Spring Memories

One early May day last year, while sitting on my screened-in porch, I heard the distinctive song of a Mourning Warbler, a bird I had never seen in my backyard. I bounded outside stumbling over bird food and other paraphernalia to find the male in my honeysuckle, singing away, displaying his black bib.

I went outside and watched it fly to my next-door neighbor's black walnut where it hummed a few more bars, then ducked into her white fir. I rounded up two witnesses to confirm this sighting. But I remain today incredulous, thinking it was all a dream.

Two Clay-colored Sparrows also spent a half an hour feeding on my front lawn last spring. So I added three incredible species to my backyard bird list.

The spring of 1996, however, was bittersweet. Many small insect-eating birds perished unable to find food due to the low insect count and incredibly cold weather. The Cerulean Warbler my sister discovered on the ground in a parking lot at a forest preserve did not look like it would survive the spring.

I'm not sure if I want to experience another spring like that one.

Perhaps it's best to savor the memories by reading the stories in this issue about the spring that Paul Clyne said would never end.

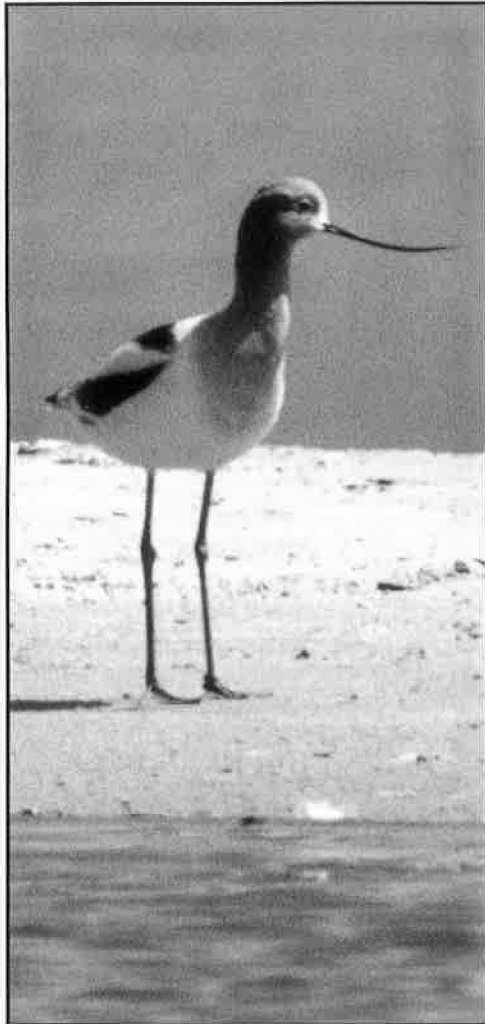

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Regional Trends and Annual Variations in the Spring Arrival of Midwestern Birds

Most regional ornithological journals that publish distributional data tend to emphasize rare sightings and extreme dates of occurrences. Many birders, however, would also benefit from knowing when common migrants are expected to appear. To be most useful such a bird calendar should be based on long-term averages to minimize the distortions of occasional extreme seasons. Furthermore, a single calendar can only apply to a particular geographic locality since seasonal advances of migrating birds show both latitudinal and longitudinal timing differences. From our migration field notes for 23 years in eastern Illinois and 42 years in eastern Indiana together with published records covering 15 years in western Illinois (Craig and Franks 1987) and 20 years in southern Wisconsin (Lange 1986), we have constructed a migration calendar for this midwestern region that depicts gradients of initial spring appearances along both north-south and east-west axes. Included are 91 species for which adequate yearly records were available. Among those listed we have also singled out the 20 species that statistically exhibited the least annual variability in recorded arrivals at our own 2 sites.

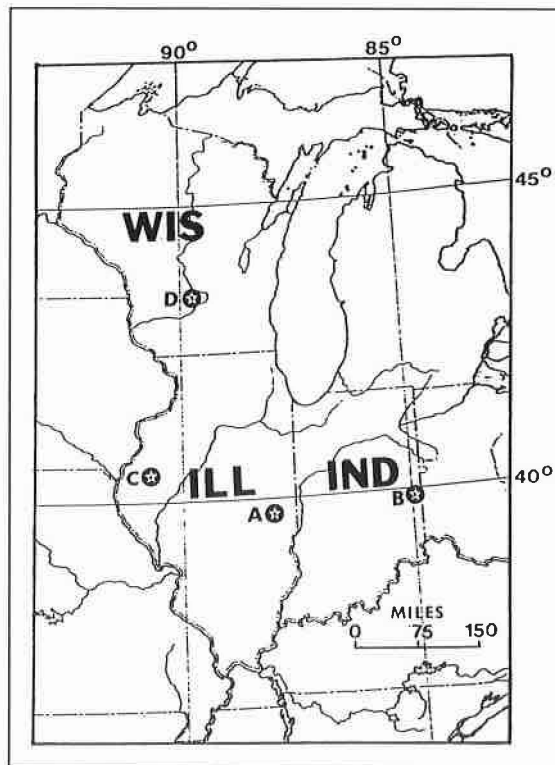


Figure 1. Migration data centers for E Illinois at (A) Charleston, E Indiana at (B) Richmond, W Illinois at Macomb and S Wisconsin at (D) Baraboo.

Several observers have reported on migratory progress in the Midwest in the past. Cooke (1888, 1915) compiled spring arrival sightings from numerous observers and later portrayed isochronal lines of advance for selected species, but his sampling years, however, were few or unreported. Other long-term migration studies in Illinois (Smith 1930), Connecticut (Saunders 1959) and Montana (Weydemeyer 1973) gave average and extreme dates for spring migrants, but none provided multi-site comparisons nor statistical tests of annual variability.

Study Areas and Methods

Our primary migration data were collected from 1965 to 1987 in eastern Illinois in Coles County near Charleston and from 1946 to 1987 in eastern Indiana in northern Union County and all of Wayne County near Richmond. We have included comparable data from western Illinois (Craig and Franks 1987) which cover a 22-county area around Macomb in McDonough County, 1969-1983, and from southern Wisconsin (Lange 1986) in Sauk County near Baraboo and Devil's Lake State Park, 1966-1985 (Figure 1).

Meadowlark

In this paper, migrant species were included only if their recorded arrival dates constituted more than or equal to 50% of the study years at the site. Minimum sample size (n) was 12 years for eastern (E) Illinois arrivals, 21 years for eastern (E) Indiana, 8 years for species from western (W) Illinois tables and 10 years for southern (S) Wisconsin arrivals. A few selected species did not occur at the Wisconsin site and we eliminated some species whose partial wintering populations made spring transient movements difficult to recognize (i.e., Mallards, American Robins, Eastern Meadowlarks). Often aided by students and colleagues, our observations were made

yearly without contacting each other about the progress of migration. We calculated median dates as average arrivals to minimize the skewing effect of extreme records and to match the 2 published sources. We adopted Craig and Franks' (1987) method of using the earlier arrival date of a pair when the calculated median fell between 2 consecutive dates for samples involving an even number of years. From our own arrival records we also computed means and standard errors as measures of annual variability involving unequal sample sizes.

