Letter from the Editor

"Common" sense in birding

The winter has been long, snowy, and cold. But we birders have been cheered by the presence of White-winged Crossbills, Common Redpolls, and even a few Hoary Redpolls, keeping our binoculars at the ready to see where and when we might find another winter finch. (And we actually have a couple of exciting birds up here in northern and central Illinois that those deep Southern Illinois birders had to drive north to see!)

While I adore spring, I must say that as the Redwinged Blackbirds start singing in the back yard and House Finches start fighting with their voices for territory, I'm getting sad. You see, I've been extremely blessed with sometimes up to 120 Common Redpolls at my nyger feeders and on the ground, and eating snow on the top of my garage – nearly all winter!! They are still here in March as I write this note, and I've had White-winged Crossbills in both the Douglas fir and the Colorado blue spruce in my yard.

Just as with the record Great Gray Owl invasion in Minnesota several years ago, there might not be a crossbill/redpoll invasion like this for decades. One can get almost complacent and ho-hum about driving through an Illinois suburban neighborhood filled with conifers and finding a couple more pink birds with white wing bars prying open cones for the protein inside.

One can get complacent about almost any "common" bird. The robins are back, declares a nonbirding friend, to which a birder, myself included, feels compelled to say, "Yeah, yeah, but did you know they are here year-round and they're not really harbingers of spring?"

One of my favorite birders – you all know who he is – has been going out nearly every day this fall and winter to get his White-winged Crossbill fix. I admire that passion. I admire the joy that comes with seeing yet another pink bird in a tree, and observing its behavior.

And I've found in the past few years that just watching a cardinal fly, a gull take a curve in the wind, a finch preen, can still bring me joy – especially in these difficult economic times when we begin to remember that the best things in life truly are free.

Sharing the joy of watching a "common" bird with a beginning birder is so fulfilling. I took a 10year-old boy out to Illinois Beach State Park this winter and found him a Common Goldeneye. You would think he had seen an Ivory-billed Woodpecker, he was so excited.

While you're out reveling in spring migration and tallying species on the annual spring bird count, perhaps you've got a moment to show a newbie birder his or her first Indigo Bunting or even an American Goldfinch male all decked out in his handsome new nuptial plumage.

Illinois Breeding Bird Population Trends:

1980 - 2006

Introduction

The North American Breeding Bird Survey (BBS) is a roadside survey of birds conducted annually in the continental United States and southern Canada (although some routes have recently been added in Alaska and northern Mexico). The survey program was designed by Chandler Robbins and his colleagues at the Migratory Bird Population Station (now the Patuxent Wildlife Research Center) in Laurel, Maryland in the 1960s (Sauer et al. 1997). The survey program was field tested during 1965, and the North American BBS was formally launched in 1966 with the running of 533 routes in the eastern U.S. and Canada (Sauer et al. 1997). After its launch, the program continued to expand and by 1968, 2000 routes had been established across the contiguous 48 states and southern Canada (Sauer et al. 1997). The surveys are conducted during the peak of the nesting season in June and consist of 24.5 mile long routes along secondary roads in which experienced observers stop at 0.5 mile intervals along the route and record all the birds seen or heard during a three-minute period. The primary objective of the BBS has been the estimation of population change for songbirds. The data have many other potential uses, however, and researchers have recently used BBS data to show how bird species respond to land use changes (e.g., Murphy 2003) or how birds respond to large-scale conservation programs such as the Conservation Reserve Program (e.g., Veech 2006). BBS data also play an important role in identifying bird species of concern, such as Audubon's Watch List (National Audubon Society 2007) or the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Birds of Conservation Concern list (United States Fish and Wildlife Service 2002).

Within Illinois the BBS was initiated in 1966 with the running of 15 of the state's 64 initial routes. The number of routes within Illinois remained at 64 until 1993 when another 17 routes were established. Nineteen more routes were added in 2001 bringing the current total of routes in the state to 100, a number that is exceeded by only three other states (Texas, California, Colorado).

Here I use data from the BBS for the period 1980-2006 to assess recent population trends of Illinois birds and also to evaluate life-history traits that are associated with these trends. I used two life-history groupings of birds, one based on species-habitat associations (grassland, wetland/open water, shrubland/early successional, woodland, and urban) and another based on migratory strategies (long-distance migrants, short-distance migrants, and permanent residents). Assignment of birds to groups followed the classification system developed for Midwestern BBS data by Herkert (1995), with supplemental information extracted from Sauer et al. (2007). Within each life-history category each bird species was assigned to only one group. Short-distance migrants included species that breed in Illinois and spend their non-breeding period in other areas of the United States. Long-distance migrants included species that breed in Illinois and spend their non-breeding period primarily south of the United States. Permanent residents included species that breed and winter extensively in Illinois. I limited my comparisons to species that have been encountered on at least 14 BBS routes within Illinois between 1980-2006. Estimates of Illinois breeding bird population trends used in this analysis were obtained from the BBS Website (http://www.mbrpwrc.usgs.gov/bbs/) and are shown in Table 1.

