President's Message

Dear Members:

In this my first message in 2006, it seems appropriate to address the state of our Society.

We ended 2005 with money in the bank. Our revenues for the year exceeded expenditures with a surplus of \$2,738 on total revenues of \$22,329. Publishing costs represented 78% of our expenses, the Annual Meeting 16% and general expenses the remainder.

Our membership continues in the low 400s. We ended 2005 with 419 members compared to 408 for 2004 and 434 for 2003. As our Membership Chair, Dan Williams noted at our most recent board meeting, we are attracting new members at a good clip each year. We added 42 new members last year, but lost 31. If we are to grow we need to keep more of our existing members. We are still trying to figure out how to bring those whose memberships have lapsed back into the fold. The addition of a Paypal option on our Web site makes it as convenient as possible to renew your membership. It just takes the click of a mouse.

We are very fortunate to have a growing number of members who contribute more than the base level of Individual or Family Membership dues. Last year 83 of you generously contributed above the basic level, including a \$1,000 contribution by Ann Haverstock. Thank you so much, Ann. As a result we have been able to add \$1,500 to our reserves and have funds available for our scholarship program.

Field Trip Chair, Peter Weber has put together an excellent program again this year repeating our popular Smith's Longspur, Swainson's Hawk and Yellow Rail trips, and the sell-out annual Carlyle Lake Pelagic. He has also added a new trip continuing our focus on rare species, a search for the elusive Swainson's Warbler. Check out the schedule on our Web site at www.illinoisbirds.org.

In addition, our "event" programs this year are off to a good start. The recent Gull Frolic under Board Member Denis Bohm's leadership was attended by nearly 160 hardy folks who were rewarded by a Long-tailed Duck right in the harbor in front of the Yacht Club and a good number of the target winter gulls. Our thanks also to Walter Marcisz for his presentation on winter ducks and to the "orange hat" experts who generously helped the rest of us find and identify those confusing winter gulls.

Our next event will be the Annual Meeting in Effingham over the weekend of March 31 through April 2. Participants can sign up for the blinds to watch the Prairie-chickens at close range dance on their leks. Then in late summer we have the Shorebird Spectacular planned for Lake Chautauqua over the weekend of August 26-27.

Hope to see you in Effingham.

Letter from the Editor

Important Bird Areas

Volunteers and staff members of various conservation organizations have been working on a very important list for Illinois – not a list of birds – rather a list of Important Bird Areas, known as IBAs. Why? It's simple. Birds won't come if they can't find the right habitat. Designating an important bird habitat gives credence to its ability to not only provide the right migratory and breeding grounds for Illinois' avifauna, but also for other creatures and plants that also need good habitat to thrive.

Some of you may have submitted nominations for this list, and think the work is over. Actually, scientists, volunteers and land managers are just beginning to make use of this list – and in fact, the list is not yet complete – nor has the program been promoted nearly as much as it should be.

For starters, you'll find two tables in this issue showing sites that are still being considered for nomination as well as others that need to be considered. Another table shows the IBA list, so far, and shows that only about half have been properly introduced to the public. You can help by writing nominations or volunteering to research some of the sites that need to be examined for their ability to provide habitat for migrants. And you can help by getting the publicity out to local newspapers, conservation groups and other interested parties.

For the first time since the program was initiated, there's a published list of the 1BAs along with an article describing the 1BA program, a map, and tables showing what needs to be done further.

You're seeing this first in Meadowlark and have IOS Board Member Bob Fisher to thank for spending a great deal of time putting together this piece. You owe it to yourself and the birds you love to watch to read this article and take one small step to help this program. By reading this article, you'll also likely learn about some new birding hot spots in Illinois, which we will be featuring in future issues of Meadowlark. See the next issue, for example, with a bird finding guide to Pyramid State Park.



Illinois' Important Bird Areas: a primer

On a recent warm, sunny, Saturday morning in late September, about 50 people gathered to celebrate the designation of Pratt's Wayne Woods Forest Preserve and Pate Phillip State Park as an Illinois Important Bird Area (IBA).

Pratt's Wayne is a 3400-acre assemblage of marshes, wetlands, woods, grasslands and shrublands where extensive restoration has taken place since the DuPage County Forest Preserve District acquired the property a number of years ago. Separated only by a secondary road that runs along the north boundary of Pratt's Wayne, the two units form a more or less continuous complex of habitats. Like Pratt's Wayne, the 500-acre Pate Phillip State Park has also been subject to extensive restoration; it has been managed and staffed by the DuPage County Forest Preserve District under an agreement with the Illinois Department of Natural Resources. Both the park and the preserve were mostly farmland when they were acquired by their respective agencies. The extensive restoration work has led to a partial return to their pre-farming, more natural state, especially in the wetlands. One result: The birds have returned, including the state-endangered Yellow-headed Blackbird and the state-threatened Sandhill Crane. It was for these two species that the combined 4000-acre site complex received its IBA designation.

Among the crowd on that Saturday were a number of non-birders, including a couple of elected officials from the Forest Preserve District. At the conclusion of the dedication, some of those folks questioned the organizers on what

the IBA designation means and why they should care whether a natural area like Pratt's Wayne receives that designation.

As birders and bird conservationists, the answers to those questions seem obvious. But to the general public, even to those with a love of the outdoors, perhaps they are not so obvious. That dichotomy perhaps best defines why the IBA program in Illinois needs our active support. As Frank Gill, former Director of Science for National Audubon, said, "IBAs have a unique power to unite people, communities and organizations in proactive bird conservation, one place at a time."

How did IBAs start?