2 Wisconsin locations, Leopold and Jones (1947) applied Hopkins' (1918) Bioclimatic Law, a phenological rule-of-thumb. This rule states that in spring, periodic biological events in North America average 4 days later for each 1° of latitude northward, 5° of longitude eastward and 400 feet (121.92m) of elevation upward. To test the law's validity for predicting migratory behavior, we used Charleston (39°30'N, 88°11'W, 209m elev.) as our E Illinois reference point and calculated that the typical migrant should arrive 2.1 days later in W Illinois at Macomb (40°29'N, 90°40'W, 213 m elev.), 6.9 days later in E Indiana at Richmond (39°50'N, 84°51'W, 299 m elev.) and 16.1 days

Regional Trends

In order to compare regional differences in seasonal avian activity at

later in S Wisconsin at Baraboo (43°27'N, 89°45'W, 272 m elev.). Assuming that spring migrants follow mainly a south-to-north route and applying only the latitudinal component of the law, expected deviations at the latter 3 sites relative to E Illinois would be 3.9, 1.3, and 15.8 days later. As shown in the included tables, a few species approximated these 2 sets of theoretical values but no species matched them.

On average our earliest migrants appeared in late February with the momentum of new arrivals increasing by mid-March (Table 1). As expected, most showed a south-to-north trend, recorded first in E Illinois followed by E Indiana or W Illinois and often weeks later in S Wisconsin. However, some species, especially waterbirds, exhibited a definite west-to-east (W) trend across Illinois and Indiana that exceeded a 4-day span before again reaching S Wisconsin much later. In Graber's (1968) radar surveys across central Illinois the dominant vector for migrating waves of mixed species was also east of north. We attribute this trend in part to early warm fronts with tailwinds arriving from the southwest and affecting the initial availability of open water. Unfortunately we lack documentation for annual spring thaw dates at the 4 sites. Only the Field Sparrow demonstrated a uniform (U) trend longitudinally, reaching the 3 Illinois-Indiana sites within a 4-day period. Comments about trendless (-) and sometimes anomalous deviations appear later. Actual median deviations at all

3 sites exceeded Bioclimatic Law expectations.

The bulk of migrant species first reached Illinois and Indiana in April with a rush of first arrivals during the last week (Table 2). For some

the trend was again most directly south-to-north (S) with an increasing percent arriving almost uniformly (U) within a 4-day span at the 3 southerly sites. More surprising were the 10 species that displayed an east-to-west

(E) gradient from Indiana across Illinois as they proceeded toward Wisconsin. This westward lag suggests a possible southeastern wintering ground. All occur in Florida (Sprunt 1954) and the West Indies (Bond 1985) and most were frequent casualties at Florida TV towers (Taylor and Anderson 1973, Crawford 1980). During April the latitudinal deviations in composite median arrivals diminished considerably as waves of new migrants sped northward.

Finally the last group of migrants appeared in E Illinois in early May (Table 3) and 12 of the 24 were recorded almost simultaneously (U) in both W Illinois and E Indiana. Half had also reached S Wisconsin within a week, a sharp contrast to the 4-to 6-week delays during early spring. Again several species apparently followed diagonal tracks (E or W) across the region. As for certain trendless (-) disparities here and in previous tables, we cite Stevenson's (1957) view that common species are more likely to have earlier recorded arrival dates than rarer ones. The Orange-crowned Warbler was infrequently detected in E Indiana where its median arrival date was later than in S Wisconsin. Because Common Loons, Louisiana Waterthrushes, Ovenbirds, and Least Flycatchers also appeared in S Wisconsin before they were encountered farther south in W Illinois, perhaps they are rare migrants at the latter site and therefore more easily overlooked. These confusing dates as well as the apparent late arrivals in E Illinois of the Brown-headed

Cowbird, Veery, Chestnut-sided Warbler, Wilson's Warbler, and Canada Warbler might also have resulted from inadequate coverage of preferred habitats at arrival times.

As the 3 groups of early, middle and late migrants arrived they showed progressive decreases in composite deviations from E Illinois to the 3 other sites (W Illinois: +3.3, +2.6, +0.2; E Indiana: +8.1, +0.5, -0.9; S Wisconsin: +25.5, +8.3, +6.2).

These reductions strongly indicate

that factors serving to delay the migratory advance in late winter and

early spring are much less operative as the season advances, allowing a

broad avian front of mixed species to accelerate rapidly toward their destinations.

Annual Variations

Given the popular media accounts of the swallows returning to Capistrano Mission in California on precisely 19 March each year and the reappearance without fail of the "buzzards" at Hinckley, Ohio 4 days earlier, to what extent can our long-term averages enable us to predict accurately

the arrivals of various species as another spring migration approaches? Simply stated, such precision in bird behavior is beyond reality with key environmental factors, themselves subject to considerable variability. Nevertheless, local arrivals of nearly all migratory species do exhibit a nonrandom periodicity from year to year but in varying degrees. Among all spring arrivals at our 2 primary sites, the 10 most consistent species all had mean arrival dates in late April or early May except for the Chimney Swift (Table 4). Most of these species winter mainly in the tropics (Peterson 1980) and thus would be far less influenced by temperate region weather changes than would earlier migrating species that winter in the southern U.S. or northern Mexico. Noting this tendency for early, short-distance migrants to fluctuate more in their northward schedule, Dorst (1963) contrasted the early weather group (*Wettersvogel*) with the later instinctive group (*Insinktvogel*). The Chimney Swift (Table 4), our candidate for midwestern "swallow" or "buzzard", was also reported by Cooke (1908) to be the most regular migrant based on "four hundred thousand notes on bird migration". In Wisconsin its arrival dates produced the lowest correlation ($r = -0.064$) with annual variations in average temperatures and thus it was least likely to vary yearly (Temple and Cary 1987). These authors also found low arrival correlations with spring temperatures for the Magnolia Warbler, and, in another Wisconsin study (Leopold and Jones 1947), the Rose-breasted Grosbeak was most consistent in a list of 40 spring arrivals that did not include swifts or warblers. Ranking 11 through 20 at our combined sites and only slightly more variable were the Chestnut-sided Warbler, Red-eyed Vireo,

Warbling Vireo, Palm Warbler, Bay-breasted Warbler, Orchard Oriole,

Cliff Swallow and Turkey Vulture were very unpredictable harbingers of spring with standard errors of 6.9 and 5.7 respectively.