Fifty-nine of the 101 (58%) Illinois breeding bird species examined (Table 1) had increasing population trends between 1980-2006. The Eurasian Collared-Dove (+144.2%/ year), Wild Turkey (+21.7%/year), Sedge Wren (+19.5%, year), Turkey Vulture (+14.3%/year), and Great Egret (+14.2%/year) were the five species that showed the greatest estimated population increases within Illinois between 1980-2006. Bobolink (-9.5%/year), Savannah Sparrow (-7.8%/year), Grasshopper Sparrow (-6.6%/year), Red-headed Woodpecker (-5.6%/year), Kentucky Warbler (-4.6%/year) and Loggerhead Shrike (-4.3%/year) exhibited the greatest estimated statewide declines during this interval (Table 1).

The comparison of mean trends among guilds showed that grassland birds had the worst mean trend, and were the only guild with an overall mean negative trend within Illinois (Table 2). The grassland bird guild also had the lowest percentage of increasing species (Table 1), with just 10% of the grassland species showing positive trends in the state.



Birds associated with urban habitats had the highest overall mean trend as a group and the wetland/open water guild contained the highest percentage of increasing species (Table 2).

All three of the migratory guilds had overall mean trends that were positive. Permanent-residents had the highest overall mean trend (+8.6%/year) and also the highest percentage of increasing species (65%). Long-distance migrants had the lowest percentage of increasing

species among the migratory guild (52%) and also was the migratory guild with the lowest mean trend (+1.1%/year).

The BBS data show that population declines among Illinois bird species have not been equally distributed among bird guilds. In particular, grassland birds have declined more extensively in Illinois than have other groups of birds. Some of these population declines have been sizeable and point to a questionable future for some species unless



the causes of these declines can be identified and efforts to reverse them begun. For example, the estimated 9.9% mean annual decline for the Bobolink within the state (Table 1) is equivalent to a cumulative decline of more than 92% for this species between 1980 and 2006. Two other grassland birds, the Savannah Sparrow and Grasshopper Sparrow, have also experienced considerable cumulative declines. estimated at over 80% since 1980. Another eight species (Red-headed Woodpecker, Kentucky Warbler, Loggerhead Shrike, House Sparrow, Rock Pigeon, Chimney Swift, Northern Flicker, and Yellow-billed Cuckoo) have estimated cumulative declines of 50% or greater between 1980-2006 (i.e., annual declines of 2.6%/year or greater: Table 1). The causal factors for these grassland bird declines are most likely attributable to changing land-use practices that have substantially reduced the amount and quality of grassland nesting habitat in the state (e.g., Herkert 1991; Warner 1994, Ward et al. 2008a).

Presently fewer than 1% of Illinois' historic 8.9 million ha of tallgrass prairie remains (Samson and Knopf 1994). Yet grassland birds within the state have proved to be remarkably resilient and very few birds of Illinois' prairies have been extirpated as a result of this habitat loss (e.g., Herkert 1991). Initially, grassland birds were successful in shifting from native to agriculturally associated grasslands as these agricultural grasslands replaced the Illinois prairies (Graber and Graber, 1963). However, one of the most striking changes in the Illinois landscape over the last 100 years has been the loss of pasture, hay, and small grains (Ward et al. 2008a). In 1900, these three habitats accounted for 50% of the state's area, but by 2000 had been reduced to just 7% (Ward et al. 2008a). The loss of these secondary grasslands—mostly to row-crop agriculture—has undoubtedly displaced relatively large numbers of grassland birds within Illinois.

Wetland birds are not well sampled by the BBS's roadside survey methodology (Herkert 1995), and therefore the wetland bird guild trend included here may be somewhat misleading. BBS data suggest that the status of wetland birds in the state may be relatively good with a positive overall mean trend and more increasing than decreasing species (Table 2). However, this pattern is largely driven by a few species that are showing large estimated population increases such as Canada Goose and Great Egret (Table 1). Recent analyses of long-term data focused specifically on wetlands in northeastern Illinois, however, have shown that a majority of wetland bird species in this area are significantly declining with populations of Common Moorhen, American Coot, Blue-winged Teal, Black Tern, Sora, Yellow-headed Blackbird, and Least Bittern all showing signs of significant population declines (Ward et al. 2008b). All seven of these species are too rarely detected on the BBS within Illinois for reliable trend estimation.

BBS data can be viewed as indicators of the overall health of regional bird communities (Peterjohn and Sauer 1994), and as such these data indicate that grassland birds are not doing well within Illinois. For other groups of birds, overall trends appear to be better but all of these groups include individual species that are showing signs of significant population declines within Illinois and therefore may need some conservation attention.

From a broader view, the National Audubon Society's recent State of the Birds Report (Butcher and Niven 2007) found that 6 of the nation's top 10 declining common bird species have significant parts of their range within Illinois (Pollock 2008). Therefore stabilizing bird populations here in Illinois may provide broad population benefits for these declining species. Research is showing what it may take to stabilize bird numbers in Illinois (Pollock 2008). Resources, political will and concerned and observant management can reverse these declines, but as Pollock (2008) recently pointed out - it won't be easy.