The Important Bird Area concept and program began in Europe during the 1980s. The concept and practice originated with BirdLife International, a global coalition of more than 100 individual countrybased bird conservation groups. Thousands of sites throughout Europe have received IBA designation, covering more than 7% of the European land mass. The program spread throughout the world. Now 167 countries have IBAs, and the number grows daily. In many cases, this designation is the first line of defense in protecting areas identified as most critical in maintaining habitat for bird populations. Land managers, public and private, are keyed in to exactly why their site is critical, whether it be for a breeding population of a threatened or endangered species, a crucial wintering area, or a migratory bird stopover that provides food and shelter for often exhausted birds on their way north or south.

Here's what Birdlife International has to say about IBAs:

"Important Bird Areas are part of a larger network of key biodiversity areas — the most important sites for terrestrial biodiversity conservation worldwide. Key biodiversity areas form the anchors of a systematic ecological network. Like IBAs, they are identified based on the species they hold. We generally have good data on the status and distribution of bird species. However, the information for many other species is poor or patchy, often making it hard to identify the critical sites for these species.

There is growing evidence that networks of IBAs, though identified using information on birds, are disproportionately important for other animals and plants. That is to say, IBA networks are good at capturing threatened, endemic and representative species for other terrestrial groups...It appears that IBAs can be used

with confidence as a first cut for the overall network of key biodiversity areas, with extra sites for other taxa being added when data become available."

This correlation has proven to hold up in sites ranging in size from the expansive savannas of East Africa to small islands of habitat found in or near major urban areas.

In the United States, the National Audubon Society became Birdlife International's partner, beginning the IBA initiative in 1995 and working to set up the program in each state. The individual state focus of the program provides local conservationists with both the tools and the opportunity to protect sites within their state, allowing them to tailor the definition and criteria to suit local conditions.

Important shorebird stopovers are included on the IBA list.

How does it work?

The broad qualifications for site designation require that at least one of the four following criteria are met:

The site must be utilized by a species of conservation concern (threatened or endangered species).

The site must be used by a restricted range species (vulnerable because of limited distribution).

The species using the site has its populations concentrated in only one habitat type.

The site is used by a species (or groups of similar species like shore-birds or waterfowl) vulnerable because they congregate at the site in high concentrations.

A detailed nomination form, setting out specific standards for data collection and submission, is available from Audubon. It allows the nominator to define the site step by step, focusing on the necessary observations and data to support the nomination. Once completed, the



form and any attached information are reviewed by the Illinois IBA Technical Committee, which is cochaired by Jim Herkert and Judy Pollock. Committee members are Steve Bailey, Jeff Brawn, Vern Kleen, Doug Stotz, Liane Suloway, Jeff Walk and Mike Ward. All the nomination materials also are entered into the World Bird Database, developed and maintained by Bird Life International.


Implicit to the nomination process is working with the land-owner/manager. In most cases, the designation is an endorsement of the way the area is being managed, since good stewardship is critical for long-term viability of an IBA site. On very rare occasions, seeking and obtaining IBA status may be one tool for those seeking to save a critical area from some form of development or major alteration. Usually, but not always, a designation ceremony will take place at a new IBA site, celebrating the status and

giving all the interested parties a chance to talk about the future.

State of the State: Where are we right now regarding Illinois IBAs?

Illinois has 48 IBAs. They range in size from fewer than 100 to thousands of acres. Table 1 lists all the sites and shows the species or suite of species that were the reason for IBA designation.

The geographic concentration of sites is worth noting. Almost 25% (11 out of 48) are near the Shawnee National Forest in the extreme southern end of Illinois. This birding hot spot region is (not surprisingly) a critical area for many of Illinois' most threatened species. The Illinois River valley is also an IBA hot spot, with 12 (13 counting the DesPlaines State Conservation Area near the confluence of the several rivers that form the Illinois). These IBAs reflect the importance of the Illinois River valley as a

major corridor/stopover for migrating waterfowl and shorebirds.

Northeastern Illinois has eight IBAs, ranging from the often abused and neglected (but very critical for many species) Lake Calumet area, to the northern Kane County southern McHenry County patchwork of fields and treelines, which support a very small breeding population of Swainson's Hawks. This IBA is critical to the conservation of this state-endangered bird. Suburban sprawl and unplanned, unchecked development threaten to rob these birds of the necessary habitat and prey base (the state endangered Franklin's Ground Squirrel may be an important prey item for the hawk) for their continued viability as a nesting species in Illinois, the only breeding Swainson's anywhere east of the Mississippi.

The rest of the sites are scattered throughout the state, and are quite diverse in terms of the habitat they provide and the birds they support. Six form an irregular chain along the Mississippi, from Lost Mound near the northwestern corner of the state south to the Calhoun Division of the Two Rivers National Fish and Wildlife Refuge, just north of St. Louis. The two units of Prairie Ridge State Natural Area, our state's prairie-chicken refuge, which also provides critical habitat for a wide range of other species throughout

the year, are viewed as one IBA even though they are not physically connected. Midewin and Goose Lake Prairie State Park offer large blocks of grassland and shrubland habitat for those two suites of species, both of which have experienced large declines in Illinois during the recent past.

One hundred miles or more southwest of Midewin, the Double T State Fish and Wildlife Area in Fulton County provides another critical grassland habitat island used by Upland Sandpipers. Pyramid State Park in Perry County is a large and diverse complex of habitats, which again features grassland and shrubland species along with waterfowl. On the state's eastern border, the Iroquois County State Conservation Area received IBA designation because of its importance to Red-headed Woodpeckers, a species which is declining across its range. The Castle Rock State Park/Lowden Miller State Forest complex provide habitat for breeding Cerulean Warbler with the Kaskaskia River Corridor almost 200 miles farther south.