Yellow Warbler, Common Nighthawk, American Redstart, and Eastern Kingbird. These too were all late April or May migrants. Conversely,

The Chimney Swift also led all species in having the narrowest range of arrival dates (Table 4) with the greater range of days in Indiana related to the larger number of years in the sample. Despite its usual arrival regularity, in 1947 this species appeared in E Indiana on 5 April, in Toronto, Canada on 7 April, 32 days earlier than its 27-year mean (Gunn and Crocker 1951), and in Connecticut on 12 April, 16 days before its 39-year average (Saunders 1959). Admittedly the recording of annual migration dates lacks precision. Variations in frequency of field observations, weather conditions, levels of avian activity, food availability,

and vegetative development have no doubt affected our degree of success in detecting first arrivals each spring. Despite these immeasurable factors, we feel confident that long-term median dates provide valid information about regional trends and annual variations among midwestern migrants.

Statistical Information

In Tables 1-3 each median arrival represents the middle recorded date in a chronological sequence and is less affected by occasional extreme dates or chance clusters than either an arithmetic mean or mode. The actual average median difference [in place of deviation] is the mean of the species differences

[dev] at each of the 3 sites when compared with E Illinois while the theoretical average is calculated from Hopkins Bioclimatic Law by comparing the geographic location of each site with E Illinois.

In Table 4, each mean arrival date is nearly identical to the median date reported earlier. The standard error (SE) is an estimate of the variability of each sample mean. The mean date plus or minus 1 standard error could be expected to include 68 percent of all other mean dates for that species at the site and doubling the SE would increase to 95 percent the likelihood that such means would fall within this expanded interval. The SE indicates nothing about the expected arrival date in any single

year. The reported ranges in Table 4 represent the actual number of days between earliest and latest arrival dates for which we have records.

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We are grateful to dozens of former students and colleagues whose field notes added significantly to our own. Special thanks to W. H. 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Illinois' Incredible 1996 Spring Migration

The spring of 1996 was best described by one birder's simple phrase, "sweet, but sad." Spring migration was sweet in so far as it brought in large numbers of birds and concentrated them in a few areas, producing the kind of high numbers of birds not seen before by new birders. Meanwhile, veteran birders reported it as one of the best fallouts they have witnessed. Many species arrived late and left slowly, giving unparalleled opportunities for long-term observance of migrants.

But extremely high mortality of migrants, caused partly by unseasonably cold weather and a related slowdown in insect production, overshadowed the excitement birders felt statewide. The spring 1996 season, birders tallied a remarkable 35 documentable birds including a Green-tailed Towhee and Swainson's Warbler, as well as a huge death toll of famished passerines.

The extreme wind and weather created the conditions that caused the bittersweet spring of 1996.

Chicago birder Paul Clyne kept track of the weather patterns, begin-

ning with near-record low temperatures in early March and the heaviest snowfall of the season in Chicago on 6 March, followed by a gradual warming trend which was abruptly cut off by northeasterly hurricane-force winds on the first day of spring. A strong southwesterly front on 24 March preceded a heavy reverse migration along Chicago's lakefront. March and April were both fairly dry in Illinois while drought conditions persisted in the west. April was dominated by fronts from the north, interrupted by four strong southwesterlies. Some of the birds bottling up in the south came through the state on the wave of the last of these winds, which gave way to a stationary cold front from 26 April onward. Clyne's records show that the Arctic front remained until 8 May as a very warm high pressure system moved from the south toward Chicago. On 9 May, the warm front brought in a huge fallout of stranded birds. The warm front from the south banged up against the cold front just north of Chicago, dumping birds south of the collision line.

At 10 a.m. on 10 May, the wind shifted and howled out of the north, dropping the temperature 20 degrees F. in minutes and bringing pouring rain. Clyne observed birds deserting

the Chicago lakefront that morning, moving west into suburban gardens and forest preserves, seeking food. Most trees on the Lake Michigan shoreline were still in bud on this date and insect production was almost non-existent. Overnight temperatures on 11 May plummeted to a record 34 degrees F., with wind chills at about 15 degrees F. The 12th of May dawned dismally for many birds which were forced to the ground in search of insects. Observers from central and northern Illinois reported canopy-dwelling birds foraging frantically on the ground. Birds could be found on any available patch of grass almost everywhere and even in the middle of roads, where many were killed by cars.

Mike Baum awoke at 3:30 a.m. on 12 May to hear hundreds of migrants from his deck in Knox County in western Illinois. It would be one of the best birding days he ever had. He went birding at dawn and by 9:30 a.m., had amassed an astonishing 122 species. Baum immediately went into Big Day mode. With 161 species, he smashed the previous Knox County Big Day record of 138, minus the usual preliminary scouting and midnight start time. Of the total, 102 were passerines including Knox County's second Sharp-tailed Sparrow. Baum said 40 Gray-cheeked Thrushes and 35 Swainson's Thrushes were at Green Oaks Nature Preserve, which usually has only

four or five of each species in one day. One small wetland held 45 Marsh Wrens, exceeding by nine-fold the typical number seen at this spot.

David B. Johnson found warblers all over Arlington Heights during the same period. The northern Cook County suburb has many mature deciduous trees, but most birds foraged on the ground. Johnson saw 12 species of warblers on the ground, including a Yellow-throated Warbler in the middle of an intersection on one of the town's main streets. The situation was one of those terrible joys of birding. What was good for birders was not necessarily good for the birds. Birders statewide reported desperate birds, Magnolia Warblers, Eastern Bluebirds, and Indigo Buntings vying for seeds at feeders and insectivorous birds fighting for fruit intended for orioles. I laid out fruit for starving birds in Water Tower Park in downtown Chicago for days after 11 May, hoping to keep a few alive long enough for insect production to start. Most of the hundreds of birds unfortunate enough to land on 11 May in this half-block long park in the middle of a concrete canyon were too weak to fly back out and many perished, including four Soras. Several birds died in my hands. An Ovenbird nearly snatched a piece of orange from my hand on 12 May and I observed many other insectivores, such as Black-and-white Warbler, Mourning Warbler, Connecticut Warbler, and Red-eyed Vireo on the ground, feeding on fruit, sandwich bread, and seeds.

Record Number of Collected Dead Birds at McCormick Place

Ironically, one of the better gauges of the quality of a migration season is the quantity of dead birds collected at McCormick Place in Chicago's mid-lakefront area by Dr. David Willard, manager of the Bird Collection at the Field Museum of

Natural History. Willard has been analyzing the number and proportion of bird species killed on the plate glass windows of McCormick Place for 18 years. "It was a very interesting and strange spring migration. I have never seen such a high mortality rate since we began monitoring at McCormick Place," Willard said.