Bird Finding Guide: Boone County

One of the few places left in Illinois where Cerulean Warblers likely breed is in Boone County. This male Cerulean Warbler was photographed at McClaughrey Springs, Palos Preserves, Cook County on 29 May 2009 by Nolan Lameka.



The county is predominantly agricultural, but there are several enjoyable places for birding, and the Boone County Conservation District (BCCD) is working to acquire many of the remaining natural areas. This article will survey several locations attractive to migrating and nesting birds.

Geographic Features

Boone County was historically tallgrass prairie and savanna, which made it ideal for settlement and agriculture. The most extensive area of marsh and wetland lies in the



southeastern quadrant of the county, south of Garden Prairie, along Coon Creek, a tributary of the Kishwaukee River. Seasonal flooding frequently keeps this area from being productive for agriculture. The Kishwaukee River is a very high-quality stream which runs through the county, passing through Belvidere and entering Winnebago County to the west. The Boone County Conservation District has obtained a number of properties along the river, some of which it is replanting with native trees and prairie plants.

The northwestern portion of the county becomes more rolling and is bisected by Kinnikinnick Creek, another high-quality stream. The creek has carved its way through some hilly areas, creating cool ravines and dells which are attractive to a number of species of birds.

Garden Prairie Slough

Garden Prairie Slough is the local name for a permanent marsh and seasonally flooded wetlands that lie along Coon Creek in southeastern Boone County. Historically, this entire area was probably wet prairie and marshland. Garden Prairie lies nearly on the McHenry County line, and the respective county conservation districts, in conjunction with Illinois Department of Natural waterfowl, with the primary species being Canada Goose and Mallard, but American Black Duck and occasional puddle ducks can sometimes be found in the flock.

Spring and fall migrations are usually the best times to visit, with waterfowl during winter when water in other parts of the area is frozen. Birds are attracted by the trees and other vegetation, as well as the water

features. Avoid this park in summer.

You'll find many stops for gasoline and food in Belvidere and Rockford.

Motels are close by in Rockford at the intersection of I-90 and US 20 (business).

There is a large campground at Rock Cut State Park (815-885-3311) www.stateparks.com/rockcut.htm.

The 2008 Illinois Statewide Spring Bird Count

A new record number of Harris's Sparrows was tallied during the 2008 Illinois Statewide Spring Bird Count.

The 2008 Statewide Spring Bird Count was held on Saturday, May 10, marking the 37th consecutive year for the count, which began in 1972. Although there have been some poor-weather days in the past, this year was another excellent day for birds, birders and birding. Arlene Brei (Boone County) said, "Another totally perfect birding day in Boone County; non-glare sun in the a.m., non-threatening clouds in the p.m., and mostly nothing but gentle breezes all day long." Frank Storment (Richland County) noted, "Count day turned out to be an excellent day, with sun in the morning and cloudy conditions in the afternoon. The winds were relatively light...and the roads were not as bad as I thought they would be after the 4 to 5 inches of rain we had here from Wednesday evening through Friday afternoon." Quotes suggesting that migration was a bit late this year are from Karen Forcum (Shelby County), "Our spring here was behind times; I had worried about the date [for the Spring Bird Count] being so late, but no need for worry about that. The migration was slower than usual and later than usual. But May 10 was an



ideal spring day...." and Richard Call (St. Clair County) indicated, "Water was high everywhere, and there was very little shorebird habitat. Passerine numbers seemed to be down and there was less bird song than usual."

Count day began with early morning temperatures ranging from the mid-to-upper 30s and low 40s in the north to the mid-to-upper 40s and low 50s in the south. Temperatures then peaked in the low-to-mid 60s in the north and upper 60s to low 70s in the south. Winds were highly variable in both speed and direction throughout the day with light breezes less than 10 mph to periodic gusts of 25-30 mph; the predominant direction for more than half the county reports indicated winds from the east to southeast; however, some counties reported southerly, westerly, and northerly winds as well. The morning sky was clear to partly cloudy (with occasional overcast); in the afternoon it remained clear in much of the north but gradually changed to partly cloudy and overcast over the rest of the state. An early to mid-morning fog was reported from several counties. Southern counties (plus Jo Daviess County) then experienced a slight drizzle in the late afternoon that, in the southern counties, turned into a steady rain after 6:30 p.m. (which affected the day-end birding in several counties).

Counters in Clinton, DeKalb, Jersey, and Vermilion counties began their counts at midnight; counting had begun by 3 a.m. in sixteen more counties and by 5 a.m. in another 39. Overall, 59 counties recorded at least some pre-dawn owling/railing hours (before 5:15 a.m.). Of the remaining 41 counties, most began birding at dawn or shortly thereafter; only 10 began as late as 6 a.m. or later with the latest starting time at 7 a.m. (two counties). At least 24 counties recorded owling/railing hours after dusk (after 8:30 p.m.) with six continuing as late as 10 p.m. including one until 11:30 p.m.