Finally, Trelease Woods is important to note because it is the only IBA in Illinois that received the designation because of its importance as a research site, with its

long, unbroken bird monitoring history and database.

Where do we go from here? And what we can do.

48 IBAs seems like a lot, but it's not. Here's what you can do to help.

Nominate a site

Figure 1 locates all 48 IBA sites on a map of Illinois. It's easy to see how large areas of the state are devoid of IBAs. As birders, we know locations within those blank areas where birds breed and congregate during migration or winter, locations where threatened species are hanging on. Even in the regions where the map is dotted with IBAs, other sites deserving designation are 'not on the map' yet. One of the first things that can be done: Identify, gather the data and nominate a site. Table 2 contains both a list of sites currently under review (2A) for designation and a list of sites the Technical Committee is convinced will qualify for IBA status (2B); they are ready to review the 2B candidates, once they have the completed application in hand. But even if your site is not on their wish list, nominate it anyway. New site nominations are especially sought in northwestern, central and southern Illinois, as these areas are clearly under-surveyed for potential new IBAs.

Site nominations can also be aimed at under-reported or poorly understood species. Perhaps you know of a major Chimney Swift roost, or nightjar nesting area. Either or both would likely be eligible for IBA status. Although a category exists in the nomination form, our state Technical Committee continues to seek quantitative data for Important (Migratory) Bird Sites so they can be brought in under the IBA umbrella. It's fairly easy for waterfowl, and to a lesser extent shorebirds, but warblers and other passerines rarely mass at one location for any length of time and can certainly be hard to count even when they appear at a site in large numbers. So if you know of a site like this and you get a fallout, counting/estimating numbers provides invaluable data in support of an IBA.

Organize a dedication/ celebration ceremony

Dedication ceremonies have been held at only 20 of the 48 IBAs.

Table 1 shows which of the 48 have already been dedicated. If you attended one of those events, you know how inspiring they were. Landowners especially appreciate the recognition for their efforts to manage their land for the birds. Pick a site near you that you know well, but has not yet been formally dedicated, and put together a plan, a date and a team of interested people/organizations/clubs. Local media love stories like these.

Adopt an IBA, then volunteer to do bird surveys, site maintenance and restoration work

Landowners and managers need and value information on the status of the birds Bird monitoring observations are critical for tracking the short and long-term population cycles of the bird species using an IBA site. Though a site may have formal protection as a state park or preserve, information on the bird population trends helps the site manager to understand how management and restoration activities are impacting the birds. Overall protection of a site may be already in place, but the IBA program is a great chance to increase awareness of the manager on how the birds are being impacted by decisions made. Many demands are being placed on the wildlife professionals, and there is inadequate time and money for management and restoration. Volunteers have become an increasingly important asset for land managers and owners. Cutting brush may be less exciting than bird monitoring, but the help we provide in support of restoration is greatly valued by the manager. Plus, it provides you with a close look at the ecosystem that is being maintained or restored.


The Des Plaines State Conservation Area provides breeding habit to the Orchard Oriole.

The future of IBAs in Illinois

For birders and bird conservation advocates, both amateur and professional, IBAs provide a great opportunity to highlight the protection and enhancement of critical bird habitat throughout our state. But that will only happen if we, the birding community, embrace the concept and actively work to promote it. Will we someday have a network of IBAs encompassing 7% of the area within Illinois' borders, as has occurred in Europe? Perhaps the more relevant question may be: Is there 7% of the state left which could qualify for IBA designation? Certainly 7% is not a magic number. We know with equal certainty that many other sites remain to be identified and designated. If at some future date, we are actually struggling to identify new candidate sites because all the good ones are already designated, that will be a nice problem to have.

One thing is for sure. An active, vital IBA program can be a key component as we work to keep our state's natural areas intact. Dewey

Illinois' first Fork-tailed Flycatcher

with a discussion of spring and inland occurrences of the species in the United States and Canada

On 16 May, 2005, I was wandering through the prairie at Paul Douglas Forest Preserve (Hoffman Estates, northwest Cook County) looking for grassland sparrows, scouting for an upcoming big day, when a striking bird with an extremely long forked tail flew up from in front of me. It landed about seven meters away on a tall blade of grass. I took one look at it through my binoculars and reached for my cell phone to spread the news: I had just found Illinois' long-awaited first Fork-tailed Flycatcher.

Fork-tailed Flycatcher (Tyrannus savanna) is a predominantly neotropical species, with a range that spans from southern South America, where it is a breeding-season resident, north to Mexico (Ridgely and Tudor 1994). It is a rare but regular visitor to North America, most often along the east coast in the fall (McCaskie and Patten 1994). However, they have been recorded north of Mexico in all months of the year except March and there are records from across the United States and Canada, leading Walters and Engel (2000) to predict it as the next species to be added to Illinois' bird list.

Of the four subspecies, the one most frequently encountered north of Mexico is the nominate, southernbreeding subspecies, T.s. savanna. This subspecies is a long distance migrant, breeding as far south as central Argentina and wintering in northern South America, north to Trinidad and Tobago (Ridgely and Tudor 1994). Fall North American records are reverse migrants, flying north instead of back south to their breeding grounds. Spring records are likely individuals that overshoot their wintering range. It has been put forth by Kenn Kaufman that fewer birds make it to North America in spring than in fall because they have twice as far to fly; many individuals simply can't make it that far (Perkins 1990). The propensity for spring records from Florida may support this argument (see Figure 1).

Other than suspected records of *T.s.monarchus*, the partially migratory Central American subspecies, from South Texas in winter, all North American records of Forktailed Flycatcher are of the nominate subspecies (McCaskie and Patten 1994, Lockwood 1999). This includes all six North American specimens of the species; a specimen of T.s.sanctamartae, a resident in northern South America, from New Jersey is considered suspect (Monroe and Barron 1980, McCaskie and Patten, 1994).