The numbers of dead birds collected from McCormick Place were low to normal during the early part of spring 1996, until the massive migration movement in mid-May. Numbers overall were low until 10 May when huge numbers of warblers, such as Ovenbirds and Nashvilles, were found at the base of the building. McCormick Place's death toll is generally highest among woodland birds, especially sparrows and thrushes, said Willard. But unprecedented numbers of warblers were collected this year, including almost as many Chestnut-sided Warblers found in two days as in the whole of the previous 18 years.

Fall migration usually produces higher numbers than spring of dead birds collected by the Museum. They typically collect between 600 and 700 birds during spring. But the spring of 1996, Museum staff collected double that - about 1,200 individuals of 92 species. The species count was also abnormally high for spring collection at McCormick Place.

Willard said one of his colleagues was walking his dog along Montrose Beach on 9 May, when he noticed thousands of tiny bodies washed up by the surf. The Field Museum staff began to collect beach kills and gathered well over 2,000 birds. In late May, large numbers of Swamp and White-throated sparrows seem to have been caught out over the lake and drowned. House Wrens, vireos, many warbler species, Blue-gray Gnatcatchers, two Yellow Rails, an Orchard Oriole, a Summer Tanager, and a King Rail were gathered from the water. Many bodies were so badly deteriorated that the Museum is still

working on identifying them to species. Willard said the winds are usually from the west during spring in Chicago which would tend to carry dead birds away from the city beaches. But this year, the winds were more often from the east and blew the death toll into Chicago.

"It could be mind-boggling if you think about what we found in Illinois and add it to what was happening in Michigan and Indiana," said Willard. "We don't know the effects now on the fall migration or for subsequent years, but if you do have huge flights where high numbers of birds of the same species drowned or were otherwise killed, it could affect the total population of the species, at least for some period of time."

The top ten species found dead at McCormick Place the spring of 1996 in descending order include Song Sparrow, Swamp Sparrow, Ovenbird, Common Yellowthroat, White-throated Sparrow, Magnolia Warbler, Tennessee Warbler, European Starling, Dark-eyed Junco, and Veery.

Record Dates for Late Migrants

Clyne's spring weather records show the cold front persisting until 17 May, when a warm front finally moved into Chicago. Many new migrants were downed by the fog created as the warm front hit the cold air stuck over northern Illinois. The fog lifted in Jackson Park by 8:30 a.m. that day, taking many birds with it, but Clyne said some high concentrations of birds remained, particularly Least Flycatcher and Veery. May 1996 was nearly the wettest recorded and cool, rainy weather continued to dominate the northern half of the state through the end of the month. June brought more moderate, typical temperatures, with wetter-than-usual conditions, which may have induced many migrants to stay well beyond their usual departure times to recu-

perate and feed. Clyne's Jackson Park records show an amazing record 222 species recorded by 19 June, only three of which were confined to the period between January and February. Record high spring totals over 17 years of observations for 49 species were recorded. About one-third

of the new high counts were significant, up six times over previous spring totals, said Clyne. No species recorded from Jackson Park sightings showed significant declines.

But many species were very late arriving in Chicago and other Illinois regions, and were also slow to leave for their breeding grounds. For example, on 8 June, Michael Hogg and David Brenner counted over 200 corpses on a half-mile stretch of beach at Illinois Beach State Park, including an American Bittern, a Northern Mockingbird, seven Yellow-breasted Chats, and eight species of warblers.

Clyne's detailed records for Chicago show that 57 species set record late departure dates - approximately 25% of all migrant species observed. Based on average departure dates calculated over 16 years, the average departure date for 139 species was eight days later than normal. Migration of several species which are typi-

cally gone from the Chicago area by mid-June was still steadily viewed into July in Jackson Park, including Eastern Wood-Pewee, Blue Jay, Cedar Waxwing, and Red-eyed Vireo. Other surprisingly late sightings in the Jackson Park area included Greater White-fronted Goose (12 May), Great Black-backed Gull (3 on 30 May), Veery (20 June), Northern Mockingbird (16 June), and White-crowned Sparrow (25 June). A Greater White-fronted Goose was reported at McKee Marsh in DuPage County 17 May, according to the Chicago Audubon Society's Rare Bird Alert.



Remarkable Rarities

The Illinois Ornithological Records Committee has its hands full reviewing an incredible 35 documentable birds. In addition, large numbers of some uncommon species made the season very exciting for birders. Tricolored Herons (*Egretta tricolor*) made a grand appearance all around the state, with seven sightings recorded, representing Illinois' 14th through 21st spring records (Bohlen 1989). Most Tricoloreds are recorded in spring, but there is usually just one bird per season and usually in the Lake Calumet region of Chicago or in East St. Louis (Bohlen 1989, Mlodinow 1984). There hasn't been a spring Tricolored sighting in the state since 1990 (American Birds 1990-1995). Two individuals flew over Montrose Harbor in

Chicago within two days of each other, one stayed for 10 days at Crabtree Nature Center in Cook County, and the remaining birds were single sightings in St. Clair, Piatt, and Williamson counties downstate.

Other marsh stalkers included the very rare vagrant Glossy Ibis (*Plegadis falcinellus*) and rare vagrant White-faced Ibis (*Eudocimus albus*) in St. Clair County; several of the latter remained beyond the spring period near East St. Louis. There were at least 15 records this spring of Glossy Ibis, the first since 1993. Little Blue Herons (*Egretta caerulea*) were unusually common in the Chicago area. Six were seen the last week of April and individuals were seen on 3 May and 19 May, according to the Chicago Audubon Society's Rare Bird Alert. The shorebird flight brought unusually high numbers of American Avocets (*Recurvirostra americana*) to the Chicago area in the spring period and in new places. Sixteen Avocets, considered rare migrants in Illinois, were seen at 131st and Will-Cook Road in the Palos area, 12 were in Hyde Park in Chicago on the 55th Street Promontory, and singles were seen on north side beaches. A Whimbrel (*Numenius phaeopus*) was seen in Jackson County 27 May, only the fourth record for the southern part of the state (Robinson 1996).

Swainson's Warbler

Among many exciting spring warbler sightings, one Chicago visitor really stands out. A Swainson's Warbler (*Limnothlypis swainsonii*) was a much-observed wonder on Jackson Park's Wooded Island 27 April. The bird was discovered by William Moskoff and Jeffrey and Kristin Sundberg and provided many birders with an unexpected lifer. This very rare vagrant in the northern part of the state was probably an overmigrant (Bohlen 1989). The find was made even more exciting by the fact that IOS members at the Annual Meeting

downstate the previous weekend stood in the spot where Swainson's Warblers once nested in southern Illinois, without seeing the bird. This state-endangered species may be extirpated as part of the breeding avifauna in Illinois. It can be recognized by its long spiky bill, conspicuous pale eyebrow beneath a brown crown, darkeye-line, and brownish olive back, with light underparts.

