

#### Letter from the Editor

#### Documenting changes

In this issue, we bring you stories about the changing breeding avifauna in Illinois. Scissor-tailed Flycatchers, with the main breeding range in Texas and Oklahoma, are now successfully raising young in southern Illinois (see Travis A. Mahan and Dan Kassebaum's article in this issue).

So what does this mean? Global warming, perhaps? Breeding Blue Grosbeaks and Summer Tanagers seem to be pushing northward in Illinois. But then Rose-breasted Grosbeaks seem to be pushing southward as breeders in Illinois. In the northeastern part of Illinois, Clay-colored Sparrows, which mostly breed farther north and west, successfully raised young in several locations last year (see Joe Suchecki's article in this issue). Formerly, this species was known to breed at only site in Illinois, a Christmas tree farm near Rockford. Joe reports the sparrows are back, four singing males, at Spring-brook Prairie in DuPage County this breeding season.

And what's happening with the Monk Parakeet? This recently introduced species' population is expanding in Illinois, according to an article in this issue by Walter Marcisz.

These are conundrums that scientists are only beginning to explore. And they will, no doubt, be using the information contained in *Meadowlark* to determine population and distribution changes in breeding birds of Illinois, and compare those data with other factors such as climate and habitat.

What's so exciting to me is that, we, the birders of Illinois, are documenting these changes. And the articles you read here, plus the Field Notes, can be readily found by those studying these changes. Every issue of *Meadowlark* can be found at the Field Museum in Chicago as well as at various libraries and institutions. The Field Museum of Natural History in New York also houses *Meadowlark* in an exchange program with IOS.

When you write articles, take photos and send in Field Notes for Meadowlark, you become part of the future of birds and science. You become part of a bigger picture.

We now have thirteen full years of data in *Meadowlark* and another seven years of data before that published in the former *Illinois Birds & Birding*. We have 20 years of data that Illinois birders have provided and many more details in the articles that volunteer authors and citizen scientists take the time to write. You should be proud of yourselves. And those of you who are sitting on the sidelines with stories, data and ideas, what are you waiting for? Email me at sheryl.devore@comcast. net with your ideas and become part of a bigger universe in which you can play a role in science, conservation and ornithology.

## The expanding Monk Parakeet:

An update on the Chicagoland

Monk Parakeet expansion,

with notes on cell tower nests

As I write this, I hear Monk Parakeets (Myiopsitta monachus) calling outside the window of my home in the Hegewisch neighborhood at the far southeast corner of Chicago. Monk Parakeets are very loud birds, and if they are around they are fairly impossible to miss. I hear them every day now. It was not always like this.

For many years, Illinois Monk Parakeets were a specialty of the Hyde Park neighborhood of Chicago (near 57th St. and the lakefront) with only a very few spin-off colonies in other areas. For at

least the last five years, two of these spin-off colonies (Burnham and Wolf Lake/Powers Conservation Area) have been hosting nesting Monk Parakeets within a mile or two of my home. Since the inception of these colo-

nies, foraging flocks of parakeets have been seen and heard on a semiregular basis in my neighborhood. But the Monk Parakeet population has remained anything but stable. It is headed in only one direction: up. In my area, the Burnham colony has added new nests on a virtually annual basis. Despite this local increase, I was still caught off guard by what was to come.

Over the past two years (2003 and 2004?), reports of Monk Parakeets in unusual or unexpected places have increased. I have numerous non-birder friends who have taken me to task on this issue: "Why am I seeing Monk Parakeets in Grant Park? I thought they were only found in Jackson Park." My personal Monk Parakeet observations were increasing in a way that was quite consistent with what my non-birder friends were reporting. Not only was I finding them in my home neighborhood, but I was also regularly seeing them where I work (the Beverly neighborhood of Chicago) and on my way to work (in the suburb of Blue Island).

Then, at a Memorial Day 2004 backyard barbecue, a non-birder friend who works as an arborist for the City of Chicago told me he was seeing Monk Parakeets "everywhere" throughout the city. He further opined that the parakeets were building nests on cell phone towers in many of the neighborhoods he visited.

At this point, I started looking closely at cell towers. My friend was right. From what I could see, Monk Parakeets were indeed leap-frogging across the city and suburbs via cell towers. A couple of weeks later, I read Vernon Kleen's 2003 Breeding Season Report (Kleen 2004) in which he stated: "A contributor mentioned that the Monk Parakeet population may be expanding; however, appropriate documentation and supportive field notes were not provided for this report." After reading this statement, I knew it was time that someone got the Monk Parakeet expansion down on paper.

#### Chicago Arrival

Monk Parakeets are native to South America, breeding from Bolivia cast and south through Paraguay and Uruguay, and south to the Rio Negro of Argentina (Meyer de Schauensee 1970). Over the years, thousands of Monk Parakeets have been imported legally to the United States for sale as pets. Inevitably, some of these imported birds have been released or have escaped into the wild. The first free-flying Monk Parakeets in the New York metropolitan area were reported in 1967 (Neidermyer & Hickey 1977), and the first Chicago-area sighting occurred in 1973 (South 1999).

There is some debate as to how Monk Parakeets first arrived in Chicago. According to urban legend the parakeets originally escaped from a damaged shipping crate at O'Hare International Airport, but it is at least as likely that the original Chicago birds were pets that were either intentionally released or able to escape from captivity (South & Pruett-Jones 2000). Concerns that the Monk Parakeet might become a significant agricultural pest led to a U.S. Department of Agriculture effort to extirpate the birds from the Hyde Park neighborhood of Chicago in 1988. The local reaction was the formation of a citizen's group (founded by Doug Anderson, a former Chicago Audubon Society president) which demanded public hearings to determine if the birds posed a danger to Illinois crops. The Department of Agriculture eventually backed away from its removal efforts (Moskoff 2003). Since that time, the Chicago parakeets have continued to flourish, and Monk Parakeet was officially added to the Checklist of Illinois State Birds in 1999 (IORC 1999).

#### Plumage and behavior

Monk Parakeets are about twelve inches long, with a silvery-gray forehead, face, and breast, and bright green upperparts. The tail is long. At close range, the birds are easily identified by these characteristics. In flight, the birds appear to be roughly the same size and shape as Mourning Dove (Zenaida macroura), but the parakeet's large-headed appearance and uniquely stiff wing-beats easily separate it from that species.

Monk Parakeets are unique among parrots in that they build massive, freestanding, communal stick nests; all other members of the parrot family nest in tree holes or cavities (Neidermyer & Hickey 1977, Sibley 2000). Because these massive communal nests are large and easy to see at a distance, I decided to track the expansion of Chicago-area Monk Parakeets by seeking out their nests.

#### 2004 Monk Parakeet Nest Surveys

During the second half of 2004, I tracked the spread of Chicago-area Monk Parakeets by doing a survey of their nest locations. Since it had become apparent that Monk Parakeets were actively using cell towers as nest sites, it seemed relatively easy to simply check Chicago-area cell towers for Monk Parakeet nests via surveys by car.

I conducted Monk Parakeet nest surveys on 4 and 11 July; 3 and 24 October; and 11, 20, and 28 November 2004. Since most Monk Parakeet nests at least appeared to be concentrated on the south side of Chicago and adjacent suburbs, I (somewhat arbitrarily) concentrated my efforts in these areas. Surveys were conducted by driving down major eastwest streets at one mile intervals and checking cell towers for nests. Cell towers are very tall and Monk Parakeet nests are very obvious, so it was not at all difficult for me to detect Monk nests even at a distance of several city blocks. Moreover, major Chicago streets are purposely gridded at one mile (eight block) intervals (e.g. 111th St., 119th St.), facilitating my car surveys.