Description

The Fork-tailed Flycatcher is an unmistakable species, and the individual at Paul Douglas was no exception. It was a small bodied, small billed, and extremely longtailed flycatcher. The tail was black (though due to wear and fading it appeared brown in certain light) with white on the outer web of the outer tail feathers. The tail was extremely long and deeply forked, even though the right outermost tail feather was broken. The body and bill were smaller than on nearby Eastern Kingbirds (Tyrannus tyrannus). It had a black head with the white malar region and throat, contrasting with a medium-light gray nape and back. The uppertail coverts were dark gray or black. The wing coverts were brown from wear. The exposed tertial on the folded wing appeared darker than the rest of the folded wing, with a thin pale edge, possibly indicating that the prebasic molt had commenced. Indeed, an adult specimen from Colombia in late April shows a similar pattern (Field Museum of Natural History 298064). The underparts from the throat to the undertail coverts were clean, snowy white. The legs, bill, and eye were black. Other observers commented seeing pale feathers in the crown.

It was very active, feeding in typical *Tyrunnus* fashion, sallying out for insects and returning to the

same or a nearby perch. However, it moved extensively around the large prairie, rarely flying over 100 meters in a single flight. It usually perched on grass stems that could support its weight or on small shrubs, rarely flying into the tops of taller trees surrounding the prairie. It often associated with Eastern Kingbirds, another recent arrival from its nonbreeding grounds in South America. These two species sometimes flock together at fruiting trees in Amazonia (P. O'Donnell, pers. comm.) and it is conceivable that the Fork-tail could have arrived with a group of Eastern Kingbirds.

Thanks to the ease of communications in the technology age, over one hundred birders saw the bird despite the fact that it goes down as a "one day wonder." The bird was initially discovered at 9:30 AM; at 9:34 a message about it appeared on Illinois' birding listserve, IBET. The first twitchers arrived forty-five minutes later and the bird was watched nearly constantly the rest of the day. Despite many people searching the following day, it was not seen again.

Age, sex, and subspecies

A review of specimens at the Field Museum showed several differences between hatch year and adult Fork-tailed Flycatchers during the northern spring. The two most consistent and noticeable differences were in feather wear and head color. Hatch years had much fresher

plumage, which is especially pronounced in having blacker wing coverts and flight feathers.

Additionally, hatch year birds invariably had at least some brown in the crown, most often on the top of the head. The Paul Douglas bird, however, had very worn, brown wing coverts, primaries, and tail feathers and had a fully black crown, indicating an adult.

Subspecific identification is based on the shape of the emargination of the outer primaries (Lockwood 1999). Despite the worn state of the primary tips, photographs show relatively blunt primary tips with little emargination. This makes conclusive subspecific identification impossible, though it is highly probable based on its migratory patterns and history of vagrancy across North America that it belongs to the nominate subspecies. The blunt primaries, combined with the relatively short length of the unbroken left outermost tail feather, point to it being a female.

Review of record

I conducted a review of North American records of Fork-tailed Flycatcher by searching North American Birds (NAB) and its predecessors after 1992. For pre-1993 records I relied on McCaskie and Patten (1994), the last thorough review of such records. They examined the original observer descriptions to decide which were acceptable; I only reviewed records in NAB and corresponded with appropriate sources to resolve discrepancies and learn the outcome of records reported as pending record's committee review.

North American Fork-tailed Flycatcher records show two seasonal peaks of occurrence, a larger one from late August to early November and a much smaller one in May and June. The records are more evenly split between spring and fall in the south central and southeast U.S. than in the north central and northeast (Lockwood 1999).

There are 45 records of Forktailed Flycatchers in North America between April and June (Table 1). Of these, just nine are from inland sites, ranging in dates from 3-14 May 1992 (Grand Marais, Minnesota) to 24 June 1988 (Douglas Co., Wisconsin). Two of the records are from Texas, two from Eastern locations (Bic, Quebec and Ferrisburg, Vermont), and the remaining five records are from northcentral North America, as far north as Cedoux, Sasketchewan, and Drumheller, Alberta. Looking at a map, spring overshoots could show up anywhere in the eastern United States, but are most likely along the Gulf and East Coasts where they would first encounter land after leaving the South American continent.

Of the spring records, there are six in late April, all from the Gulf Coast and Florida Keys, with the records increasing in frequency in May and June. This timing corresponds with the typical arrival dates of northbound migrants in Suriname, where (except for a couple anomalous earlier records) the first birds appeared in April with numbers increasing in May and June (Haverschmidt 1954).

Twenty-nine of the forty-four spring records were seen for only one day, including the Paul Douglas bird, much to the frustration of birders who couldn't make it to the site on 16 May. Fortunately it showed well for the entire day, until it was practically too dark to see (J. Weckstein, pers. com.). Illinois' two other spring first state record kingbirds, Gray and Tropical/Couch's, were also one day wonders (Kassebaum 1999a, 1999b).

There are twenty-four records of Fork-tailed Flycatchers away from East Coast and Gulf Coast states (Figure 2), compared with over one hundred coastal records. Assuming that fall Fork-tailed Flycatchers in North America are mirror-image migrants flying north and slightly west instead of south and slightly east, looking at a map it becomes clear why the most records occur in the northeast. It is a comparable distance (and trajectory) from their nonbreeding grounds in northern South America to their breeding grounds to the south as it is to the northeastern United States and maritime Canada.

Given the number of records on the Gulf Coast and the number of Midwest records, it is surprising that there is only one inland record in the southern United States away from Texas, a January record in Arkansas. There are four records in the interior west, two each in spring and fall. The two west coast individuals were recorded in September and stayed for several days.