Black-headed Grosbeak

Bob and Karen Fisher were birding on their 3.5-acre property in Downers Grove in Cook County on 10 May, cataloging the tremendous fallout of birds lingering from the day before. While watching a Northern Parula Warbler feeding in a maple tree, Bob saw a larger bird, which had a beak the size and shape of a grosbeak. With the bird facing him in bright sunlight, its black head and russet/orange breast, which paled to yellow on the belly, were very clear. The bird had no streaking as might be expected in a female Rose-breasted Grosbeak (*Physecticus ludovicianus*), so Bob determined it to be a Black-headed Grosbeak (*P. melanocephalus*), a rare vagrant in the state (Bohlen 1989). After 30 seconds, the bird flew straight west out of sight, not to be relocated by Bob's disappointed wife. The Fishers watched for days as more than 20 Rose-breasted Grosbeaks visited their feeders without their western cousin. This sighting is the tenth Illinois state record (Bohlen 1989). Most have been seen in winter.

Lazuli Bunting

A Lazuli Bunting (*Passerina amoena*) was seen in the spring of 1996, Illinois' second record and first spring sighting (Bohlen 1989). David Bohlen observed one individual in Springfield 7 May. A male Lazuli Bunting can be separated from a male

Indigo Bunting (*P. cyanea*) by its cinnamon sides and white wingbars. Separating females is more difficult, and a possible second occurrence of this species the spring of 1996, a female bird, was not accepted by the Illinois Ornithological Records Committee.

Green-tailed Towhee

Another enviable backyard bird was seen by Arlene Brei in Poplar Grove in Boone County 21 May. Brei looked through the pouring rain at a drenched bird in her yard and had no idea what she was seeing. She thought of hybrids, a weird kind of thrush, a sparrow, perhaps. Calls to her friend, Gene Simrl, president of a Beloit, Wisconsin birding club, and the nearby Syberson Nature Center also proved fruitless. On 22 May, Brei awoke at 7:15 a.m. to a strange song she had never heard before. The bird was finally in clear light, and dry. Brei checked all the references again and stopped dead at a picture of a Green-tailed Towhee (*Pipilo chlorus*) in her father's 1923 edition of Chester Reed's "Land Birds East of the Rockies." Peterson's "Eastern Birds" showed a head shot of this western towhee and Brei knew she had the bird's identity. When she called Syberson Nature Center back to hesitantly offer her identification, the naturalists there excitedly told her

that some Rockford birders they had talked to said: "She's describing a Green-tailed Towhee." People began arriving at her house and watched the bird through an open window on 22 May. The bird was too skittish for outdoor viewing. Photos were taken, one by American Birding Association's

President Dan Williams, an IOS member from Rockford. Coffee was drunk and the 14 lucky birders thanked their lucky stars for Illinois' eighth record of a Green-tailed Towhee. Three previous records were from spring, four were from winter. (Bohlen 1989). The bird was gone when Brei woke up the next day.

The Green-tailed Towhee is a rusty-capped western sparrow with green back and tail, black malar stripe, and white throat. It is normally associated with dense shrubs, dense montane chaparral, on dry slopes, in higher valleys and foothills (Rising 1996). This bird is casual or accidental north to British Columbia and east to Nova Scotia, Massachusetts, New York, Georgia, Louisiana, Florida, and other eastern states (Rising 1996).

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The 1996 Illinois Spring Bird Count

This year's early date did not bode well for the 1996 Spring Bird Count. Scouting trips at my latitude (41 degrees) had poor results. Reports came in of large numbers of May migrants in Missouri west of St. Louis, but a series of fronts blocked northward movement. However, many April migrants lingered, and results were better than expected for many locations. As La Salle County compiler John McKee said, "With the early count and late spring, I wasn't expecting to do very well. Amazingly, however, our 174 species is a new count record."

The weather, similar to 1995 but much better than 1994, was generally cool with rain and light wind in some locations.

Despite the cool, late spring, counters recorded a new species high of 269, and a new high count of individuals of 593,680, about 40,000 more than 1995. The number of observers, 1521, was 27 less than in 1995.

Nine counties recorded more than 160 species: Cook 191, Union 186, Will 182, Clinton 177, Lake 176, La Salle 174, Madison 168, Du Page 163, and Knox 162. Thirty-one counties recorded 140 species or more. In contrast, the following Saturday on the nationwide count, two of us recorded 187 species in an Iowa county, plus three more in a neighboring county. Both were along the Mississippi River. These numbers represent an Iowa record, probably due to the big migrant wave on 9 May 1996.

and Caspian and Forster's terns with ties for Common Snipe and Iceland Gull.

Two resident woodpeckers, Downy and Hairy, were recorded at all-time highs. Observers also discovered two lingering winter species, Red-breasted Nuthatch and Winter Wren.

Thrush, vireo, and warbler numbers were generally low, but new highs were established for the species which usually pass through before the Spring Bird Count. They included Hermit Thrush, Northern Parula, and Orange-crowned, Palm, and Black-and-white warblers.

New high counts were set for Blue Grosbeak, American, Tree, Clay-colored, Field, Swamp, and White-throated sparrow, and Dark-eyed Junco.

Purple Finches lingered in record numbers and the Eurasian Tree Sparrow tied the 1982 record and was found in 25 counties. This species is now present in western Rock Island County, and relatively easy to find along the Mississippi River levees.

Five Monk Parakeets were reported from Du Page County and continue to be included as a non-countable "exotic" until the species is accepted by the Illinois Ornithological Records Committee.

Other rarities include Cinnamon Teal (4th count record) in Henry County, Black Rail (6th count record) in Knox County, Black-necked Stilt (3rd count record) in Clinton County, Iceland Gull (6th count record), two in Lake County, and Great Black-backed Gull (3rd count record), four in Cook County and one in Lake County. At least one possible species, the Least Bittern, was not reported this year.

Most Common Species

For the first time in 25 years, Double-crested Cormorant, a state-threatened species, made it to the top 20 list of most common species (Table 4). Palm Warbler was on the list for only the second time, while Red-winged Blackbird continues to rank at the top.

and Caspian and Forster's terns with ties for Common Snipe and Iceland Gull.

Two resident woodpeckers, Downy and Hairy, were recorded at all-time highs. Observers also discovered two lingering winter species, Red-breasted Nuthatch and Winter Wren.

Thrush, vireo, and warbler numbers were generally low, but new highs were established for the species which usually pass through before the Spring Bird Count. They included Hermit Thrush, Northern Parula, and Orange-crowned, Palm, and Black-and-white warblers.

