty more counties reported 150 or more species: Carroll (171), Winnebago (171), Knox (170), Clinton (168), Union (166), Massac (165), Champaign (164), Williamson (164), Fayette (163), McHenry (160), Will (160), Mason (159), Jo Daviess (158), Mercer (156), Brown (155), La

Salle (154), Kane (153), McLean (153), McDonough (152), and Vermilion (150). Some of these were record high county counts. Of the 23 counties with 150 or more species, 11 (48% — almost half) were in the northern quarter of the state, 9 (39%) were in the central half of the state; and only 3 (13%) were in the southern quarter of the state. In 2004 five more counties achieved the 150 species level than did so in 2003. For the record, another nine counties were in the 140 (149 species range and the highest species count ever for a single county remains at 205 set in 1983).

Table 1 provides annual comparisons; it compares the 2004 results with those of the two previous years and the record year. Although 2004 was a reasonably good year, and the weather was conducive for good birding, it was not a record-setting year for any of the listings in the table. The 2004 efforts did, however, tie the high for the greatest number of counties (80) reporting 100 or more species and came very close to the

record for the two averages at the end of the table: the average number of species reported per county and the average number of species for all 102 counties combined. Although we fielded observers in all but one of the state's 102 counties, there was only a net gain of 12 observers over last year's 93 counties and a loss of more than 100 observers since 2002. This year's 261 species is 3 above the overall average for all 33 years, but nearly 3 below the average of the past ten years. Had some of the species reported this year not been disquali-

fied for inadequate (usually, lack of) documentation, the 2004 species total would have been near the ten-year average. (The number of species on a few county lists was also reduced because of insufficient documentation.) As noted in the table, nearly 560,000 birds were counted; this was only 34,000 short of the record. Because the 2004 count day was such a beautiful day, birders spent more time on foot searching for birds than they did from their vehicles and, with the return to 100 or more participating counties, it's not surprising that there was a significant increase in the number of species reported in 90 or more counties. Of the 16 categories listed in Table 1, 12 (75%) were higher than in 2003 and one tied the 2003 number. The three that were lower than the 2003 numbers were: total number of species, number of party hours driven, and the highest species total in a single county.

Table 2 lists, in descending order, the counties fielding 20 or more observers; 21 counties (one more than in 2003) made the list

this year. As usual, Cook and DuPage both continue to field 100 or more observers. It's amazing (and very much appreciated) how the compilers of these counties are

able to keep everyone organized, avoid duplication of coverage, and have the results compiled in a short turn-around time. It was really unusual to see Schuyler County missing from the list this year. [Obviously, those counties with 4 or fewer observers would not appear in this table. As an ongoing plea, I encourage some of you from the well-populated counties to participate in one of the more distant counties that could, obviously, benefit from your assistance. (Special thanks to those of you who continue to help in one of these counties and to those of you who made the transition this year.)]

Table 3 provides the usual comparisons of birding efforts in each quarter of the state (south to north—identified as AREAS 1 through 4 in Figure 1). In 2004, the average number of party hours was 48.07, about 1 party hour per county less than last year, nearly 4 party hours less than those recorded in 2002, and 6.6 fewer than the record set in 1977.

Table 4 lists the 48 species reported from 90 or more counties. Thirteen (27%) of these were reported in all 101 counties; another 4 (Great Blue Heron, Red-bellied Woodpecker, Brown Thrasher, and Song Sparrow) were found in all but one county. The European Starling, American Crow, Killdeer, Rock Pigeon, Red-headed Woodpecker, Chimney Swift, House Finch, and Purple Martin were missed in 2, 3, 3, 5, 6, 7, 11 and 11 counties, respectively.

Table 5 shows, in descending order, the 20 most commonly reported species. The top ten are pretty much the same year after year with the Red-winged Blackbird nearly always in the top position and the Common Grackle in second. The next eight positions often change, however, this year the starling and robin remained number 3 and 4, respectively, and the Ring-billed Gull dropped from position 5 to number 7; this allowed the House Sparrow and Canada Goose to move up a notch to positions 5 and 6, respectively. The Canada Goose continues to be almost as common

as the House Sparrow (a difference of only 502 birds). The American Goldfinch, Mourning Dove, and Northern Cardinal round out the remaining 10 with the goldfinch moving ahead of the dove this year.