There are many more records from the Midwest. Not surprisingly, most are from Ontario (six records), both the largest state/province in the region and the one extending farthest east. Wisconsin has four records, Michigan and Minnesota each have two, while Illinois and Kentucky have one each. Eventually other states in the region will surely add the species to their respective states' list as well. Wisconsin, Minnesota, and Illinois all have single spring records.

The propensity for Fork-tailed Flycatchers to show up not only in the Midwest but in far-flung locations across the continent led a panel of experts to conclude that it would be the next species to be added to Illinois' state list (Walters and Engel 2000). While a number of other species were added first, they were correct in that it was not too long before this lovely tropical Tyrannid was added.

Introduction

Illinois' 34th annual statewide Spring Bird Count was held on Saturday, 7 May 2005. Weatherwise it was a great day for the Count. Early morning temperatures ranged from the upper 40s and lower 50s in the north and lower- to mid-50s in the south then peaked in the upper 70s and lower 80s throughout the state (except for Lake County which reached a high of only 57 degrees). The southern half of Illinois was cloud-free nearly all day with modest S-SW winds (usually less than 10 mph with occasional gusts up to 20 mph); the rest of the state was mostly sunny or partly cloudy (with a bit of overcast) and light winds predominantly from the W-SW except for those counties on/near Lake Michigan where the prevailing winds drifted in from a northerly or easterly direction.

Nocturnal counting (that time before dawn and after dusk referred to as owling hours) began exactly at

midnight (0000 hours) in 4 counties (Clinton, Crawford, Jo Daviess and Knox), had begun by 3 a.m. (0300) in 14 more counties, and 5 a.m. (0500) in another 44 counties. Over all, "owling" time was reported in 69 counties, 66 prior to dawn (before 5:30 a.m.) and 25 after dusk (after 8:30 p.m.); in three counties owling time occurred only after dusk. Winnebago was the only county where owling continued until midnight (2400 hours).

Although artificial, two Spring Bird Count goals are 1) to have at least one team (preferably two or more teams) and five or more observers in all 102 counties each year; and 2) to have a confirmed list of 100 or more species from every county each year. Both goals are a challenge to achieve, but not impossible. In 2005 we fell a bit short of the first goal by receiving reports from only 95 counties; and then, data from only 94 were usable since one county had to be disqualified

because it did not meet the minimum duration of count standard of at least 8 daylight hours of observation time. We also failed to receive reports from 3-4 other normally responsive counties. Of course, the efforts of single observers in 6 counties and the 2-4 observers in 23 more counties were definitely appreciated. In regards to the second goal, despite only 94 counties of record, a respectable 72 were able to confirm 100 or more species.

Results and Discussion

Figure 1, as usual, provides a visual reference of how well we did. The top number is the number of species reported in the county and the bottom number (in parenthesis) is the number of observers in the county. This figure can be used to compare the results of adjacent counties as well as distant counties; it also identifies those counties where more assistance would be helpful such as those counties with



4 or fewer participants and those with 99 or fewer species.


Table 1 compares the 2005 results with those of the past two years and the "record" year. Although 2005 was a very good year, and the weather was "great" for birding, it was not a record-setting year for any of the listed categories. However, based on what is now known, it could have been a record year for total species (270+ rather than 266) had Gray Partridge not been missed for the first time ever, had the known Painted Buntings and White-faced Ibises been found, had Trumpeter Swans been an officially countable species, and had at least one other reported species been appropriately documented. As noted in the table, the number of observers increased again this year — even with fewer counties reporting; and, the number of party miles walked was about 150 less than last year even though the number of party hours walked was nearly the same both years. Further, with only 94 counties reporting, it is interesting to note that the total number of miles and hours driven, number of counties with 20 or more participants, and the average number of species per participating county remained constant, and, that 6 of the listed categories were higher this year than those of last year (and its 101 counties of record).

Table 2 identifies those counties with 150 or more species. Cook County went all-out to regain top

honors and ended up with 191 species; Lake County, which usually challenges Cook, and this year accounted for the only records of eight species (Greater Scaup, Florned Grebe, 5 species of gulls and the Brewer's Blackbird), was a distant second with 175 species. Cook County's only isolated species were the Common Goldeneye and Nelson's Sharp-tailed Sparrow. DuPage, with 172 species, was among the state's best as well. As expected, seven more (for a total of 10) counties in the northern quarter of the state (AREA 4) reported 150 or more species. In the central half of the state (AREAS 2 & 3), Clinton County (with 163) was the best of

the six at 150 or more species. In the southern quarter of Illinois (AREA 1), Union County (with 164) was the highest of the three counties that made the list. For the record, another 15 counties provided confirmed lists of 140 to 149 species and the highest species count ever for a single county remains at 205 (set in 1983).

Table 3 lists, in descending order, the counties with 20 or more participants; for the second consecutive year that number is 21 counties. As usual, Cook and DuPage both continue to field 100 or more participants. I still marvel at how well the coordinators deal with so many people and so many numbers, and keep the observers occupied in non-duplicated areas throughout the entire day. [As mentioned each year, I encourage observers in some of these well-endowed counties to consider assisting in one of the less-endowed counties. When looking at the results in the various tables, it would seem likely that several more new records could be established if we had more observers in some of the lessendowed counties. Of course, special thanks to all of you who have already made the transition.]

Table 4 provides the usual comparisons of birding efforts in each quarter of the state—identified as AREAS 1 through 4 (south to north) in Figure 1. In 2005, the average number of party hours was 51.81, nearly 4 party hours per county more than in 2004 and almost 3 party hours per county more than in 2003; but, still nearly 3 hours less per county than the record set in 1977.