Table 1 compares the overall count results with those of the past two years and the record year. There were four new records in last year's table; however, there weren't any this year. The only 2008 listing that came close to a record was the 268 species – one short of the high (269) set in 1996. The total number of birds reported was 75,000 fewer



Resources, have received grants to purchase land from willing sellers to create a new wetland conservation area.

To get to Garden Prairie Slough. take US 20 west from Marengo to Garden Prairie Road, just west of the McHenry/Boone County line. (If coming from the west, take US 20 east from Belvidere to Garden Prairie Road). Turn south on Garden Prairie Road and proceed about 1.5 miles to the bridge over Coon Creek. Be sure to check the grain elevator about one-half mile down the road for Eurasian Collared-Doves. Immediately after crossing the bridge over Coon Creek, a cattail marsh will appear on your right (west), with some areas of open water. Yellowheaded Blackbirds have nested here, but have been absent for the past four to five years, presumably as the result of lower water levels during dry years.

Check both sides of the road and, when you get to Slough Road, about one-half mile south of the bridge, turn left and check for flooded fields and birds along the north side of the road after you go east of the hunt club barn.

The best time to visit is March and April, when the flooded fields are attractive to migrating water-

fowl. Sometimes the water covers hundreds of acres. At this time, look for Tundra and Trumpeter Swans, 5 species of geese, puddle ducks, and a few species of diving ducks. The divers, which prefer deeper water, normally aren't found here. In May, listen around the cattail marsh for American and Least Bitterns, Sora, and Virginia, and, occasionally, King Rails. If the surrounding plowed fields are still holding shallow water, this can be a particularly good place for shorebirds. The 2004 IOS annual meeting in Rockford had a field trip to the slough which produced a wide variety of latemigrating shorebirds, including White-rumped Sandpipers and a variety of other peeps. Hudsonian Godwits put in an appearance in 2007, and Black-necked Stilts have been recorded there twice. Keep an eye out for unusual waders. Osprey and Peregrine Falcons have been seen here quite often in migration.

The farm fields at the southern end of the marsh are often good places to find shorebirds. Recent planting and management changes in the property no longer result in seasonal plowing, so the former mud flats are not as extensive as they once were, resulting in reduced visibility for shorebird watching. Still, Wilson's Snipe are plentiful in March and April. This is also the area where a Garganey was found in a large flock of Blue-winged Teal in May 1999. Sandhill Cranes nest here.

In winter, the area should be checked for Northern Harrier, Rough-legged Hawk, and Northern Shrike.

Several local hunting clubs now own extensive tracts of the floodplain and their property is private. No entry by birders is permitted, so birding must be done from the road right-of-way. Don't be surprised to see Ring-necked Pheasants wandering along the roadsides, but they are probably releases from the hunt clubs.

Distillery and LIB Conservation Areas

Distillery and LIB Conservation areas straddle the Kishwaukee River west of the city of Belvidere. Each must be accessed separately. To reach the parking lot at Distillery, take US 20 west from Belvidere about 2.5 miles to Distillery Road. Turn left on Distillery and go 1.5 miles to the end and parking lot. To reach LIB, go west from Belvidere about 2.5 miles on Newburg Road to the wellmarked entrance on the north side of the road. The parking lot is immediately adjacent to the road. Trail maps are at the parking lot display boards, or can be obtained from the Boone County Conservation District headquarters.

Distillery is primarily a large area of open grassland abutting riparian woods along the river, with several tracts of upland hardwood on the ridges and higher areas. Boone County Conservation District has undertaken a project to plant extensive native prairie plants. From the parking lot, at the eastern end of the trail loop, there is a low ridge of hardwood trees. Running parallel to the ridge on the west is an area of cool season grasses. This area held Henslow's Sparrows for several years, although they move elsewhere after the area is burned. The new grasslands are attracting Bobolinks and Dickcissels, as well as Sedge Wrens, Field and Savannah Sparrows, Eastern Meadowlarks, Eastern Towhees (in the shrubby areas), and occasionally Northern Shrike in winter. Infrequently, Northern Mockingbirds occur. Look for Osprey over the river in migration, and Bald Eagles in winter and early spring. The grassland trail is a good place to look for a variety of migrant and wintering sparrow species.

The canoe launch at Distillery has been a fairly reliable spot to find Yellow-throated Warblers in spring and early summer. Check the sycamore trees just west (downstream) from the boat launch. Also look and listen for Cerulean Warbler, Northern Parula, and nesting Yellowbilled Cuckoo. In spring, this is an excellent location to find Yellow-bellied Sapsuckers.

Across the river at LIB, trails wind through stands of taller scrub vegetation, most notably hawthorn. This area is attractive to White-eyed Vireo, Yellow-breasted Chat, and Blue-winged Warblers. The trail also borders some oxbow marshes and enters floodplain forest along the river. As compared to Distillery, LIB tends to be better for migrant passerines. A good place to find migrants is the trail that runs under the high power lines between the parking lot and the river. Turn left (downstream) along the river, passing through the forest (good for thrushes here, particularly Veery) and out through the tall scrub in the northwestern portion of the property. Barred Owl and Wood Thrush are among the nesting species.