The next 4 species (Tree Swallow, Brown-headed Cowbird, Barn Swallow, and Indigo Bunting) are the same as last year, however, the Barn Swallow slipped from the 11th position to number 13 and the Indigo Bunting (still at position 14) exploded in numbers for the second consecutive year establishing another new high count (by 97 birds) over last year's record. The Blue Jay, at position 17 last year, moved up to number 15 this year with a near-identical count total (but less than half of the record total set in 1984).

The Chipping Sparrow, the only other top 20 species to set a new count total, achieved position 16 this year and the top 20 for only the second time. The Double-crested Cormorant, a very rare species when the Spring Bird Count began and an endangered species for several years, is now consistently in the top 20 list. The Mallard, Yellow-

rumped Warbler, and Eastern Meadowlark complete the top 20 list for 2004 and occur in the list more often than not. Other species with 5000 or more birds counted and a history of being in the top 20 are Chimney Swift, American Crow, Cliff Swallow, House Wren, Palm Warbler, Common Yellowthroat, Song Sparrow, White-throated Sparrow, White-crowned Sparrow, and Baltimore Oriole. The three species on last year's list that did not repeat this year were the American Crow (the first time it has failed to make the list), Common Yellowthroat, and White-throated Sparrow. Over the count's 33-year history, 42 species have been common enough to be on the annual top twenty list; however, eight have but single appearances.

Table 6 is a synopsis of the entire 2004 count. It shows the number of counties reporting each species, the total number of birds of each species reported, the highest number of each species recorded in a single county, and the new records set this year. The 19 species reported from a single county have been

bold faced and the SPOTTED TOWHEE (McLean County) is further emphasized by capital letters since it was a new count species and ranks high as one of the most interesting records of 2004. Some of the other notable single-county records were: White-faced Ibis (5th year) (Putnam County), Gray Partridge (De Kalb County), Western Grebe (5th year) (Boone County); American Avocet (13th year) (Tazewell County), Iceland Gull (8th year) (Lake County), Western Kingbird (Madison County), and Scissor-tailed Flycatcher (7th year) (Alexander County). Some of the better records of the 8 species reported from only two counties were: Greater Prairie-Chicken, Merlin, Sanderling, Western Sand-piper, Great Black-backed Gull, and Short-eared Owl.

Table 6, at the end, also acknowledges those species reported on the Spring Bird Count that are not officially countable as Illinois species. For the purposes of this report those species have been identified as exotics and others. The Trumpeter Swan, obviously, is not

an exotic species; however, until it meets the minimum Illinois Ornithological Records Committee standards to become an official, countable species, it will appear under the exotic heading with appropriate numbers being recorded as if it was a countable species Records of the Ringed Turtle-Dove

and of hybrids (the latter listed under the other category) will be maintained in a similar manner. The "Brewster's Warbler" (Blue-winged/Golden-winged hybrid) has now been reported on the Spring Bird Count 12 times.

In regards to exotics, a couple of count reports (including photo-

graphs) that really do qualify for this category were the pairs of Great Tits and European Goldfinches that had been present in McHenry County for quite some time. It'll be interesting to follow the happenings of these birds.

New Species Records. As mentioned previously, Table 6 also iden-

tifies all count records. The 67 new records have been identified by an asterisk (*) and the 24 records that tied the previous high have been identified by the pound (#) sign. Fifteen new records increased the number of counties reporting the species; some of the largest or most interesting increases in county totals

were for the Bald Eagle (up 2 counties), Black-necked Stilt (up 1 county), Greater Yellowlegs (up 3 counties), Eurasian Collared-Dove (up 7 counties), Cliff Swallow (up 5 counties), American Pipit (up 2 counties), Northern Parula (up 8 counties), Grasshopper Sparrow (up 6 counties), and Dickcissel (up 5

counties). Thirty-three new records increased the total number of birds reported for those species in a single count year; some of the largest and most interesting gains (followed by the percent increase) were for the Mute Swan (up 81 birds, +54%); Hooded Merganser (up 19 birds, +19%); American White Pelican (up