City of Chicago surveys were conducted in an area bordered on the north by Pershing Road (39th Street) and on the south, west, and east by Chicago city limits. In the south suburban (Cook County) surveys, major streets were not always gridded out to Chicago specifications (i.e. one-mile intervals) so it was often necessary to substitute a nearby large street for a "standard" one-mile interval street (e.g. 147th Street as opposed to 151st Street). South suburban Cook County surveys were conducted in an area bordered on the north by 79th Street; on the south by 183rd Street from the county line east to Halsted Street and then Glenwood-Lansing Road east to the Indiana border; and on the west and east by the county line (Figure 1). During the 2004 car surveys, only cell tower nests were targeted, but if nests on telephone poles, trees, or other structures were observed they were also recorded.

In addition to the 2004 surveys by car, I posted a request for information on the Illinois birding listserv (IBET - administered by Sue Friscia and Michael Retter), and I also did a literature search on Chicago-area Monk Parakeet nests.

#### Survey Results

Approximately 250 Monk Parakeet nests at 53 separate locations in three northeastern Illinois counties were located during 2004 (Table 1). The largest numbers of nests were located within the city of Chicago, especially on the south side (Figure 1), but nests were also located in 14 different suburbs including two suburbs in DuPage County and one in McHenry County (Table 1).

During the 2004 surveys, all nests were counted; no exceptions. For the purposes of this study, a nest was defined as any free-standing nest clump built by Monk Parakeets. The nests ranged from massive stick constructions with multiple openings, tunnels, and chambers to small clusters of sticks that were probably nests in the early stages of construction. I made no specific effort to determine if every nest found was active during 2004 (although many of the nest sites were clearly very active). My only criteria for inclusion in Table 1 was that a nest was present at a particular location during 2004. My main goal was in showing the footprint of where Monk Parakeets had actively constructed nests in recent history (Figure 1), as even the tiniest clump of sticks indicates recent activity by at least one Monk Parakeet.

For the purposes of this study, a location is defined as a nest or cluster of nests within a few city blocks of one another surrounded by a larger nest-free area (anywhere from several blocks to several miles). A good illustration of this concept is Washington Park, a city park within the Hyde Park area of Chicago. In Washington Park, I found one group of 51 nests clustered around the National Guard Armory between 52nd and 54th Streets at Cottage Grove Avenue and four nests clustered around the DuSable Museum at 57th Street just a little farther south on Cottage Grove. 1 found a third and final group of 14 nests at the southwest corner of Washington Park near 59th Street and King Drive. Based on our working definition, the Washington Park nests count as three separate locations (51, 4, and 14 nests). With a total of 69 nests, Washington Park is the epicenter of Chicago-area Monk Parakeet activity.

#### First foothold


The first foothold established by Monk Parakeets in the Chicago area was in the Hyde Park area, and the Monks' presence clearly remains solid there. The total number of Hyde Park area nests (52nd Street through 63rd Street in Table 1) was approximately 95 in 2004, compared with a total of 48 Hyde Park nests in 1998 (South 1999).

There were six known non-Hyde Park Monk Parakeet nest locations in Illinois in 1998 (South 1999) compared with 43 known non-Hyde Park Illinois nest locations in 2004 (Table 1). The largest of the suburban nest locations in 2004 was the active Burnham (Cook Co.) colony with 36 nests. Relatively large active colonies (6-10 nest range) were also located in Burbank (Cook Co.), Elmhurst (DuPage Co.), and at two locations in Addison (DuPage Co.) (Table 1, Figure 1).

Thirty-two of the nest locations listed in Table 1 were noted for the first time in 2004. Twenty-six total locations included nests on cell towers. Twenty-four of the nest locations first noted in 2004 included cell tower nests (a total of 53 new cell tower nests).

Mixed blessing that they are, cellular phones are here to stay. And for better or for worse, their supporting infrastructure of cell towers has provided numerous ideal new locations on which Monk Parakeets may build their nests. In effect, Monk Parakeets appear to be using cell towers as stepping-stones in their continued expansion across Chicagoland.

Monk Parakeets were definitely observed at 34 of the 53 total nest locations during 2004 (Table 1). The remaining 19 locations, however, were not necessarily inactive sites in 2004. Nine of these 19 nest locations were visited by an observer on only one date in 2004, so parakeets could easily have been missed even if present at the colony. Other nest locations where birds were not observed were cell

tower sites where nests are high off the ground and the birds are not easily observed. At least two Chicago cell tower nest locations were believed to have been abandoned in 2004 (A. Anderson, L. Munoz, personal communication) (Table 1).

The two active telephone pole nests at William W. Powers Conservation Area in Chicago were destroyed by electricians during the summer of 2004, but Monk Parakeets had already begun reconstructing both nests as of November 2004. Two telephone pole nests at Nichols Park in the Hyde Park area were also knocked down in 2004, but parakeets have begun to rebuild at least one of them (E. Marcisz, personal communication). In November 2004 I found one large stick nest on the ground near the Washington Park Armory (probably downed during a spell of bad weather). The most notorious of all of the Hyde Park area nests, a massive stick construction near 53rd Street and Lake Shore Drive, was also destroyed when the towering ash tree which supported it crashed to the ground in June of 2004 (Rybarczyk 2004).

#### Former Sites

Within Cook County, Illinois, a number of Monk Parakeet nest sites have been destroyed, abandoned, or otherwise eliminated. In Chicago, nest sites in the Sauganash area, at Foster Avenue and the North Branch Chicago River, at Columbus Park, at McKinley Park, and at the 64th Street Beach are now all gone (A. Anderson, P. Clyne, personal communication). Former suburban Cook County nest sites include an Arlington Heights colony (A. Anderson, personal communication) and a nest-building attempt in Evanston (D. Darnell, personal communication).

Within DuPage County, Illinois, a large active tree nest was formerly present on Schmale Road in Carol Stream, but it has been gone for at least five years and was probably destroyed (R. Coons, personal communication). Another DuPage County

Within Lake County, Illinois, an active colony of up to two telephone pole nests existed in Zion from 1993 through at least 1996 (Kleen 1994, Kleen 1997). These nests were eventually knocked down by telephone company employees (E. Walters, personal communication). There are no known remaining Lake County, Illinois nesting sites (D.B. Johnson, personal communication).

#### Indeterminate Sites

Within the city of Chicago, Monk Parakeet nest sites were reported at Winnemac Park and at Damen Avenue and Fulleron Parkway in 2003 (Kleen 2004). I have been unable to obtain updated information on these sites. but they very well may still be active. A colony of big nests located under el tracks near Englewood Academy on the south side of Chicago was very active a few years ago (J. Pollock, personal communication). I have had no recent reports from this area, and I personally was unable to find nests or birds during a trip to the area in November of 2004, but it is certainly possible that active nests still exist there. Monk Parakeet flocks have been reported in the Marquette Park area of Chicago (Sjostrom 2004). During a brief visit to the Marquette Park area in November of 2004 I found no nests, but I did see three flocks of Monk Parakeets (a total of 14 birds), strongly suggesting the presence of a nesting colony in the area.

I have been unable to obtain recent information on reported suburban Cook County nest sites at Berwyn (Sjostrom 2004), Des Plaines (A. Anderson, personal communication), and North Riverside (South 1999), nor have I been able to obtain recent information on the Bensenville (DuPage Co.) nest site (Sjostrom 2004). It is certainly possible that all of these colonies are still active.

#### **Bordering States**

In June of 2004, Carolyn Marsh, along with John and Connie Wachala, watched four Monk Parakeets build four partial nests around electrical insulators at an electrical substation in Highland, Indiana, All four nests were gone 30 July 2004, perhaps blown down by thunderstorms or removed by electricians. Highland is in northern Lake County, Indiana, approximately three miles east of the Illinois state line. Given the relatively large number of Monk Parakeet nest locations in southeast Cook County adjacent to the Indiana border, it seems very likely that other nesting attempts by Monk Parakeets have already occurred in Indiana.