In winter, LIB often has flocks of Cedar Waxwings, lingering Hermit Thrushes (in the floodplain forest and scrub at the edge), occasional Northern Shrikes, Northern Mockingbirds, and a number of species of sparrows, including Song, Swamp, American Tree, Whitecrowned, and White-throated.

Kinnikinnick Conservation Area

Kinnikinnick is in northwestern Boone County, just northwest of the town of Caledonia. Take IL 173 west of Caledonia to Caledonia Road and turn north, proceeding 3.2 miles to the entrance, which is on the left just after you cross Wyman School Road.

Kinnikinnick has a variety of habitats, including hardwood forest with ravines through which a creek passes. This is an excellent location to find migrating passerines in both spring and fall. Carolina Wrens are occasional in the ravines in spring and early summer and, rarely, in winter. It is likely that you will see and/or hear a Veery in spring and early summer on the slopes. I found a Worm-eating Warbler one spring, and Pileated Woodpeckers are seen and heard intermittently. Acadian Flycatchers also nest here.

There are two extensive tracts of conifers which hold owls in winter. Check here for Cooper's Hawk and, rarely, Northern Goshawk, plus Barred and Great Horned Owl. The pines occasionally attract crossbills in winter, but, more commonly, Pine Siskins. A Pine Grosbeak was reported here in February 2009, and awaits documentation.

NOTE: BCCD closes Distillery, LIB, and Kinnikinnick on some selected fall weekends to allow hunting on the properties. Please call the headquarters number at the end of this article to check for closure dates before planning a fall weekend birding trip to those properties.

Cooling Sod Farm

This sod farm is located on Wheeler Road, south of US 20, just east of Cherry Valley, Illinois. The sod fields attract migrating Buff-breasted Sandpipers, Upland Sandpipers, Black-bellied Plovers, American Golden-Plovers and, more recently, Brewer's Blackbirds, from late July through September. In December, Baumann Park in Cherry Valley (Winnebago County) attracts gulls, but the gulls frequently loaf out on the sod farm in Boone County. The presence of gulls is probably related to nearby dumps on the Winnebago-Ogle County lines to the southwest of Cherry Valley.

From I-90, exit at MM 61 toward I-39. Take the Harrison Avenue exit east, toward Belvidere. Cross back under I-39, cross the Kishwaukee River bridge at Cherry Valley, and keep going east about 1.5 miles to Wheeler Road (there is a gas station on the corner). Turn south on Wheeler and, almost immediately, you will be passing through the sod farm property. Early morning is best because the sun will be behind you. Look west, where the fields are most extensive. The traffic is fast on Wheeler, so pull out only on the gravel pads that lead to the fields so that you can get completely off of the roadway.

DO NOT ENTER THE SOD FARM PROPERTY--IT IS PRIVATE AND POSTED.

About 1.5 miles on Wheeler, you will come to Rossiter Road. Turn right and scan for the next three-tenths of a mile before coming to Cherry Valley Road. Turn right on to Cherry Valley Road. In about one-fourth of a mile you will come to a gravel driveway that leads into the sod fields. There is an irrigation pump building at the intersection of the gravel driveway and Cherry Valley Road. Here is a very spacious area where you can pull off and scope to the north and northeast. This spot is particularly good in midto late-afternoon.

Spencer Conservation Area


This is another property owned by the Boone County Conservation District. It is on the southwest side of Belvidere, and is connected to Belvidere Park along the Kishwaukee River by a foot trail. This is a reliable spot for Orchard Orioles, and Sandhill Cranes have nested on the north side of the property behind the flooded gravel pit. Olive-sided Flycatchers are often seen in this park in late-May to early June, and in September. This area can be productive in migration and for winter residents, particularly near the gravel pit before the water freezes.

Belvidere City Parks

Belvidere Park, on Appleton Road in southwest Belvidere, is a fairly typical urban park set on the shores of the Kishwaukee River. There is a dam in the park, and the water below the dam is open all winter, even in the coldest weather. The open water below the dam attracts

than the record number in 1996 and 45,000 fewer than last year – perhaps this can be explained by the lower than usual number of observers (the lowest number since 1983 and 100+ fewer than even last year). Another 2008 positive was the number of party miles walked which increased considerably over other recent years despite the reduced number of observers.

As usual, Figure 1 is a visual reference to how well we did. The larger number in each county is the number of species reported in the county; the smaller number (in parentheses) is the number of observers. Figure 1 makes it easy to compare county results and to identify those counties where more assistance would be welcomed – especially those with four or fewer observers (note Clark and Edgar counties in particular) and fewer than 100 species. Although we fully anticipated participants in all 102 counties again this year, like last year, we fell two counties short.