New high counts were set for Blue Grosbeak, American, Tree, Clay-colored, Field, Swamp, and White-throated sparrow, and Dark-eyed Junco.

Purple Finches lingered in record numbers and the Eurasian Tree Sparrow tied the 1982 record and was found in 25 counties. This species is now present in western Rock Island County, and relatively easy to find along the Mississippi River levees.

Five Monk Parakeets were reported from Du Page County and continue to be included as a non-countable "exotic" until the species is accepted by the Illinois Ornithological Records Committee.

Other rarities include Cinnamon Teal (4th count record) in Henry County, Black Rail (6th count record) in Knox County, Black-necked Stilt (3rd count record) in Clinton County, Iceland Gull (6th count record), two in Lake County, and Great Black-backed Gull (3rd count record), four in Cook County and one in Lake County. At least one possible species, the Least Bittern, was not reported this year.

Most Common Species

For the first time in 25 years, Double-crested Cormorant, a state-threatened species, made it to the top 20 list of most common species (Table 4). Palm Warbler was on the list for only the second time, while Red-winged Blackbird continues to rank at the top.

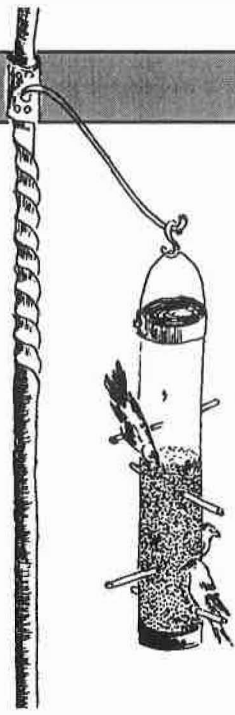

It was the best of times and the worst of times. The spring of 1996. Songbirds literally blanketed the ground desperately trying to stay alive, scouring under every leaf to find the few insects that survived a series of abrupt weather changes, including unusually cold temperatures. Unfortunately, many birds didn't survive. I spotted a Yellow-rumped Warbler in the grass, and picked it up, hoping the warmth of my hands would revive it. But it was too late. Then there was the Ovenbird I discovered frozen solid, at the base of a tree. I received a call from a fisherman who was beside himself with worry: swallows were flying into cars and the road was littered with fluttering bodies. He wanted the road closed and so did I, but no one listened.

Fortunately, many people don't stop stocking their feeders when spring comes. These people were rewarded with spectacular sights. I saw flocks, no exaggeration, flocks of Rose-breasted Grosbeaks fighting for a position on my sunflower feeder.

Backyard Birds in the Amazing 1996 Spring

I'm usually lucky to see *one* each season. White-crowned Sparrows occasionally winter, but now my backyard high count is 20. Then I spotted a tiny sparrow trying to muscle in with the White-crowns. I assumed it was a Chipper but with the help of my trusty binoculars, I noticed a gray nape and a whitish streak down the center of his head as well as an ear patch. It was a Clay-colored Sparrow, a first for my yard. I was so excited, I confided my great find to our Editor, Sheryl DeVore, who was also excited because she had seen two Clay-colored Sparrows on her front lawn in Mundelein, not to mention the Connecticut Warbler she heard singing in her Norway spruce while she was sitting in her living room. The bird flew to her next-door neighbor's honeysuckle, and while she stood on her driveway, she watched it sing for a good 10 minutes. Her sister, Laurel

Ann Kaiser, even had Yellow-headed Blackbirds in her Mundelein backyard in a five-year-old subdivision built atop a cornfield.

The best yard bird I "almost" saw this spring had to be the Green-tailed Towhee (see photo and story on page 122) that showed up in Arlene Brei's yard just east of Rockford. When Brei discovered the bird, she knew it was something she had never seen before. She finally found a match in "Land Birds East of the Rockies", a 1923 guide by Chester R. Reed. Brei begins each morning in spring birding by ear, and usually doesn't get out of bed until she has counted 20 species. She told me the towhee started singing at dawn every day, except the day I was there to try to add it to my list. But I can't complain. I enjoyed Brei's yard filled with bluebirds, grosbeaks, and orioles.

Bob and Karen Fisher, whose Downers Grove backyard list totals 170, supplied a variety of fruits, seeds, and nectars to the migrating birds the spring of 1996. Bananas attracted orioles, finches, chickadees, catbirds, and even a Tennessee Warbler. They counted 22 Rose-breasted Grosbeaks in one day. The acrobatic grosbeaks hung upside down to snatch sunflower hearts. Bob Fisher even saw a lone Black-headed Grosbeak (see story on page 122). The Fishers also stock an upside down feeder with thistle, which attracted Indigo Buntings, a bird I have never seen at a feeder.

I'm sure many backyard birding records have been broken. Please

send in your new totals to me. The rules are: the birds have to be visible from your home. You can be outside but you should be able to touch your house or apartment or condo while viewing the birds. You can use binoculars and a scope from these locations.

For example. You live in a condominium complex and you are in the parking lot when a Golden Eagle flies over. Can you count it? Not unless you run over to your unit and are close enough to touch the structure before the eagle is out of sight.

Your house is on 30 acres and you are working in your orchard where bluebirds are nesting. Can you count the birds? Not unless you can spot these birds with binoculars or a scope from within touching distance of your actual living structure.

Based on these rules, if you want to amend a previous sighting you sent me, please do so when you send in your new finds from the unbelievable spring of 1996.

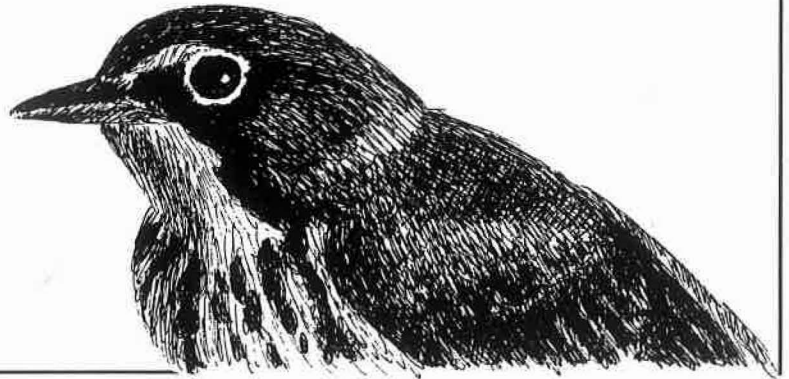

Spring Migration 1996

Overall, it was a phenomenal spring migration, with much of the activity concentrated in the beginning and end of the season. April and early May were dominated by cool, rainy weather, that held back the migrants. Still, first arrival dates were about normal, or slightly ahead of normal in northern Illinois, but the early migrants were not singing or easily visible in the cold and rain.