During the 1990s, a pair of Monk Parakeets nested on stadium lights on Sheridan Road in Kenosha (Kenosha Co.), Wisconsin (E. Engle, personal communication). I have been unable to obtain any more recent information on this location, but the nest may very well still be active.

#### Other Illinois Monk Parakeet Sites

An active Monk Parakeet nest was noted at Carlyle Lake (Clinton Co.), Illinois during the 2002 and 2003 breeding seasons (Kleen 2003, Kleen 2004). The Carlyle birds are believed to be local escapees which have begun nesting in the area, and not related to the Chicago-area population (Keith McMullen, pers. comm.). The nest that this colony of more than a dozen birds have been using was destroyed in January 2005 by the employees of the grain elevator that the nest was built on. No birds have been seen in the area since (S. Bailey, fide D. Kassebaum, pers. comm.)

#### Conclusions

I stress emphatically that the list of Chicago-area Monk parakeet nests I have compiled here is clearly incomplete. During my 2004 surveys by car, I was only looking for the most obvious nests (on cell towers), and there is no doubt that I missed many nests hidden in trees on quiet suburban streets. My survey area was also limited, and it is very likely that I also missed

many nests that were outside of my survey area. Take my total number of nests at face value, but also definitely accept that many more Chicago-area Monk Parakeet nests exist than have been recorded here.

Secondly, in my efforts to document the current number of Chicagoarea Monk Parakeet nests, I have made no actual attempt to estimate the number of Monk Parakeets currently existing in the Chicago-area. A 1996 study analyzing Christmas Count data found that Monk Parakeets in the U.S. increased from 33 reported birds in 1975-76 to 1,186 reported birds in 1994-95. These data fit the standard equation of exponential growth (Van Bael and Pruett-Jones 1996). The findings of that study certainly reflect the expansion of the Chicago-area Monk Parakeet population in recent years.

Barring unforeseen disease outbreaks, renewed governmental eradication efforts, or competition from new alien invasive species, it seems clear that the Chicago-area Monk Parakeet population will continue to increase dramatically in future years.

### An assessment of avian richness and relative abundance at Green Wing Environmental Laboratory, Lee County, Illinois

#### **Abstract**

We measured avian richness and relative abundance at Green Wing Environmental Laboratory (GWEL), a biological field station which totals 1.7 km2 of wooded and wetland habitats in northcentral Illinois, from September 2001 through June 2002. We completed a total of six point count survey routes (two fall migration, one winter, two spring migration, and one summer breeding season), three waterfowl surveys, and two nocturnal surveys. We recorded 4,440 birds of 140 species, including 62 species of North American Migrants, 59 Neotropical Migrants, and 19 species of Permanent Residents. Richness and abundance were greatest during migration, intermediate during the breeding season, and lowest in winter. Our sampling effort during this project was relatively small, nevertheless avian richness was high. Blue Jays and American Crows were the most frequently encountered, as well as the most abundant species. The richness of the avian community suggests to us that GWEL may be functioning as a "habitat island" within a Midwestern landscape matrix dominated by agricultural row crops.

#### Introduction

Wing Environmental Laboratory (GWEL) is a biological field station located near the city of Amboy, Lee County, Illinois, in the northcentral part of the state (41 41'54"N and 89 16'33"W) and is associated with the Organization of Biological Field Stations. This site, acquired by Augustana College, Rock Island, Illinois, in the early 1990's, totals ca. 1.7 km2 of upland and lowland forests and wetland habitat (Fig. 1). Historically, habitat at this site has been relatively undisturbed, except for two areas (~1 ha each) modified for agriculture (corn field) and recreation (baseball field and a horse stable). These have since been abandoned and the corn field is now a cattail marsh, due to levee construction during its agricultural use that favored the development of a permanent pond. The recreational area is currently old field habitat. Most of the site consists of undisturbed black and bur oak forest, willow and cottonwood tracts, sedge meadows, and small pot-holes and streams (B. Dziadyk, pers. comm.). Little is known about the natural history of GWEL. describing its vascular flora and amphibian diversity. Prior to this study, nothing was known about the avian fauna at GWEL.

Knowledge of the avian community at GWEL is important in several respects. First, relatively little wetland, native forests, or prairie habitat are found in northcentral Illinois. It is estimated that European settlement has reduced these habitats by 99% and that less than 0.1% of highquality natural areas remain today (Levin 2000). What remains needs to be preserved and understood for its biological value. Second, avian biodiversity in the United States is threatened in several ways. Results from the Breeding Bird Survey suggest that 25% of United States bird species are in decline or suspected of being in decline (Anonymous 2002). This, coupled with the fact that little native habitat remains in the Midwest, prompts the need for baseline ecological studies in regions of relatively undisturbed habitat and where no previous information can be found regarding avian diversity. To address these needs, we assessed species richness and relative abundance of the avifauna at GWEL. This information can be used in order to better understand avian population dynamics in the upper Midwest.

#### Methods

We conducted point counts along a 13-station route (Fig. 1) and repeated these counts 6 times in the early fall (3 September 2001), late fall (10 October

2001), winter (25 January 2002), early spring (30 March 2002), late spring (13 May 2002), and summer (30 June 2002) for a total of 78 point count survevs. All survey routes started at dawn and lasted ca. 4.5 h. We followed the weather protocol for the Breeding Bird Survey (Anonymous 2001). Each station was separated from other stations by at least 250 m and all stations were spaced throughout the site as evenly as possible. The unlimitedradius point count method (Bibby et al. 2000) was employed to estimate species richness and relative abundance. The duration of each point count was 5 min, which is long enough to identify most birds present and short enough to maximize the potential that all points are sampled in the morning hours (Fuller and Langslow 1984). At each point we identified the species present and the number of individuals seen and heard. We also recorded numbers and species of birds observed between points (interpoint data). Two nocturnal surveys were conducted in 2002 on 29 March and 13 May for species which are not diurnally active. Since most point count stations were not located near wetland sites, we also conducted three waterfowl surveys in 2002 on

16, 23, and 29 March in appropriate waterfowl habitat. We used the non-standardized random area search method for nocturnal and waterfowl surveys (Bibby et al. 2000).


We combined data from all surveys to estimate species richness (# of species observed). Using only point count data, we calculated the frequency of occurrence (the percentage of total points at which a species was

detected). Although this parameter is influenced by locations of survey points, species abundance, detectability, and migratory status, it provides a coarse estimate of how much of GWEL was used by each species. Additionally, relative abundance (the total number of individuals of one species divided by the total number of individuals of all species combined) was estimated for each species within a migratory class [North American Migrant, non-breeders (NAM), North American Migrant, breeders (NAMb), Neotropical Migrant, non-breeders (NTM), Neotropical Migrant, breeders (NTMb), and Permanent Residents (RES) (Bonney et al. 1995)]. We determined species to be breeders and non-breeders according to Bohlen (1989) and National Geographic (2002).

#### Results

We identified a total of 4,440 birds of 140 species (Appendix 1) including 62 species of North American Migrants, 59 Neotropical Migrants, and 19 species of Permanent Residents. Richness and abundance were greatest during migration (1,572 individuals of 115 species in spring and 1,954 individuals of 88 species in fall), intermediate during the breeding season (582 individuals of 55 species), and lowest in winter (332 individuals of 27 species).

Thirteen species had a frequency of occurrence greater than 20% (Table 1), which included one NTMb, five

NAMb, and seven RES species. Blue Jays and American Crows had the highest frequency of occurrence among these, as well as the highest absolute abundance, which is simply the total number of birds observed during point count surveys (Table 1).