74 birds, +15%), White-faced Ibis (up 2 birds, +200%), Turkey Vulture (up 404 birds, +11%), Cooper(s Hawk (up 49 birds, +23%), Sandhill Crane (up 14 birds, +9%), Black-necked Stilt (up 16 birds, +320%), Least Sandpiper (up 308 birds, +9%), Eurasian Collared-Dove (up 91 birds, +157%), Eastern Phoebe (up 93 birds, +6%), Great Crested Flycatcher (up 404 birds, +24%), Bell(s Vireo (up 7 birds, +9%), Yellow-throated Vireo (up 350 birds, +59%), Warbling Vireo (up 115 birds, +5%), Sedge Wren (up 103 birds, +80%), Blue-gray Gnatcatcher (up 389 birds, +12%), Northern Mockingbird (up 123 birds, +13%), Northern Parula (up 124 birds, +14%), Mourning Warbler (up 24 birds, +52%), Summer Tanager (up 38 birds, +9%), Scarlet Tanager (up 219

birds, +22%), Savannah Sparrow (up 448 birds, +46%), Grasshopper Sparrow (up 216 birds, +18%), Indigo Bunting (up 97 birds, +1%), and Baltimore Oriole (up 70 birds, +1%). Nineteen new records increased the total number of birds reported for those species in a single county; some of the largest or most interesting increases were for the Turkey Vulture (up 33 birds, Calhoun County), Cooper(s Hawk (up 13 birds, Du Page County), Semipalmated Plovers (up 65 birds, Fayette County), Black-necked Stilt (up 2 birds, Massac County), Eurasian Collared-Dove (up 25 birds, Montgomery County), Red-bellied Woodpecker (up 33 birds, Du Page County), Warbling Vireo (up 28 birds, Pike County), House Wren (up 40 birds, Winnebago County), Sedge Wren (up 17 birds,

Du Page County), Marsh Wren (up 18 birds, Du Page County), Northern Cardinal (up 71 birds, Du Page County), and American Gold-finch (up 184 birds, Du Page County).

Species Comments. This was an excellent year for some of the grassland species, note especially the high counts for Sedge Wrens and Savannah and Grasshopper Sparrows. Several species including the Black Vulture, Hooded Merganser, Sandhill Crane, Black-necked Stilt, Bell's Vireo, Yellow-throated Vireo, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, Northern Parula, Summer Tanager, Indigo Bunting, and Orchard Oriole followed last year's record-setting numbers with even higher numbers in 2004. The Gray Partridge was one of four gallinaeous species found in De Kalb

County; thankfully, partridges are still being reported. Four gallinaeous species, including the prairie-chicken, were also reported from Jasper and Marion Counties. Can you imagine not finding Rock Pigeons? They were missed in 5 counties. As noted earlier, the Ringed Turtle-Dove was once again found in Will County and listed in this report (under exotics). The Eurasian Collared-Dove made significant gains again this year (note the 38 reported from Montgomery County. The hoped-for Scissor-tailed Flycatchers in the Jackson/Union county area were not found

on count day, however, one was seen and photographed in Alexander County. The Painted Bunting banded in East St. Louis last year returned to the same site this year, but not soon enough to be included on this count. With the Spotted Towhee being added as a new Spring Bird Count species, the accumulative list now stands at 324 species.

Species Missed. Although 261 species is a reasonably good number, that's 8 species short of the record and slightly below recent averages. Two of the most notable misses were: the Laughing Gull

(especially since one regularly occurs at a KFC restaurant in Chicago) and Golden-crowned Kinglet. A few other would have, could-have or should-have-beens include Eared and Horned Grebes, Greater White-fronted Goose, Greater Scaup, any sea duck, Long-eared Owl, Sharp-tailed Sparrow, and Painted Bunting. Of course, other gulls, shorebirds or waterfowl species may have been possible as well.