The first half of March was 7-9 degrees colder than normal statewide. The cold along with the drought in the western U.S. and even colder conditions to the north perhaps combined to bring one of the most impressive waterfowl concentrations in years. Record numbers of **American White Pelicans** and **White-fronted Geese** were reported, with Snow Geese outnumbering Canada in Southern and Central Illinois. Rarities included **Cinnamon Teal**, **Eurasian Wigeon**, and 3 **Barrow's Goldeneye**.

Cool, rainy weather in the first two weeks of April suppressed early spring migration in southern Illinois and diminished any large waves of birds there until late April and early May. Early, middle, and late arriving species occurred all at the same time with many species arriving almost simultaneously statewide during late April. The most watched bird of the spring was a cooperative **Swainson's Warbler** at Jackson Park in Chicago on 27-29 April. Three of the most exciting birds of the season were found during the first week in May: Illinois' second record of **Lazuli Bunting**, and a closely observed **Hermit X Townsend's Warbler**.

Several observers reported that the last three weeks of May in central and northern Illinois provided some of the finest birding they have experienced in the state. A strong movement on 9-10 May into the state hit the stalled cold front over northern Illinois during the late morning of 10 May. This caused one of the more impressive fallouts in recent memory on that day. The extreme shift of weather (16 degree windchill on the 10th and below freezing nighttime temperatures on the 11th) resulted in cold and starving migrants

forced to the ground seeking insects as well as the birds concentrating in large numbers at various places. It was as if the nighttime migrants all dropped out of the sky and couldn't move on due to the weather. Perhaps the numbers of migrants were no greater than normal, but all were visible, if not vocal, and so busy feeding that they were oblivious to approach. The numbers of birds killed by hypothermia, starvation, along roadsides by cars or drowned after being forced down by fog is hard to estimate, but nevertheless it was unfortunately significant. Record numbers of dead birds were picked up along Lake Michigan by Field Museum staff. This situation continued through 17 May. The week of fallouts produced several interesting rarities, including **Western Tanager** and **Black-headed Grosbeak**. Thrushes appeared in significantly large numbers. Later arriving migrants, especially flycatchers, were conspicuous and vocal and reported in record numbers. Several species, notably Clay-colored, Lark and Harris' sparrows had a good showing statewide.

Many of the most exciting finds of the spring occurred during the last week of May and into early June. Northeastern IL had two **Scissor-tailed Flycatchers**, **Western Kingbird**, and a **Neotropic Cormorant** while Northcentral Illinois had a **Green-tailed Towhee**. Record numbers of **Glossy** and **White-faced ibis** visited Lake Chautauqua and St. Clair County. Most of the surprisingly numerous **Tricolored Herons** seen during the spring were scattered statewide.

Shorebird migration was notable in several locations. It began fairly early with excellent numbers of Willet, Avocet, Dunlin, both godwits, snipe, Wilson's Phalarope, and Piping Plover. A Ruff, several Black-necked Stilts, and a Whimbrel in Southern Illinois added interest. A **Buff-breasted Sandpiper** made a very rare spring appearance this year.

In addition to lots of rarities and impressive migrant fallout numbers, interest was stirred by various late lingering birds. Paul Clyne in Jackson Park called it the spring that

wouldn't die due to the presence of many species well into June and the number of record late departure dates. Waterfowl, gulls, early springbirds such as Red-breasted Nuthatches, Winter Wrens, Kinglets, finches, and many species of sparrows seemed reluctant to move on. A Yellow-rumped Warbler was still singing in Jackson Park on June 23. One has to wonder what surprises the summer nesting season will have in store.