Relative abundance of all birds observed during point count surveys is listed in Appendix 1. The most abundant NTM in early fall was the Lesser Yellowlegs, whereas in the late spring the Tennessee Warbler was most abundant. Breeding NTM passerines were observed in all survey periods except during the winter, early spring, and late fall. Blue-winged Teal, which was the only NTMb observed in late fall, and Gray Catbird were most abundant in early fall. In late spring, the Barn Swallow was the most abundant NTMb. However, during the summer survey abundance among the 23 NTMb species varied little (148 individuals). The most abundant NAMs were the White-throated Sparrow (late fall), Dark-eyed Junco (winter), Rusty Blackbird (early spring), and Yellowrumped Warbler (late spring). Canada Goose, American Robin, Red-winged Blackbird, and American Goldfinch



were the most abundant breeding NAMs. Seven Permanent Resident species were observed during every survey: Red-bellied Woodpecker, Downy Woodpecker, Hairy Woodpecker, Blue Jay, American Crow, Black-capped Chickadee, and Whitebreasted Nuthatch. Of these, jays and crows were the most abundant

and frequently encountered residents throughout all surveys.

The following species were observed outside the time frame of our study: Snow Goose, Ruddy Duck, Bald Eagle (T. Roller, pers. comm.), Broad-winged Hawk, American Coot, Sandhill Crane, Greater Yellowlegs, Common Nighthawk, Willow Flycatcher, Cliff Swallow, and Mourning Warbler.

#### Discussion

During this study, we encountered a high diversity of species, including a large number of Neotropical Migrants. Although this site maintained a diverse avian community during the breeding season, spring and fall migration yielded the most species.

Despite the high richness, the results concerning the frequency of occurrence were unexpected. We found that 13 of 140 species (9.3%) of the taxa were found at >20% of the point count stations. None of these included non-breeding migrants and less than 50% of them were migrants, in general. Based on previous work using the same methods, in similar habitat types, and within the same geographic location (McKay et al. 1999), we expected that twice as many species would have been found at 20% or more of the count stations, and that this would have included some of the non-breeding migrants. It could be that small habitat islands such as GWEL are avoided by breeding migrants. On the other hand, low sampling effort may have skewed the results to favor residents being found at >20% of the stations. This is undoubtedly caused by the fact that many migrants, particularly the NTM species, were present only during the late spring, summer, and early fall surveys.

Our results show that forest interior breeders have low relative abundance. This was found for species such as Eastern Wood-Pewee, Wood Thrush, American Redstart, and Ovenbird. Moreover, forest edge species such as Mourning Dove, House Wren, and Indigo Bunting were found at lower relative abundances than expected. McKay et al. (1999), in a similar study, found doves, wrens, and buntings at higher relative abundances.

Frequency of occurrence and relative abundance demonstrated that Blue Jays and American Crows were found throughout most of the site and were the most abundant species. Additionally, these birds were present during all survey periods. Other species, such as the Red-bellied Woodpecker and Northern Cardinal, had a high frequency of occurrence, but low relative abundance among survey periods. This suggests that although few individuals were encountered during our surveys, they were nonetheless scattered somewhat evenly throughout the site.

Although GWEL may be beneficial to some taxa, it may negatively affect other species, such as some breeding NTMs. In a geographic sense, GWEL is a small patch of nat-

ural habitat in a highly fragmented landscape. Robinson et al. (1995) found that breeding NTMs in this region of the Midwest experience low reproductive success due to high nest predation and brood parasitism by Brown-headed Cowbirds compared to breeding NTMs in unfragmented, continuous large tracts of habitat. Therefore the authors speculate that fragmented sites, such as GWEL, may be functioning as "sinks" in sourcesink population dynamics. As a consequence, low reproductive levels require constant immigration from "source" areas (unfragmented core areas) for populations within sinks to be maintained. Future studies at GWEL could address this hypothesis by determining which NTM species breed and estimating reproductive success, immigration, long-term site fidelity, and nest predation and parasitism by cowbirds on NTMs, especially in light of higher than expected relative abundance of cowbirds (McKay et al. 1999).

In a conservation sense, seven species were observed at GWEL that are suspected to be in decline according to the Audubon Watchlist 2002 (Anonymous 2002): American Wood-

cock, Red-headed Woodpecker, Wood Thrush, Golden-winged Warbler, Baybreasted Warbler, Blue-winged Warbler, and Kentucky Warbler. Lastly, the Golden-winged Warbler is one of the top five species identified as being of high management concern (Thompson et al. 1993).

Overall, our results demonstrate the potential importance of GWEL to Midwestern avian populations, and suggest that the site may be functioning as a "habitat island" and migration corridor within a landscape matrix dominated by agriculture. Consequently, this may indicate the relatively high value of similar habitat "patches" within this region to avian populations.

# The Scissor-tailed Flycatcher in Illinois with accounts of nesting attempts in 2003 and 2004


#### Introduction

At least 105 reports of Scissortailed Flycatchers (Tyrannus forficatus) in Illinois have been recorded since the first observation near Peoria in 1885. These reports have occurred during most months of the year with the earliest arrivals found in mid-April and typical departures by the end of October. The earliest Illinois spring arrival is of a male found by Frank Bennett on 14 April 2002 at the Cypress Creek National Wildlife Refuge in Pulaski County (Clyne 2003). Doug Robinson found a Scissor-tailed Flycatcher during a Union County CBC on 29 December 1988, which constitutes the latest record for the state (Robinson 1996). Scissor-tailed Flycatchers have been found in at least 48 of the 102 counties in Illinois (see Figure 1), and though this species has been a regular visitor to Illinois for many years, it has only recently been confirmed as part of Illinois' nesting avifauna. To date, there are only SIX confirmed nesting records: Breeding Bird Survey Route

34-060 in Randolph County, 2000 (Kleen et al. 2001); Mississippi River Levee in Union County, 2001 (Bailey 2002); Tower Island Chute in Jackson County, 2003; Big Muddy River on the Jackson and Union County line, 2004; and near the town of Lenzburg in St. Clair County -- 2004. Only THREE of these nesting attempts have been successful with the Randolph County pair and the 2003 Jackson County pair fledging two young each. In addition, Eric Walters found a nest, likely the second nesting of the failed first nest along the Big Muddy River on the Jackson/Union County line in 2004. The local landlord near the site said he saw a family group later that summer (pers. comm. Eric Walters, fide S. DeVore).

These nesting records have a similar pattern of occurrence in that they are all close to the Mississippi River or one of its main tributaries, namely the Big Muddy River and the Kaskaskia River. Several historical observations follow this same geographical trend, which implies that Scissor-tailed Flycatchers have probably been nesting in Illinois for quite some time. During the nesting season of 1968, a male Scissor-tailed Fly-



catcher was observed along the Mississippi River Levee in Monroe County on 26 May (Comfort 1968a); a female was observed nearby on 6 June (Comfort 1968b). This pair likely nested, but published data have no details of such an occurrence. Prior to the first confirmed nesting record in Randolph County the summer of 2000, a Scissor-tailed Flycatcher had been observed along the same BBS route on 3 June 1995 (Johnson 1998). Another report of a single flycatcher



during the spring of 2001 was within a couple miles of the 2000 nest site (Kleen et al. 2001). The presence of a pair during May of 2002 along Brink Road in Clinton County was suggestive of a nesting attempt, but unfortunately, one of the birds succumbed to traffic (Joe Smothers - pers. comm.). This 2002 record was the third consecutive year that Scissor-tailed Flycatchers had been observed along Brink Road. A few miles west of this location, a Scissor-tailed Flycatcher was observed in Eldon Hazlet State Park by the park staff during the summer of 1998.