Table 5 identifies the 54 species reported from 85 (90%) or more of the reporting counties. Only 11 species (20%) were found in all 94 counties; another 13 (24%) were reported in all but one of these counties. It's interesting to note the number of counties that missed the American Kestrel, Rock Pigeon, Chimney Swift, Red-headed Woodpecker, Northern Flicker, Warbling Vireo, Horned Lark, Purple Martin, White-throated Sparrow, Rosebreasted Grosbeak and House Finch.

Table 6 shows, in descending order, the 20 most commonly reported species. As usual, the top 10 are pretty much the same year after year; however, this year the Canada Goose (with another new record count) moved ahead of the House Sparrow and became the 5th most common species; all others in the top ten are in the same position as last year. The Ring-billed Gull continues in the top ten as a result of Cook County's effort. The Mourning Dove, despite establishing another new high count, remained in 9th position. The species in the lower half of the top ten often vary. The White-crowned Sparrow (in 12th position) made the list for the first time and the Chipping Sparrow achieved the list for only the third time; counts for

both of these sparrows were new state highs. The White-throated Sparrow returned to the list after missing last year. The Blue Jay, despite dropping from 15th position last year to 17th position this year, did experience a net gain of 819 birds since last year; however, it's still only 55% as abundant as it was at its peak year (1984). The American Crow, which ranked 22nd this year and has been in the top 20 all but the last two years, was reported to be only 45% as abundant as it was during its peak year (1991), but did experience a 6% statewide gain since last year (at least according to Spring Bird Count data). The Brown-headed Cowbird has always made the top twenty and sits in position 11 this year. The Double-crested Cormorant now continues to be a regular in the top twenty after barely being reported anywhere in the state some 30 years ago. The Barn Swallow, Yellow-rumped Warbler, Tree Swallow and Mallard round-out the top twenty list and continue to be in the top twenty more often than not. Over the count's 34-year history, 43 species have now appeared in the top twenty; the White-crowned Sparrow was the only addition this year. Overall, nine species have been on this list just one time.

Table 7 provides the maximum species details including the number of counties reporting the species, the total number of birds of each species reported, the highest number of each species recorded in a single county and the county in which that number was recorded. In regards to this latter category, the highest species counts in a single county, it's worth noting that many of these numbers were only slightly larger, in some cases only one or two birds more, than the runner-up counties. The 21 species reported from a single county appear in bold face. Some of the notable single-county records were the Gallinule (Champaign Purple County), Piping Plover (Bureau County), Laughing (4), Thayer's (4), Iceland, Lesser Black-backed and Great Black-back gulls (Lake County), Scissor-tailed Flycatcher (Johnson County), Swainson's Warbler (Wabash County), Nelson's Sharp-tailed Sparrow (Cook County) and Red Crossbill (Mason County). Some of the better records of the 9 species reported from only two counties were Greater Prairie-Chicken, Merlin and Marbled Godwit.

Table 7, at the end, also acknowledges those species reported on the

Spring Bird Count that are not officially countable as Illinois species. For the purposes of this report those species have been identified as "exotics" and "others". Of course, the Trumpeter Swan certainly is not an "exotic" in the basic sense, but, until it meets the minimum Illinois Ornithological Records Committee requirements to be a countable species, it will continue to appear as

an "exotic"; in the meantime, we will definitely record its numbers as if it was a countable species. Records of the Ringed Turtle-Dove and of hybrids (the latter listed under the "other" category) will be maintained in a similar manner. This is now the 13th year the Brewster's Warbler has been reported on the Spring Bird Count; however, it's the first time for the Sutton's Warbler. The other two hybrids reported this year were the repeat of last year's Laughing x Ring-billed Gull and a Mallard x Northern Pintail.

In regards to exotics, both species reported last year, Great Tit and European Goldfinch, were found again this year. It will be interesting to follow the status of these birds, just like we did for the Monk Parakeets.

New Species Records

Table 7 also identifies all new and tied count records for each

species. The 38 new records, which may be the lowest number for any year, have been identified by an asterisk (*); the 12 tied records, by a pound (#) sign. It seems plausible that there would have been a larger number of new records had the number of reporting counties been higher than 94. Ten new records increased the number of counties reporting the species. Some of the greatest or most interesting increases in county totals were for the Hooded Merganser (up 4), Bald Eagle (up 4), Sandhill Crane (up 4), Carolina Wren (up 5), American Pipit (up 4), Henslow's Sparrow (up 3), and Blue Grosbeak (up 3). Nineteen new records increased the total number of birds reported for those species in a single count year. Some of the greatest or most interesting increases (followed by the % increase) were for the Canada Goose (up 959 birds, +5%), Hooded Merganser (up 9 birds, + 8%), American White Pelican (up 51 birds, +9%), Bald Eagle (up 12 birds, +12%), Sandhill Crane (up 32 birds, +18%), Solitary Sandpiper (up 371 birds, +31%), Caspian Tern (up 208 birds, +13%), Eurasian Collared-Dove (up 18 birds, +12%), Monk Parakeet (up 63 birds, +94%), Blue-gray Gnatcatcher (up 314 birds, +9%), Chipping Sparrow (up 1247 birds, +20%), Vesper Sparrow (up 266 birds, +74%), Savannah Sparrow (up 186 birds, +13%), Le Conte's Sparrow (up 6 birds, +86%), and Whitecrowned Sparrow (up 2816 birds, +46%). Nine new records increased the total number of birds reported for those species in a single county. Some of the largest or most interesting increases were for the Greater Yellowlegs (up 119 birds, Fulton County), Caspian Tern (up 236 birds, Cook County), Eurasian Collared-Dove (up 18 birds, Montgomery County), Barred Owl (up 7 birds, Knox County), Chipping

Sparrow (up 432 birds, Winnebago County), Vesper Sparrow (up 85 birds, Winnebago County), and Savannah Sparrow (up 140 birds, Cook County).