Table 2 identifies those counties with 150 or more species. Cook County earned "top" honors again this year with 191 species (14 more than it had in its premier position last year); despite its large species total, the American Black Duck was the only species attributed solely to Cook County. Lake County, which often challenges Cook, tallied 184 species including seven species not reported elsewhere (Yellow and Black Rails, Ruddy Turnstone, Thaver's and Lesser Black-backed Gulls, Black-legged Kittiwake, and Brewer's Blackbird). In the other AREA 4 counties DuPage was third with 169 species and was followed with 150 or more in four other counties. Clinton County led the central counties (AREAS 2 & 3) with 176 species; Brown was a distant second with 157; four others achieved 150 or more. Williamson County led the southern group of counties (AREA 1) with 169 species and was followed by five more with 150 or more; Massac County's impressive tally of 151 species was achieved by a single observer. For the record, another 8 counties provided confirmed lists of 140 to 149 species and another 9 tallied 130 to 139 species. The record for the greatest number of species for a single county remains at 205 (set in 1983).

Table 3 identifies, in descending order, the counties with 20 or more participants. The list this year contains 18 counties (4 fewer than

last year); Cook and DuPage continue to field 100 or more participants. After the two high counts the number of participants in each county declines sharply. [And, once again, the annual plea: observers in all of the well-endowed counties are invited (encouraged) to become regular participants in one of the less-endowed counties. As the results in the various tables are scrutinized, it seems natural that more records could be established if there were more observers in some of the less-endowed counties. Figure 1 provides a quick reference to determine where more assistance would be useful; please note the absence of 2008 reports from Clark and Edgar counties this year. Of course, special thanks to those of you who have already made the transition and stayed true to your new counties and to those of you who made the change this year.]

Table 4 provides the usual comparisons of birding efforts in each quarter of the state—identified in Figure 1 as AREAS 1 through 4 (south to north). In 2008, the average number of party hours per county dropped slightly to 50.2 (compared to 51.5 in 2007).

Table 5 identifies the 55 species reported from 90 (90%) or more of the reporting counties. Only 17 (31%) of these were reported from all 100 counties; another 7 (13%) were reported from all but one county. For some reason, several species (such as the Mallard, Red-tailed Hawk, American Kestrel, Rock Pigeon, Chimney Swift, Northern Flicker, Horned Lark, Purple Martin, Barn Swallow, Tufted Titmouse, House Wren, Eastern Bluebird, Whitethroated Sparrow, and House Finch) escape detection in some of the counties. Even the House Sparrow was missed in two counties this year.

Table 6 shows, in descending order, the 20 most commonly reported species. The Red-winged Blackbird continues to be the most common species. The next nine are often the same year after year but change positions. This year the robin moved back into second place ahead of the grackle and starling; the latter two dropped to third and fourth places, respectively. The Canada Goose remains entrenched in fifth place well ahead of the House Sparrow. The House Sparrow moved back into sixth position with decreasingly lower numbers each of the last four years and only about 40% of the record number reported only six years ago. The American Goldfinch remained in the top ten as did the Brown-headed Cowbird (for only the second time). The Ring-billed Gull, which has recently occurred in the top ten dropped to 14th place this year and the Mourning Dove moved up into the ninth position ahead of the tenth place cardinal. The lower ten of the top 20 continues to show considerable variation.

The four species on last year's list that did not make it this year were the American Coot, Yellow-rumped Warbler, White-throated Sparrow, and White-crowned Sparrow (none of which were even close to the top 20 this year). Their replacements were Song Sparrow, House Wren (only its second time in the top 20), Chimney Swift, and Mallard. Two of this year's top 20, Indigo Bunting and House Wren, were reported in record numbers. For those who keep track, the American Crow would have ranked 25th again this year (and missed the list for the fifth consecutive year) and the cormorant, which ranked high for several years, was 23rd for the second straight year. During the Count's 37-year history, 43 species have appeared in the top twenty list, eight of which have made the list only one time. There were no new additions to the list this year.

Table 7 provides the maximum species details for a) the number of counties reporting the species; b) the total number of birds of each species reported; and c) the highest number of each species recorded in a single county (including the county in which that number was recorded). The 25 species reported from a single county appear in bold face. Some of the notable single-county records were the: Red-throated Loon (a first report for the Spring Bird Count), Glossy Ibis, Yellow Rail, Black Rail, Black-legged Kittiwake, Least Tern, Bewick's Wren, Golden-crowned Kinglet, and Painted Bunting. Some of the better records for the seven species reported from only two counties were Great Black-backed Gull, Le Conte's Sparrow, and Red Crossbill. Also included in the Table (at the end) are those species that are not officially countable in Illinois (and treated as "exotics"); this year none were reported, however, the Ringed Turtle-Dove is listed anyway (to indicate that it wasn't accidentally "skipped".