Several immature Scissor-tailed Flycatchers have been noted in Illinois, which is suggestive of local breeding. The oldest report of an immature was on 25 July 1970 between the towns of Cobden and

Anna in Union County (Fawks 1970). Todd Fink discovered an immature on 5 September 1982 near Belleville in St. Clair County; it remained to September (Bodman 1982). Considering this report of an immature, observations of Scissor-tailed Flycatchers near Belleville during the next two consecutive fall seasons of 1983 and 1984 represent potential nesting activity. Leonard Stanley reported an immature Scissor-tailed Flycatcher near Rend Lake in Franklin County on 2 September 2001; it was seen at this location until at least 23 September 2001 (Chapel 2002). Another immature was observed by Frank Bennett on 2 July 2002 near the town of Joppa in Massac County (Kleen 2003). A family group (unknown number of immatures) was also noted by the landowner near the nest site on the Jackson/Union County line in 2004 (pers. comm. - E. Walters). Immatures have been recorded in close proximity to Carlyle Lake in Clinton County on several dates: Brink Road on 19 August 2000, Brink Road from 12 August through 25 August 2001, and Coles Creek Road from 2 September through 9 September 2001. Noting the presence of immature birds in 2000 and 2001, as well as the presence of a pair in 2002, these records near Carlyle Lake become of special interest because they present an apparent case of breeding range expansion to the northeast along the Kaskaskia River watershed.

Most of the records above display the propensity of Scissor-tailed Flycatchers to return to certain sites each year. Marked site fidelity has not only been observed in Illinois but also during banding studies within their core range in southwestern Oklahoma. A study of Scissor-tailed Flycatcher breeding biology conducted by Jonathan Regosin and Stephen Pruett-Jones of the University of Chicago presented some interesting findings concerning the extent of site fidelity that is observed in some Scissor-tailed Flycatchers, From mid-March through mid-August of 1991 and 1992, Scissor-tailed Flycatchers were banded within a study area in southwestern Oklahoma and their breeding biology was monitored and

compared between the two years (Regosin and Pruett-Jones 1995). Of the 15 banded females that returned to the study area in 1992, six (40.0%) nested in the same tree used in 1991, five (33.3%) nested within 100 meters of the 1991 nest site, and only four (26.7%) nested farther than 100 meters away from their 1991 nest site (Regosin and Pruett-Jones 1995). Also of interest, none of the 110 nestlings that they banded in 1991were found within the study area in 1992 (Regosin and Pruett-Jones 1995). With these facts in mind, the likelihood that Scissor-tailed Flycatchers successfully nested in Clinton County is very high. This statement could also be made for the St. Clair County birds during the early 1980s.

#### Accounts

#### Jackson County - 2003

On 5 July 2003, H. David Bohlen, Myrna Deaton, Dan Kassebaum and I were scouring a large portion of southern Illinois in search of regional

specialty species such as Black Vulture (Coragyps atratus), Mississippi Kite (Ictinia mississippiensis), Purple Gallinule (Porphyrio martinica), Black-necked Stilt (Himantopus mexicanus), and Least Tern (Sterna antillarum). While driving north along Route 3 about three miles south of Grand Tower in southern Jackson County, Dan spotted a pale bird perched on a utility wire that was approximately 100 yards to the west of the road. We knew that a pair of Scissor-tailed Flycatchers had been seen nearby during the 2003 Spring Bird Count, so we thought this bird was a likely candidate for one of the flycatchers. Myrna made a speedy turnabout putting us in the southbound lane of this busy road. Closer inspection clinched the identification as a Scissor-tailed Flycatcher, but the sex was unclear at the time. The bird soon flew off into some nearby vegetation, but when it flew out I noted that this bird had a longer tail. At that time, we realized that we were seeing a male and that we must have originally observed a female. Both birds would eventually come into sight as they perched in nearby trees and on the utility wires that ran parallel to Route 3. The pair was actively feeding in acrobatic forays from their perches. After one such foray, the female was observed to feed another Scissor-tail a juvenile! As expected, the juvenile bird possessed a shorter tail than the adult female and had more prominent pale edging to the flight feathers than those of the adults. A yellowish wash to the flanks and perhaps the belly was also noted. We observed the female feed this begging young bird at least three times with one of the prey items appearing to be a dragonfly (Odonata sp.). The family group remained close to an isolated grove of three large sycamores (Platanus occidentalis) that had other medium-sized trees and shrubs growing near the base of the cluster. Two of the sycamores had sparse canopies while one had leaves of a typical density. The sycamores were present along the eastern shore of the Tower Island Chute with a strip of agricultural land positioned between the cluster of trees and Route 3. It was thought that the nest tree was within this group of sycamores.

Dan observed a second juvenile at the same location on 13 July 2003. This would be the last day that Scissor-tailed Flycatchers were seen at this particular location; however, Craig Litteken spotted a solitary bird within three miles of this spot on 16 July 2003. The sighting took place less than a mile east of Route 3 along Howardton Road (500 N) on the south end of Oakwood Bottoms in Jackson County. The brevity of the sighting prevented identification to age or sex.

#### Jackson and Union Counties - 2004

In hopes of finding a rare wader or some other summer-time rarity, Dan Kassebaum and I made a trip to several southern Illinois counties on 5 June 2004. One of our target species was the Scissor-tailed Flycatcher. We thought that our chances of finding one, or even a nesting pair, were good because Andrew Spencer found one at the Big Muddy River along the county lines of Union and Jackson on 1 May 2004. This location is immediately south of the Tower Island Chute where we confirmed successful nesting during 2003. We maintained an active search image for Scissortailed Flycatchers while driving north along Route 3 near the Big Muddy River and the Tower Island Chute.

As we were passing by Lower Chute Road in Jackson County, Dan spotted a pale bird harassing a crow (Corvus sp.). I found a place to turn around and quickly drove into Lower Chute Road. Within a few seconds, we found the bird sitting in the middle of the road and identified it as a female Scissor-tailed Flycatcher. It was flushed by a passing van shortly after we found it. We watched it fly for approximately a mile south toward the Big Muddy River until the distant speck was too small to see. Anticipating the location to which it had flown, we drove to the northern levee road (Island Road) along the north shore of the Big Muddy. After a short drive along the levee road, a scan of the nearby trees and vegetation vielded a Scissor-tailed Flycatcher perched in the middle of an eastern cottonwood (Populus deltoides). The bird seemed to have a longer tail than the female we had seen earlier. When

it flew from the tree, it was obvious that this bird was a male. The male flew to a fallow agricultural field to the north of the levee road, which is where we relocated the female. Both were observed flycatching from short perches atop weeds in this low, weedy field.

Given that we confirmed the presence of a pair, we decided to watch their actions to hopefully find evidence of nesting. An isolated clump of small trees at the border of this fallow field was a good candidate for a nest site given that the birds were spending quite a bit of time feeding in this area. The male was observed to perform a series of aerial somersaults along a horizontal plane near this group of trees. After this display, the male flew to a large pecan (Carva illinoensis) south of Island Road that was likely on the Union County side of the river. We had since lost sight of the female, so we decided to follow the male in hopes that he would lead us to a nest. We drove west along the southern levee road on the Union County side and found the male still perched high atop the pecan. Within minutes, the male flew to a nearby cottonwood. He would eventually make several short flights to a few of the tallest trees in the area, but returned to this tall and ragged cottonwood on a perch close to the center trunk that was obscured by foliage. The cottonwood was approximately 0.7 mile west of Route 3 and north of the southern levee road. From our viewpoint on the levee. Dan and I got out our spotting scopes to inspect the male's perch. Dan quickly located a modest nest just below the male,

then, seemingly out of nowhere, the female landed in the tree and sat in the nest. The nest appeared to be a loose cup of grasses and weeds situated on a horizontal branch on the eastern side of the tree. The distance from our observation point on the southern levee road to the nest prevented detailed looks to determine the composition of the nest materials. Upon further scanning of the cottonwood, an Eastern Kingbird (Tyrannus tyrannus) nest was found within a few feet of the Scissor-tailed Flycatcher nest. We were surprised by this discovery given the very aggressive behavior typically exhibited by the Tyrannus genus when defending territories and nest sites. No interspecific interactions were noted between the two pairs during our period of observation. In fact, we observed the females of both species sitting on their respective nests at the same time. I'm certain that any potential predator that wandered near this tree was penalized severely.