Species Comments: 1) As noted by the numbers previously mentioned, this was an excellent year for both the migrant and resident sparrows; in addition to the grassland sparrows, note the good numbers for several other grassland species such as meadowlarks, Dickcissels and Bobolinks (the latter two of which were just arriving in the state by count date). 2) For some species, such as the Hooded Merganser, American White Pelican, Bald

Eagle, Cooper's Hawk, Sandhill Crane, Eurasian Collared-Dove, Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, Northern Parula, Chipping Sparrow, Savannah Sparrow and Eurasian Tree Sparrow, this was the second, and in some cases the third, consecutive year for which a new high count was established. 3) This is the first year in the

count's 34-year history that nary a Gray Partridge was found; the species had been just barely hanging in there in recent years, so the inevitable was not unexpected. Perhaps they'll be rediscovered again next year. 4) Several counties (including DuPage) missed the Purple Martin this year; Calhoun,

with 414 birds, was this year's county high, and Pike County—with Griggsville, the Purple Martin capital of the world reporting only 44 birds. 5) Cook, Lake, other northeastern counties and a few east-central counties (i.e. McLean, Piatt and Macon) reported fairly good numbers of migrant warblers; however,

these species were not well-represented in most other parts of the state. 5) Note the similarities in numbers of Ring-billed Gulls in Cook County in 2004 (12,907 birds) and 2005 (12,906 birds) and Common Terns in Lake County in 2004 (173 birds) and 2005 (172 birds) – any suggestions on what

may have happened to those two birds? 6) In DuPage County, Bob Fisher indicated that this was the lowest total ever for crows since participation in the Spring Bird Count began (back in 1973), and that there were only 8 observers then in contrast to 108 this year. In regards to the entire state, and noted earlier in this report, the species' current status statewide, at least according to Spring Bird Count numbers, is about 45% of the peak count (set back in 1991), and, that 2005 numbers suggest a once-again increasing population. 7) It's great to welcome the Swainson's Warbler back to the count totals after a lengthy absence (although it was most likely present on the count two years ago in Jackson County); this year it was found in Wabash County - as an "overmigrant", overshooting its best-known nesting locations. 8) The banded male Painted Bunting at East St. Louis had returned to the nesting

site again, but, alas, could not be found on count day. 9) The hoped-for Scissor-tailed Flycatchers that have been nesting near the Big Muddy River on the Union/Jackson County line were not located this year; however, an isolated individual was found in Johnson County. 10) And finally, since no new species were added to the statewide accumulative total this year, that total remains at 324.

Species Missed As mentioned above, two known misses were the Gray Partridge and Painted Bunting. A few other "would-have", "could-have" or "should-have" beens include a scoter, the White-faced Ibis (which was apparently present in St. Clair County), Black-necked Stilt, American Avocet, and Shorteared Owl. Of course, the list could go on-and-on if we considered all the species that have ever been reported on past counts.

Table 8 provides all the County Statistics. The columns are: 1) the county name; 2) the AREA (1, 2, 3 or 4) of the state in which the county occurs; 3) the number of confirmed species identified; 4) the number of countable birds reported; 5) the number of participating birders in the county; 6) the number of parties counting birds; 7) the earliest and latest birding times (in the 24hour system with owling hours before and/or after daylight hours marked with an asterisk "*"); 8) the number of party miles walked (W) and driven (D); 9) the number of party hours walked (W) and driven (D); and 10) the 2005 county compiler/coordinator [or, if in brackets, the person last known to be responsible for being the county compiler/coordinator].

For a handful of counties, the number of species listed in Table 8 may be one or two fewer than originally submitted because the docu-



Field Notes

2005 Spring Migration

The first week of February brought with it the onslaught of unseasonably warm air and strong southerly winds which sparked the beginning of the 2005 spring migration. During this period, observers in the southern half of the state noted large movements of waterfowl. Migrant flocks of Snow Geese were prominent sights as countless thousands spanned for miles and miles across the sky. Territorial Red-winged Blackbirds became obvious as they returned to their roadside niches. Two separate reports of American Pipits on 5 and 6 February in Fayette and Clinton Counties (respectively) and 10 Western Meadowlarks on 6 February in Clinton County were exceptionally early. By mid-February, small numbers of American White Pelicans and Sandhill Cranes started passing through the state. Despite several days of 50-degree temperatures in the Chicago area, few migrants were noted in northern Illinois by the end of February; these included 10 species of waterfowl, 65 American White Pelicans, nine Sandhill Cranes, one Horned Lark, one American Robin, and one Song Sparrow.

Late February through March seems to be the developing migratory period for Trumpeter Swans moving through Illinois to their Wisconsin and other breeding areas. A record count of this species was made of birds, which were in a flooded field along a central Illinois section of an interstate highway.

Temperatures during March were largely below normal statewide with only a few warm spells to encourage movement. Some migrants were noted with the passage of a warm front on 6 March, but migration was rather uneventful until 29-30 March when a major warm front bolstered temperatures statewide into the upper 70s. Precipitation for March was about an inch below normal, which would become a trend in months to follow.