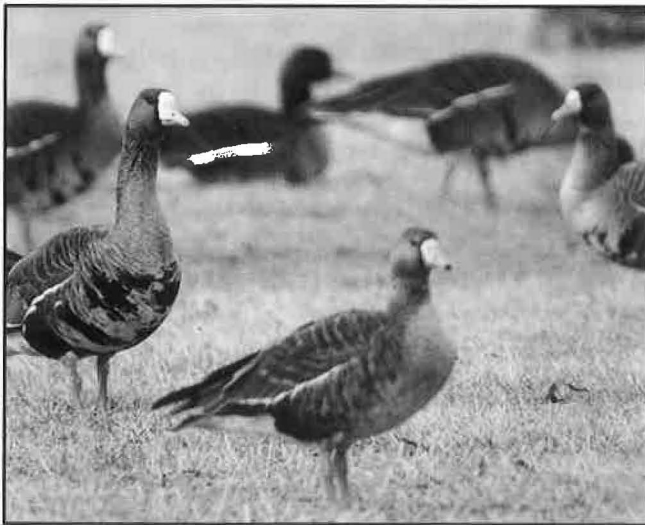

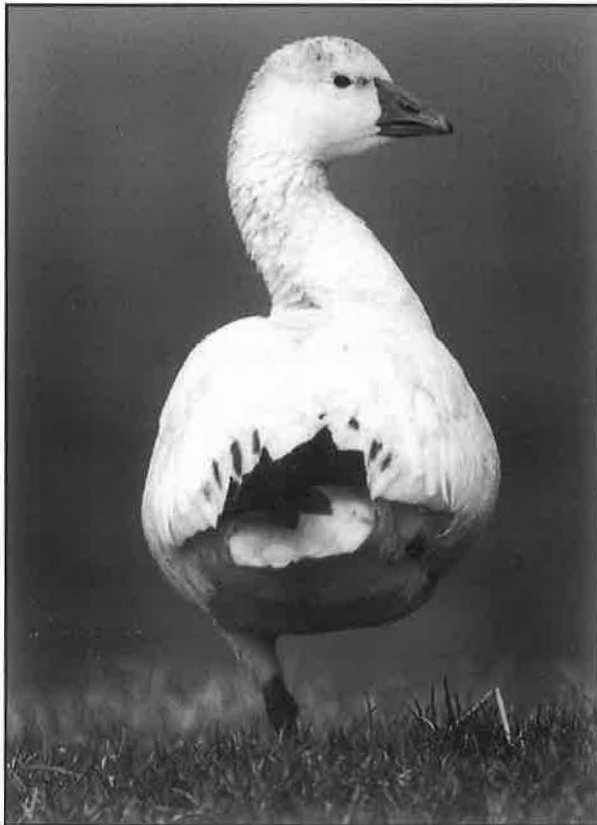

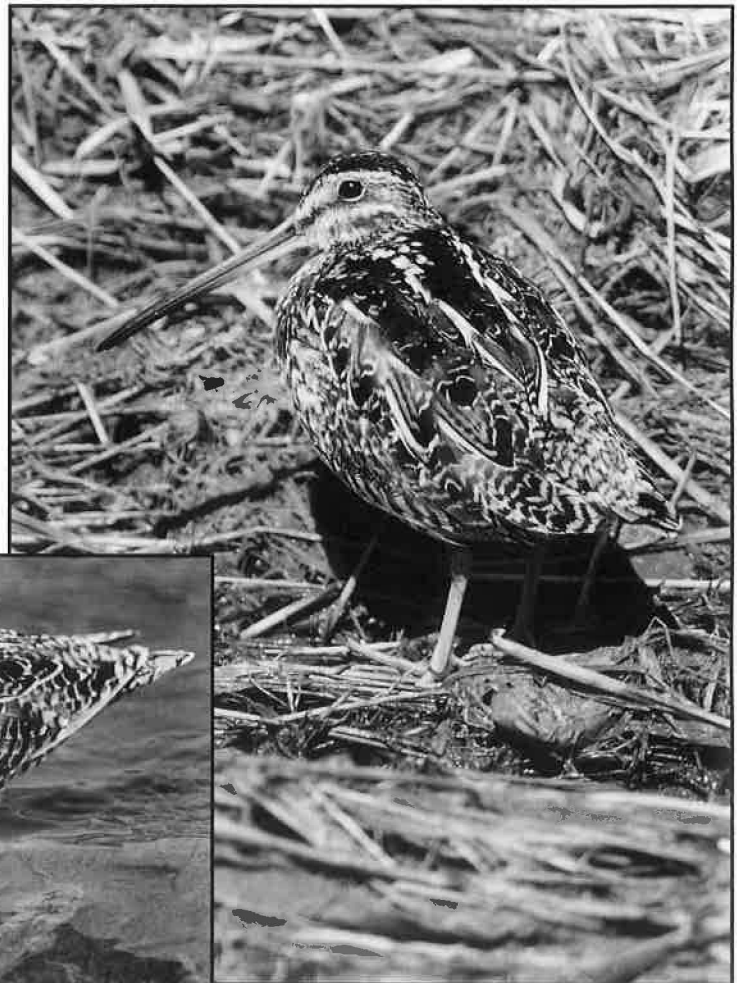

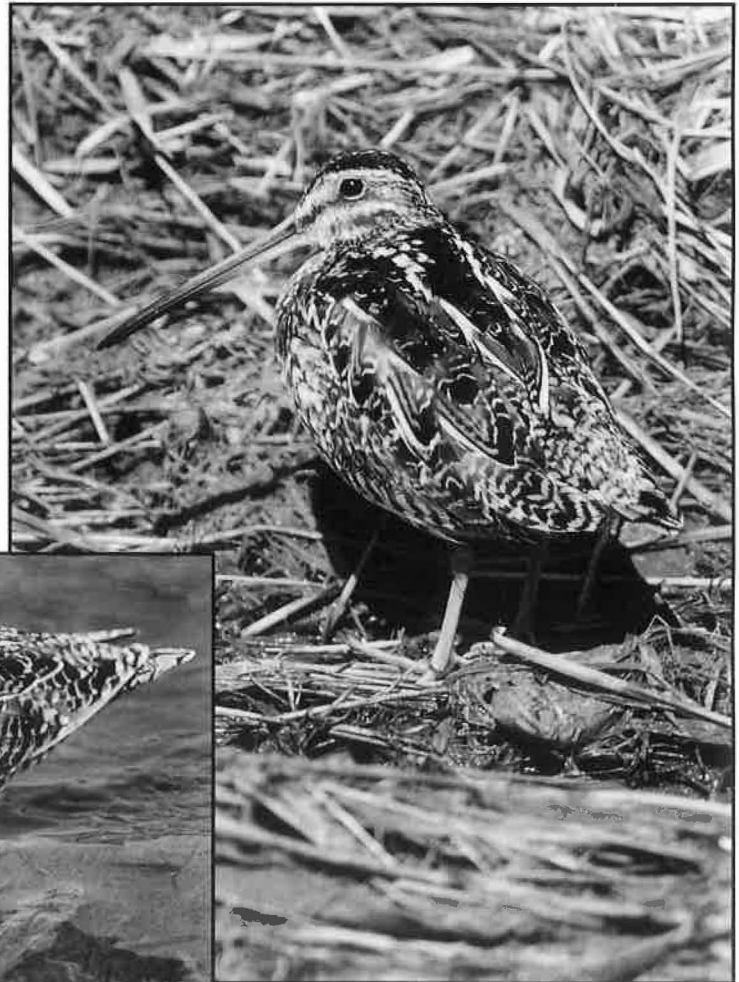

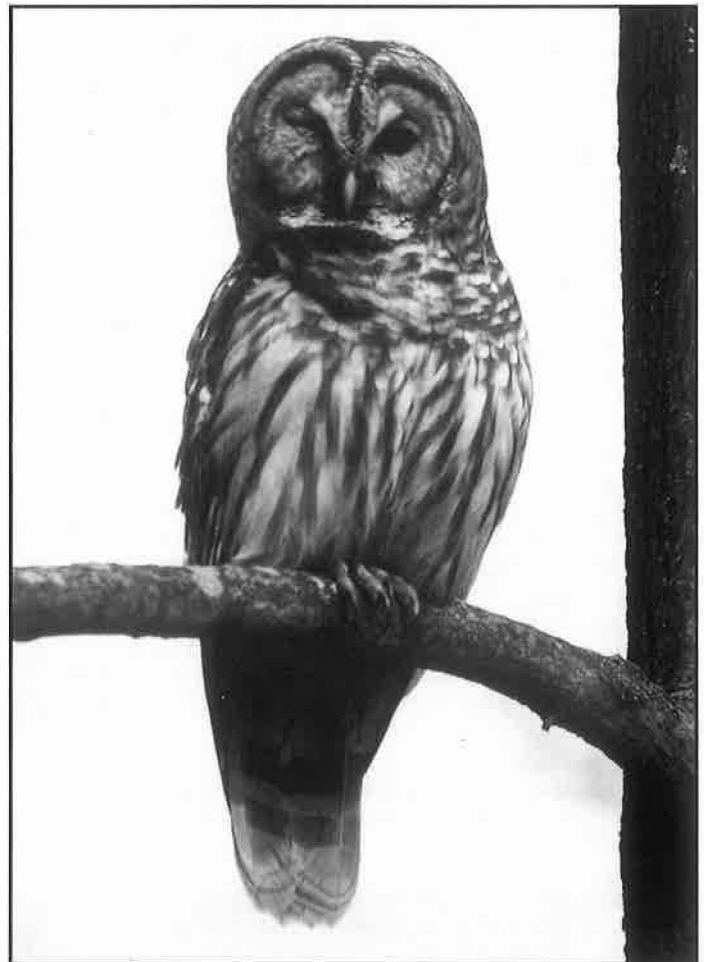