During this time of the year, the Big Muddy River was at flood stage, so most of the trees were standing in deep water including the nest tree and the willows (Salix sp.) at the lower edges of the levee roads. This made guesswork of the county line designations and tree heights, but we estimated the nests to be about 50 ft above the surface of the water. On several occasions, the female was observed to feed among some of the flooded vegetation along the river and was seen perched near ground-level on logs deposited from flood water. She was also noted to visit a particular group of dead trees directly in front of us appearing to collect small insects, which she then returned to her nest. Her behavior suggested that she was feeding young, but we were unable see the heads of hungry chicks to confirm this possibility. The pair remained in the immediate area of the nest site for the remainder of the afternoon. We never viewed the Scissor-tails on the east side of Route 3 during our stay, though our initial sighting was approximately a mile to the north of the nest site.

The nest site was believed to be in Union County given that the cottonwood appeared to be on the south side of the main river channel. If this were true, it would provide Union County with its second confirmed nesting record. But similar to the county's first nesting record in 2001, this nesting attempt also failed. A few observers were able to view the pair and the nest before mid-June at which point severe

storms accompanied by intense winds apparently destroyed a significant portion of the nest tree, including the nests of both the Scissor-tailed Flycatchers and the Eastern Kingbirds. During a visit to the area on the weekend of 3 July 2004, Eric Walters

commented that he observed more than 85 recently downed trees in the La Rue - Pine Hills Natural Area. Additional comments from a local resident indicated that two trees near to the nest site were also destroyed in the storm (IBET report - 5 July 2004).



18 Meadowlark

The severe weather must have passed through between 16 June and 26 June 2004 because Kay and Michael Kutska observed the pair of Scissor-tailed Flycatchers and their nest on 16 June 2004, but then upon returning on 26 June, they noted that the nests were missing as was much of the nest tree's upper canopy (IBET report - 29 June 2004).

Evidently after the storms destroyed their nest, the pair shifted their activity farther east, closer to Route 3. Several people reported seeing the pair feeding on the southern levee road and in trees within a few hundred feet of Route 3. Eric Walters was the first to report that the pair of Scissor-tailed Flycatchers had constructed a new nest in a different cottonwood. His initial observations took place on 3 July 2004. Later details indicated that Cindy McKee had previously found this nest on 26 June 2004. The orientation of the new nest was similar to the original because it, too, was placed on an eastern branch. The new cottonwood was reported to be the first tree on the southern levee road immediately to the west of Route

3, which was within Union County. Eric observed the female flycatching from this tree and even noted that she perched on the utility wires on the east side of Route 3. Eric stated that the female spent a significant amount of time brooding at the nest, but he did not observe any behavior indicating that young had hatched (IBET report -5 July 2004). Marlys Oosting reported seeing the male as well as the female on her nest on 8 July 2004 and described seeing the male bring food to the female on the nest (IBET report - 8 July 2004). Several observers trying for the Scissor-tails after 8 July found neither member of the pair and noted that Common Grackles (Quiscalus quiscula) were roosting in the second nest tree. Brian Herriott, Dan Kassebaum, and I visited this site on 17 July 2004 and found large concentrations of grackles still present along the Big Muddy. In fact, we also noted that grackles were perched on

the nest tree. We were unable to locate a nest in this tree, so it is possible that the grackles or some other entity removed the nest. However, another nest was found by Eric Walters about one-half mile away from this site, and later landowners reported a family group there. This could likely have been the renesting of the pair whose nest may have been destroyed by the grackles.

#### St. Clair County - 2004

On 6 June 2004, Tim Dever discovered a male Scissor-tailed Flycatcher near the town of Lenzburg in St. Clair County. After hearing about this sighting from a phone conversation with Tim, Dan Kassebaum checked the area on 17 June 2004 and found a female along with the previously reported male. He did not find evidence of nesting on this date. Dan and I, later joined by Albert Seppi, visited the site on 19 June 2004 and

easily found the pair feeding in an overgrown agricultural plot on the east side of Fred Huth Road at its intersection with Route 13. At the time, the field was being cut by a local farmer with his old tractor. The Scissortailed Fly-catchers took advantage of this situation for feeding and would remain very close to the tractor as it passed. Both birds spent large amounts of time sitting on the ground atop the freshly cut grass and weeds. Occasionally, the birds would perch along the utility wires that ran parallel to Fred Huth Road. It wasn't long after Albert arrived that we saw the female fly in a straight and direct path to the south across Route 13 to one of the few large trees in the immediate area. We thought this "directness" was peculiar and decided to scope the tree to see if there was a nest. Indeed there was! Dan and I found the female attending to a grassy mass near the center of the tree. The nest was placed in a Siberian elm (Ulmus pumila) positioned in the vard of a small farming complex complete with a barn. grain elevators, Rock Pigeons (Columba livia), and a house, all

of which were on the south side of Route 13. The nest site was in a hazardous position for the flycatchers—it was less than 75 ft away from a very busy highway.

By chance, some people that Albert knew drove by and stopped to see what we were watching. We pointed to the Scissor-tailed Flycatchers feeding quite close in the field next to us along Fred Huth Road. When we showed them the nest in the yard across the street, they mentioned they knew the landowners. With permission from the homeowners, we were soon viewing the flycatchers and their nest at close range. This position gave us the ability to approximate that the nest was about 30 ft high. The close view of the nest also allowed us to determine that it was loose mass of plant material largely composed of dried grasses and woody stems. Once in a while, the female would bring material to the nest. After inserting the material into the nest structure, she would sit in the nest apparently forming the inside cup. On the occasions that the female flew to the nest, the male would soon follow and perch conspicuously on a high branch. Several of these flights were dangerously low over the highway. During the three hours that we observed the pair, they spent most of their time feeding and gathering nest material in the overgrown field on the north side of Route 13.

Ouite a few birders were able to observe these birds, especially St. Louis area residents. The last known observation of the Scissor-tailed Flycatchers from this location took place on 26 June 2004. Ultimately, this nesting attempt failed. Observers noted that the pair was being harassed by European Starlings (Sturnus vulgaris) on 25 June 2004. Dan Kassebaum checked the area on 27 June 2004 and found a large group of Common Grackles roosting in the nest tree; furthermore, the pair of flycatchers was missing, and the nest was gone. Apparently, the nest succumbed to predation, and the pair moved on to a new location. No other Scissortailed Flycatcher reports would come from this area during the remainder of 2004.

#### Conclusion

Illinois has had a steady flow of Scissor-tailed Flycatcher reports over the past 120 years with reports continually on the rise. The year 2004 was exceptional for Scissor-tailed Flycatchers in Illinois; there were three confirmed nesting attempts and eight additional sightings away from these nest sites. Scissor-tailed Flycatchers have nested or attempted to nest in Illinois during four of the past five years. More nesting attempts will certainly be documented in the future, but unfortunately, birding activity is low in many areas of the state where this species is most likely to nest.