New Records. Table 7 also identifies all new and tied count records for each species. As expected, new records are more difficult to achieve

each year and when achieved, they most often surpass the previous record by only a small margin. The 49 new records have been identified by an asterisk (*) in the table; the 21 tied records, by a pound (#) sign. Had there been participants in all 102 counties and the usual number of observers, the number of new records would have been even greater. There were 17 new records for the Number of counties reporting the species. Some of the largest or most interesting increases in the number of counties were for: Wild Turkey (up 3), American White Pelican (up 9), Cooper's Hawk (up 6), Eurasian Collared-Dove (up 4)

more), Olive-sided Flycatcher (up 6), Lark Sparrow (up 6), Henslow's Sparrow (up 3), Harris's Sparrow (up 2), and Blue Grosbeak (up 10). There were 19 new records for the Total count of birds reported for those species in a single count year. Some of the largest or most interesting new high counts were for: Wild Turkey (up 181 birds), Turkey Vulture (up 813 birds), Redshouldered Hawk (up 38 birds), Sora (up 76 birds), Sandhill Crane (up 88 birds), Eurasian Collared-Dove (up 212 birds), Olive-sided Flycatcher (up 7 birds), Eastern Kingbird (up 239 birds), House Wren (up 192 birds), Gray Catbird

(up 338 birds), Summer Tanager (up 18 birds), Harris's Sparrow (up 6 birds), Blue Grosbeak (up 43 birds), Indigo Bunting (up 898 birds), and Bobolink (up 491 birds). There were 13 new records for the Total number of birds reported for those species in a single county. Some of the largest or most interesting records were for: Turkey Vulture (up 330 birds), Red-shouldered Hawk (up 11 birds), Caspian Tern (up 51 birds), Eurasian Collared-Dove (up 125 birds), Warbling Vireo (up 16 birds), House Wren (up 110 birds), American Robin (up 570 birds), Yellow Warbler (up 24 birds), and Brown-headed Cowbird (up 33 birds)

Species Comments. Both the Blue Jay and American Crow numbers remain subpar. There were 256 fewer Red-headed Woodpeckers this year than last year (not good!!) after what appeared to be a slight "gain" last year. The Gray Partridge was missed again this year, but the Bewick's Wren (this time in Brown County) was reported for the second consecutive year. The Black-legged Kittiwake was well-documented by a photograph. The nest of Barn Owls in St. Clair County increased the total for this species nicely. The Painted Bunting in Will County was a good find, with the addition of Redthroated Loon to the SBC list, the statewide cumulative count total now stands at 329.

Species Missed. As always, there are species that could-have or should-have been found that were missed. The Swainson's Hawk is certainly one of those (now missed for three consecutive years). Surely one bird could be findable for the Spring Bird Count? Other species that would have enhanced the 2008 list include: the Trumpeter Swans (not nesting in Carroll County this year?), Greater Scaup (often reported around Lake Michigan), Gray Partridge (as mentioned above), Eared Grebe, American Avocet, another godwit or the Whimbrel, Laughing Gull, Short-eared or Long-eared Owls, Winter Wren (none for only the 2nd year), an early Connecticut Warbler, Nelson's Sharp-tailed Sparrow, and Lapland Longspur. Of course, many county lists could have been enhanced as well had some of the local species known to be present been findable on count day.

Table 8 provides all the County Statistics. The columns are: 1) the county name; 2) the AREA (1, 2, 3 or 4) of the state in which the county occurs; 3) the number of confirmed species identified; 4) the number of countable birds reported; 5) the number of participating birders in the county; 6) the number of parties counting birds; 7) the earliest and latest birding times (in the 24-hour system with owling/railing hours before and/or after daylight hours marked with an asterisk "*"); 8) the number of party miles walked (W) and driven (D); 9) the number of party hours walked (W) and driven (D); and 10) the 2008 county compiler/coordinator.

Documentations. The majority of birds requiring documentation were properly documented again this year; those documentations have been forwarded to the Illinois Ornithological Records Committee for the permanent file. Unfortunately, the documentations for several count species were not received as required; so, those records (along with other poorly and non-documented records throughout

the state) had to be excluded from the report. With the aforementioned exclusions, the number of species printed in Table 8 for some counties may be lower than submitted by the county compilers.

Economic Considerations. For the third year I'm including an economic estimate of what birders donate by participating in the Spring Bird Count. As mentioned previously, birders spend a great deal of time and money in pursuit of birds and provide a significant impact to the local economy. It's still impossible to get (or give) exact figures and I'm still waiting for someone to suggest other meaningful figures. However, I'm going to continue using the three arbitrary standards and designated "values" initiated in 2006: 1) an "average" value for a person's time - \$18/hour; 2) the price of gasoline (which, in 2008, averaged \$4 per gallon on Count Day) or the mileage reimbursement rate for using a vehicle (40 cents per mile); and 3) the cost of food and drink (average of \$16 per person). And, as before, there are several other figures that could and should be included in this compilation, i.e., motels or other overnight accommodations, variable pre- and post-count expenses, unrecorded mileage to and from the count site, equipment, apparel, etc. However, we'll keep it simple (if that is possible).