The best report for early March was of an adult male KING EIDER at Jackson Park on 3 March. A male EURASIAN WIGEON at Shabbona Lake State Park afforded looks to several observers from 19-24 March. Other impressive waterfowl reports were of 8,000 Green-winged Teal at Carlyle Lake and more than 14,000 Canvasbacks on the Mississippi River, providing the highest count for this species in recent years. Jackson Park tallied its earliest American Bittern and Caspian Tern on 30 March. Sandhill Crane migration peaked during mid-March with multiple reports from central Illinois where this species remains

quite rare. A record high spring count of 8 Northern Saw-whet Owls was part of a group of at least 10 that overwintered at Carlyle Lake. Three Purple Martins observed in Du Page County on 18 March were record early for northern Illinois and earliest for this spring's migration. A Sedge Wren found singing on 26 March in Jasper County constitutes the earliest arrival for this species in Illinois. Six species of warblers were reported in Illinois by the end of March, the most interesting being a record-early Palm Warbler on 25 March and an "Audubon's" Yellow-rumped Warbler remaining in Chicago 19-29 March. Several other notable species reported in March include two inland Red-throated Loons, three Eared Grebes, two Northern Goshawks, one immature Golden Eagle, one Harris's Sparrow, 15 Snow Buntings, and four Common Redpolls.

Observers statewide experienced an extremely poor migration in terms of number and diversity of migrants through April. Many species were reported to be in their lowest numbers ever, while several others were reported in below-average numbers. Yellow-bellied Sapsucker, Northern Flicker, both kinglets, Hermit Thrush, Fox Sparrow, and Rusty Blackbird were among those species with greatly reduced numbers. Even with the passage of several strong warm fronts, yielding favorable winds, migration was low in volume. The period of 3-6 April provided the first encouraging wave of migratory conditions with strong winds and temperatures in the upper 70s that brought record early Prothonotary Warblers to far southern Illinois and Chicago on 4 and 5 April (respectively). Systems passing through the state in mid-April brought about a few record early arrivals. Temperatures during 16-20 April lingered in the low 80s marking the warmest period of the month, but consecutive cold fronts in the latter third of April forced temperatures down into the 50s and migration into torpor.

Considering the abysmal showing of migrants in April, there was a surprisingly nice array of rarities discovered in the state. The most significant discoveries included a rather metropolitan PURPLE GALLINULE found in a rural backyard in Champaign County, two Whimbrels and a RUFF in Johnson County, a single BEWICK'S WREN in Clinton County, and a long-staying GREAT-TAILED GRACKLE that provided many their first opportunity to view this species in the state. Illinois' first "SUTTON'S" WARBLER,

a hybrid between Northern Parula and Yellow-throated Warbler, was an extraordinary find in northern Illinois. This individual was well documented during its stay at the Fabyan Forest Preserve from 26 April through 16 May, providing one of the few detailed records available anywhere for this extremely rare hybrid. Other merit-worthy reports in April consisted of one Pacific Loon, one Red-necked Grebe, two additional Eared Grebes (bringing the total to five for the spring), a White-faced Ibis, an extralimital Black Vulture in Sangamon County, and two extralimital reports of Mississippi Kites, both in Du Page County.

Temperatures during May showed a fair amount of variability. The month started off with temperatures well below normal, but leveled out to about average by its third week. The initial cold spell was countered with warm air from the south yielding a strong push of migrants just in time for the statewide Spring Bird Count on 7 May. Weather conditions during the first week of May allowed many migrants stalled by cold, northerly winds to finally make their way north. Yellow Rail, BLACK RAIL, a second Champaign County PURPLE GALLINULE, WHITE-WINGED DOVE, SWAINSON'S WARBLER, and Scissortailed Flycatcher were among the rarest of species noted in this first wave. Western Kingbirds and a banded male PAINTED BUNTING returned to their traditional nesting sites from 6-8 May. Up to 24 species of warblers were listed as arriving in northern Illinois through the first week of May. Several observers noted a good passage of migrants through the period 17-19 May, which coincided with a moderate warm front. Certainly the highlight of this spring's migration was the state's first FORK-TAILED FLYCATCHER discovered in Cook County on 16 May. An ASH-THROATED FLYCATCHER was reported the very next day in Du Page County. By mid-May, 34 species of shorebird had been recorded in the state, and impressive counts were reported from Carlyle Lake through the end of the season for Black-bellied Plover, Semipalmated Plover, Ruddy Turnstone, Sanderling, Semipalmated Sandpiper, and Dunlin. Stagnant weather conditions were encountered during the last third of May, but there was plenty of action to keep birders occupied. A MOTTLED DUCK was reported from Horseshoe Lake in Madison County on 28-30 May. If accepted, this would provide the second record for this species in Illinois. The Sangamon County Mottled Duck, first discovered on 21 May 2004, was reported again this spring and viewed up to 24 May. It was a good spring for Ibises as there were two Glossy and five White-faced reported by the end of May as well as an additional Glossy Ibis 4 June. An astonishing state high count of 198 Mississippi Kites was tallied in southern Illinois on 27 May.

Perhaps a result of the static weather in late May, migration continued along the Lake Michigan shoreline far into June with at least 60 species noted as June departures. The most noteworthy of the late migrants include a Clay-colored Sparrow on 10 June; a Blue-winged Warbler on 12 June; a Least Flycatcher on 14 June; a Bobolink on 16 June; and Blue Jays at two sites, two Red-eyed Vireos, a singing Nashville Warbler, and a Baltimore Oriole on 22 June.

Our sincere thanks are extended to the following observers, who supplied all the data included in this

summary. These observers are credited by their initials following each record. An innovation in this report is that we have used three-initial citation forms whenever available, as we have found that the use of three initials can provide remarkably stable and unique citation forms over time. Indeed, this summary is the first in the modern Illinois journals that has not required any specially defined observer citation forms. As in previous reports, the sequencing of observers below is based on alphabetization of last and first/middle initials rather than on alphabetization of last names: Cindy M. Alberico, Douglas C.