All known records for the counties that have confirmed nesting attempts (Jackson, Randolph, St. Clair, and Union) have been listed in Table 1. The records from Clinton and Monroe Counties have also been included in the table since observations suggest that nesting has likely occurred within their borders. Immediately noticeable

in the table are the recurring sightings in similar habitat and at specific sites. The number of sightings within the Mississippi River floodplain is significant as it indicates a long-term presence of Scissor-tailed Flycatchers in the region since at least the late 1960s. The observation of a pair in Monroe County during the summer of 1968 with many more subsequent sightings along the bottomlands of the Mississippi River present the possibility that Scissor-tailed Flycatchers have been nesting in Illinois for much longer than recorded.

Some reports of Scissor-tails in southern Illinois during late spring and early summer have precluded nesting attempts, and in a few of those cases, nesting was not observed until several years later. Prior to the nesting records of 2003 and 2004 near the Big Muddy River, a female had been photographed by Terry McNeely and Steve Kinder at the river on 24 April

This situation is very similar to that observed in Randolph County when a Scissortailed Flycatcher was found during the summer of 1995 close to where a pair nested in 2000. Clutch initiation has been found to be strongly correlated to the spring arrival of females at the nesting grounds (Regosin and Pruett-Jones 1995), so from late April through the breeding season, observers should carefully examine the behaviors and movements of any female found in suitable habitat because there may be evidence of nesting.

The site fidelity exhibited by this species will probably play an important role in the discovery of future nesting attempts. Checking areas that have had previous nesting activity may yield interesting results. Will the pair return for another nesting attempt near Lenzburg? Will the Big Muddy River pair be successful in 2005? There's only one way to find out.

# Clay-colored Sparrows successfully nest in DuPage County with comments on possible expansion as a breeding species in Illinois and Iowa

While walking through Springbrook Prairie Forest Preserve in Naperville, DuPage County 11 May 2003, I heard the characteristic buzzbuzz-buzz of a Clay-colored Sparrow (Spizella palida). Finding a Claycolored Sparrow in northeastern Illinois in spring is not unusual since the species is a regular migrant through this region. However, as 1 approached the field where the sparrow was singing, I heard another, and another. In all, I detected seven males singing in this one field, which was certainly the largest number of Clay-colored Sparrows I had ever observed in Illinois in one day.

The Clay-coloreds were in one of the many old field habitats at Springbrook Prairie. The habitat is a mixture of non-native grasses with numerous shrubs (gray dogwood, multiflora rose) and small trees (< 10 ft) scattered over an area of about five acres and bordered by more mature tree rows. The field appeared to be suitable nesting habitat for this

Clay-colored Sparrow at DuPage County, June 2004. Photo by Joe Suchecki. species, and I consistently found the birds at this same field throughout May. The singing males were remarkably faithful to their song perches and appeared to be defending territories.

As June approached, the number of singing males declined until only three were present. I searched for breeding evidence and nesting behavior and finally observed a copulating pair in late June and one adult feeding two fledglings on 12 July. This confirmed the first-known nesting record for this species in DuPage County.

Male Clay-colored Sparrows are known to be very faithful to their breeding territories, and Knapton (1994) reports that as many as 76% of males return to the same territory in succeeding years. Hoping for the best, I again checked the Springbrook field where the birds nested in 2003 and was pleased to find several males on territory in May 2004. At least three males were on territory and presumably nesting in the same shrubby field where the species nested the previous year. In addition, a fourth pair was located in a different shrubby field about 0.5 miles away from the first location. Successful nesting for a second year in a row was confirmed 26 June 2004, when I observed an adult carrying food and feeding a fledgling.

In 2004, Clay-colored Sparrows also were present at other locations in northeastern Illinois, and there were at least two other confirmed nestings. June sightings of territorial males (or pairs) included Timber Ridge Forest Preserve in northern DuPage County (personal observation); Orland Grassland, southern Cook County where Wes Serafin observed a Clay-colored Sparrow singing continuously on 26 June and chasing Field Sparrows

from his area; and Lakewood Forest Preserve, Lake County where Steve Bailey found two counter-singing males on 13 May and returned 19 June to find a male and a female. Later in July he discovered a used Claycolored Sparrow nest at the base of a small sapling (S. Bailey pers. comm.). Judy Mellin confirmed nesting Claycolored Sparrows at Poplar Creek Forest Preserve in northwestern Cook County in both 2003 and 2004. She observed Clay-colored Sparrows feeding young 26 June 2004 at Poplar Creek in about the same spot she had seen it nesting in 2003. The males each year had different songs, according to Mellin, with the 2003 male singing a two note buzz and the male from 2004 singing a one-note buzz. She posits that the 2004 male could have been an offspring of the 2003 male. Eastman (2000) wrote, "Each male possesses one or two distinct song types that remain consistent: differences between the types exist in the number of buzzes voiced and total song length. Thus individual males make life easier for researchers of this species by reliably identifying themselves in the field."

Jon Duerr confirmed an adult Clay-colored Sparrow with three juveniles in the north section of the Aurora West Forest Preserve, Kane County, in 2004. Scott Cohrs said he was birding the preserve 9 July 2004 when he heard two Clay-colored Sparrows singing along with a Bell's Vireo nearby. Scott contacted Jon, suspecting the sparrows might be breeding. Jon returned 11 July and observed a female Clay-colored Sparrow foraging with three juveniles within the branches of a young apple tree. The family moved around in other shrubs. In 2004, where the sparrows nested, Kentucky blue grass, smooth brome and quackgrass dominated the area, with lesser amounts of wild grape, Virginia creeper, hairy aster, rough avens, teucreum, Canada thistle, common milkweed, bindweed and dandelion. A shrub layer is forming were where the plants are 1 to 3 m high and are spaced approximately 10 m apart. No species dominates and the highest shrubs are apple, American elm and black cherry. Clones of gray dogwood, multiflora rose and bluefruited dogwood were one to two meters high. A few buckthorn and hawthorn were also present (J. Duerr pers. comm.).

So in 2004, a minimum of four confirmed nestings of Clay-colored Sparrows occurred in Illinois, one each in DuPage, Lake, Cook and Kane Counties.

Knapton (1994) shows the normal breeding range of this species to be the northern tier of states from upstate New York west to Washington and northwest in Canada to the Northwest Territories. In the Midwest, the normal breeding distribution includes the northern two-thirds of Wisconsin and Minnesota. However, recent range expansions to the east and south are noted.

Bohlen lists isolated summer season records for northern Illinois including June and July records for Lake and Cook counties in the 1970s and 1980s. However, confirmed nesting was only reported at a Rockton area Christmas tree farm, Winnebago County, where two nests were found in 1983 (Pucelik & Pucelik 1984). A review of past breeding season reports in the *Meadowlark* provide evidence of periodic nesting of this species at this site until 1998 when no males were present at their traditional nesting locations.

An interesting question is whether the presence of Clay-colored Sparrows in several northeastern Illinois locations over the last two years represents a geographic expansion of the species' normal breeding range or simply an aberration. I speculate that the initial appearance of seven singing males in one field at Springbrook Prairie in 2003 was the result of unusual circumstances during migration that carried this small flock of

birds off course. Their appearance was preceded by very strong and consistent westerly winds of 40-50 mph a day or two before their arrival. Perhaps finding themselves blown by the strong westerly winds into unfamiliar territory but suitable habitat, and reinforced by their singing rivals, the males remained and were able to attract later migrating females through their persistent song.