Other Notes. Fairly large numbers of migrant warblers were well-represented in many areas and specifically mentioned in McLean,

Cook, Lake, and Du Page Counties. The best place to be for the early-arriving Wilson's Warbler was in McLean county where an amazing 29 were encountered. Shorebirds and an interesting array of other water birds were plentiful at the Hennepin-Hopper Lake Restoration Area (Putnam County). Other good locations for shorebirds included Tazewell, Richland, and Fayette Counties. Although a few Alder and Yellow-bellied Flycatchers and Connecticut Warblers had arrived by count day, some records were disqualified for lack of adequate documentation.



Table 7 details the County Statistics. The columns in this table include: 1) the county name; 2) the AREA (1, 2, 3 or 4) of the state in which the county occurs; 3) the number of species identified; 4) the number of countable birds reported; 5) the number of participating birders; 6) the number of parties counting birds; 7) the earliest and latest birding times (in the 24-hour system with owling hours before and/or after daylight hours marked by an asterisk (*)); 8) the number of party miles walked (W) and driven (D); 9)

the number of party hours walked (W) and driven (D); and 10) the 2004 county coordinator/compiler. An equal sign (=) following the coordinator/compiler(s) name indicates the new person now responsible for the county.

For a handful of counties, the number of species listed in Table 7 may be one or two fewer than originally submitted by the county compiler because the documentations required were either not provided, or, insufficient to adequately eliminate other potential species.

Figure 1 provides an easy pictorial view of how well we did. The top number is the number of species reported and the bottom number (in parenthesis), the number of observers in the county. The figure can be used to compare the results of adjacent counties as well as distant counties; it also identifies those counties where more assistance would be helpful, especially those with 4 or fewer participants. White County was the only county for which results were not received this year.





Field Notes

2004 spring migration

A rather simplistic view of spring migration plots the northbound passage of birds on a calendar that conveniently begins with March and ends with May, and during which the denouement is a month-long frenzied flurry as the resolute, motley troops of warblers and other insectivores wend their way back north through our treetops. And then it's over. Of course, spring migrations are never so straightforward, but the spring 2004 passage came unusually close to being just that simple.

Sustained low temperatures in February resulted in deeper, more widespread freezing of waters and in more persistent snow cover than has been typical of most recent winters. Even days with milder south winds in the second half of February precipitated little movement, as there was little hospitable habitat to move into. Barely more than a trickle of migration was reported until the last two days of February (and the last day would already have been March but for 2004 being a leap year).

March proceeded at a steady, but sluggish, pace for migration, predictably bolstered by warm fronts now and again, most notably on 20 and 28 March, before turning colder at month's end. The first half of April remained chilly (it was, for example, the coldest first two weeks of April on record in Chicago), while the second half of the month brought in a spring roller coaster of warm southwest fronts and chilly northerly fronts, with a predictable alternation of better and worse days for bird migration.

May was cool and wet overall, but otherwise comparatively uneventful from a meteorological standpoint, with few noteworthy hindrances or aids to migration. The usual spring passage of songbirds thus proceeded about as one might expect for most of the month, with the biggest numbers of insectivores concentrated in the period 8-23 May. An unusual feature this spring, however, was an abrupt downslide in diversity beginning 27 May. Doug Stotz commented, "...migration pretty much screeched to a halt about 24-26 May....This was my worst June for migrants since 1997...."

Excluding nine species requiring review by the Illinois Ornithological Records Committee (IORC) and three exotics, a total of 296 species were reported this season, including four record early arrivals, six new Illinois high counts, and two record late departures. Highlights are boldfaced in the species accounts. The foundation of this summary is the detailed information on migration limits and populations as submitted directly to the compiler (or indirectly via the Illinois Department of Natural Resources) by field observers across the state. Migration limits and maximum counts are provided, where available, from each of the three subsections of Illinois, North, Central and South, as mapped out in Bohlen's (1978) Annotated Check-list of the Birds of Illinois. Additional data are selectively included for species and areas of special interest.