However, the fact that there were several likely breeding pairs at other suitable habitat sites in northeastern Illinois in 2004 as well as confirmed breeding at Poplar Creek in 2003 and 2004, confirmed breeding in Kane County in 2004 and confirmed breeding in DuPage County in 2003 and 2004, and at least attempted breeding in Lake County in 2004 may suggest a more general and widespread cause for the species' appearance. A singing male, recorded on an Illinois Natural History Survey bird census in Winslow Township in Stephenson County on 3 July 2004 by Bill Reddinger (pers. comm S. Bailey), and apparently on territory, makes one wonder if this unusual breeding range expansion was even more widespread. Interestingly, Clay-colored Sparrows, relatively uncommon summer residents of Iowa's prairies, pastures and brushy fields, have also just been confirmed as breeders in contemporary history (Hall 2004). Most summer reports come from northwest Iowa. Nesting records are rare, and have been reported in Kossuth, Winnebago, Jackson and Emmet counties - in the early 1900s. Hall (2004) researched grassland bird productivity in northwest Iowa in 2003 and 2004; he and his field technicians found and monitored five Clay-colored Sparrow nests, two found in June 2003 and three in June 2004 - four of these were on a 160-acre prairie remnant in west-central Dickinson County, the other was on a 3,500-acre restored grassland complex in east-central Dickinson County.

These nests were built an average of 6.6 inches above the ground in plants including leadplant, wild bergamot, buckbrush and *Solidago sp.* In 2003, young fledged from both nests. In 2004, two of the three nests failed, possibly due to predation; none con-

tained Brown-headed Cowbird eggs. "Although it has been suspected for several years that Clay-colored Sparrows nest in lowa, these nests finally document the presence of a small breeding population," wrote Hall.

Birders should continue monitoring known Illinois nesting locations as well as search other suitable habitats in northern Illinois to document whether this species is becoming a normal component of the state's breeding avifauna, or whether this is just a temporary, interesting phenomenon.

# Ospreys successfully nest at Carlyle Lake

Throughout the summer of 2003, Dan Kassebaum noted a banded pair of Ospreys engaging in courtship behavior at the James Hawn Access at Carlyle Lake, Clinton County. The pair was also found to be interested in constructing a nest as they were observed carrying large sticks to a dead tree that stood in the middle of a sheltered cove. Dan approached Dick Connor of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to advise the construction of nesting platforms away from the main cove given the proximity of

the Ospreys' activity to an area of frequent boat traffic. Within a short amount of time, Dan and Keith McMullen were invited to participate in the construction of three nesting platforms, two of which were placed at Whitetail Access and one at James Hawn Access.

The pair of Ospreys returned to the James Hawn Access the next spring and were first noted on 3 April 2004. By 17 April, the pair had completed construction of a nest atop the platform placed in 2003. The female was observed to be incubating by 17 April. No young were noted until 25 June when two downy chicks were visible. The prolonged incubation period from 17 April to 25 June suggests that complications were encountered. Only a single downy chick was observed at the nest on 10 July. It is assumed that the other

chick perished. The remaining chick survived to fledge as it was observed in flight on 21 August 2004.

In addition, a pair of Ospreys fledged one young 15 August 2004 at Lake Calumet's Powderhorn Marsh, Cook County, (pers. comm. W. Marcisz). A nest at Mermet Lake, Massac County, in May and June failed after a storm (pers. comm. K. McMullen).

These confirmed, successful nestings at Carlyle Lake and Powderhorn Marsh represent the second and third successful breeding of Osprey in Illinois in the 20th and 21st centuries. The Merinet breeding attempt marks the fifth nesting location since 1952, although nesting may have occurred there between 1978-1982 (Robinson 1996). The first 20th century breeding attempt was at Crab Orchard National Wildlife Refuge in 1952 and the second would not be until 1996 at Bergman Slough, Cook County. The birds did not fledge young that year, nor did they fledge young in 1997

# Field Notes 2004 Breeding Season

The 2004 Breeding Season was somewhat cooler and drier than usual with average statewide temperatures one to two degrees and rainfall one or more inches below normal. However, the more than normal spring moisture was adequate to retain the quality of nesting vegetation and, as Larry Hood noted, the weather was "...quite good for nesting birds." He also noted that in west-central Illinois "...breeding success, based on singing males or young birds seen, was good... for the Northern Bobwhite, Yellow-billed Cuckoo, Chimney Swift, Eastern Phoebe, Eastern Wood-Pewee, Eastern Kingbird, Eastern Bluebird, American Robin, Gray Catbird, Rose-breasted Grosbeak, Indigo Bunting, Dickcissel, Chipping Sparrow, Eastern Meadowlark and Common Grackle. Species that did not seem to do well this year included: Black-capped Chickadee, Field Sparrow, Vesper Sparrow and Grasshopper Sparrow." Alan Anderson chimed in noting that 2004 was the "year of the Henslow's Sparrow."

Some of the most interesting breeding records this year included: Gadwalls (Hennepin-Hopper Lake), Northern Shovelers (Prairie Ridge State Natural Area), Redheads (Hennepin-Hopper Lake), Ruddy Ducks (several locations), Pied-billed Grebes (several locations), Ospreys (Lake Calumet, Carlyle Lake and Lake Mermet), Peregrine Falcons (traditional Chicago-area locations and Madison County), King Rails (Prairie Ridge State Natural Area), Virginia Rail and Sora (northeastern counties), Common Moorhen and American Coots (several locations), Black-necked Stilts (attemped nesting in at least two locations), Spotted Sandpipers (northeastern counties), Ring-billed Gulls (roof-tops at Des Plaines), Black Terns (Lake County), Barn Owl (Franklin County), Scissor-tailed Flycatcher (St. Clair and Union counties), Sedge Wren (widespread in large numbers), Henslow's Sparrow (large numbers in many locations), Blue Grosbeaks (expanding range), Painted Bunting (St. Clair County – return of banded male) and a major range expansion of the Claycolored Sparrow (DuPage, Cook, Lake and Kane counties). See article in this issue.

Some of the more disappointing accounts because of the lack of nesting records were for: Swainson's Hawk (nests, but no fledglings), Forster's Tern (both nesting colonies failed, Sandhill Crane (fewer than expected numbers reported), Yellow-bellied Sapsucker (none reported), and Brewer's Blackbird (nesting not reported).

In regards to NBSO (non-breeding summer occurrence) records, the following deserve special mention: American White Pelicans (several locations – still waiting to be con-

firmed as a nesting species), Black Vulture (Kane County), Swallow-tailed Kites (St. Clair and Brown counties), Merlin (Lake Chautauqua NWR), Laughing Gulls (at Chicago's KFC restaurant and two other locations), Franklin's Gulls (three locations including attempted nesting at Hennepin-Hopper Lake), other gulls (Lake Michigan sites), Caspian Terns (several northeast locations — still not confirmed as a breeding species), Black Skimmer (Springfield), Black-throated Green and Blackburnian warblers (Lowden-Miller State Forest), Swainson's Warbler (Heron Pond Nature Preserve — first observation during breeding season in many years), and Mourning Warbler (Illinois Beach State Park).

As has become traditional, the quantity and quality of notes submitted for the annual Breeding Season report continues to be extraordinary. Had more of the traditionally regular contributors made their notes available as well, it would have been even more phenomenal. This continues to prove that Illinois' field observers desire to provide a detailed record of Illinois ornithological history. So, as always, MANY THANKS to all of you who took the time to prepare and submit notes for inclusion in this Report. I urge you to continue doing so every year. I also wish to thank and congratulate the dozens of you who completed your assigned Breeding Bird Survey routes again this year; I hope you are pleased with the outcome of those results as they appeared in The Illinois Breeding Bird Atlas. Finally, the following persons are responsible for the data in this compilation and are individually acknowledged after the records they provided. As usual, considerable effort was made to be sure all printed information is correct, properly acknowledged and can be traced to the original source documents (now in the permanent record file) from which it was obtained. 