1) 1,323 participants times an average of \$16 for food/drink consumption = \$ 21,000

2) an average of 7.6 participation hours per person (1323) times \$18 per hour [7.6 is based on 5021 daylight party hours x 2.0 persons per party + nocturnal party hours] \$181,000

3) 22,284 miles driven times \$0.40 per mile = \$ 9,000

(or, alternative: about 24,000 miles at 20 miles per gallon times \$4 per gallon = \$4,800)

Therefore, based on the above computations, plus the added time and mileage required for everyone to drive to and from the count site,

the nocturnal miles (which were not included in the mileage above), compilers time and expenses in preparing for and following up after the count, and other unlisted, but real expenses, the estimated economic "input" for the 2008 Spring Bird Count once again exceeds \$250,000 and may be more than \$300,000. If anyone out there is able to enhance this concept and offer some better standards and guidelines-please offer them.

The results of 37th Spring Bird Count are now in the record books-again, thanks to you ALL for making this possible.

Field Notes: The 2008 Spring Migration Season

The spring 2008 migration season from February through June included reports of 322 species in Illinois, including one exotic. Among these reports was a nice assortment of rarities. Among the best finds were 11 Black-bellied Whistling-Ducks in Clay County, a male Eurasian Wigeon in McLean County, a lingering adult Glaucous-winged Gull at Carlyle Lake, a Kirtland's Warbler at Chicago, a male Western Tanager in Champaign County, and Painted Buntings at feeders in both Winnebago and Saline Counties. Other remarkable reports pending acceptance by the Illinois Ornithological Records Committee (IORC) include: a female Garganey in Kane County, a Neotropic Cormorant at Carlyle Lake, single Prairie Falcons at two central Illinois sites, an adult Little Gull in far southern Illinois, Black-tailed Gulls in both Monroe and Lake Counties, a White-winged Dove at an Urbana feeder, a potential regional first Brown-crested Flycatcher at Carlyle Lake, five Bewick's Wren reports from four different counties, three Sprague's Pipits at Pyramid State Park and two additional in Clinton County, another male Western Tanager, a Bachman's Sparrow at Carlyle Lake, female Lark Buntings at two sites in central Illinois on the same date, and two Hoary Redpolls in Cook County in the latter half of March. Of the 31 reports requiring IORC review, only about 60% were accompanied by documentation.

Weather patterns during February produced below-average temperatures overall through most of the state. Some areas reported temperatures that were 10 to 20 degrees below normal much of the month. A significant winter storm passed through Illinois 31 January-1 February, affecting most counties. Substantial accumulations of snow were reported statewide, but a band from Jersey County to Kankakee County received the heaviest snowfall. Within this band, the highest reported snowfall came from Sangamon County, with localized totals exceeding 12 inches. Heavy precipitation became the theme of the 2008 spring season. A few periods during February saw above average temperatures. From about 4-5 February, southern Illinois experienced temperatures that nearly reached 70°F. A significant low pressure system passed through the state 16-19 February, bringing thunderstorms and Chicago's highest temperatures for the month (47°F). The first migrant Aythya ducks were reported at Chicago during this period. The beginning of a massive wave of White-winged Scoter reports began 22-23 February, with records from Lake Michigan and numerous downstate lakes. The season's final elevation in temperature bumped the mercury to meet, or just exceed, the average high for the period on 28-29 February. A total of sixteen species of waterfowl arrived through the latter half of February. Twelve additional species of migrants were noted as February arrivals, the most notable being three Red-throated Loons along Lake Michigan.

March weather systems continued to provide heavy precipitation; however, overall temperatures were more stable and generally in line with expected averages. The period from 1-3 March yielded strong southerly winds with gusts reaching nearly 40 mph. This system ushered in the arrival of at least 30 additional species and marked the first push of insectivorous migrants for the spring. Harlequin Duck and Varied Thrush in Cook County were the highlights of this wave. Though March temperatures were generally in line with averages, the passage of numerous low pressure systems throughout the month provided ample opportunities for eager migrants to travel north. The month of March showed a significant number of early arrivals, some of which were record early for the state, including a White-eyed Vireo on 20 March, single male Hooded Warblers at four (!) sites 21-25 March, single Yellow-throated Vireos at two sites 22-25 March, a Caspian Tern on 25 March, and an adult male Scissor-tailed Flycatcher on 27 March.

Heavy spring rains continued through April, leaving many areas flooded throughout the state, particularly in southern Illinois. A minor excursion in above-average temperatures was noted in central and northern Illinois 5-8 April, accompanied by southerly winds and a few new arrivals. A strong low pressure system passed through the state 9-15 April, which yielded heavy rains and significant migratory activity. Two record early arrivals were associated with this system: Gray-cheeked Thrush on 11 April in Sangamon County and Mississippi Kite on 15 April in Adams County. About 30 additional species were noted as arriving during this period, with a male Cinnamon Teal in Henry County being the most unusual. The first two individuals amid the biggest invasion of Black-necked Stilts ever recorded in Illinois arrived in Alexander County on 13 April. Black-necked Stilts were detected in at least seven counties by the end of April, the northernmost report coming from Coles County. Stilt numbers would continue to climb to record highs through the month of May and into June. From about 16-25 April, statewide weather was rather static, but winds maintained a strong southerly component, and temperatures climbed above average for the central and northern sections of the state. This period showed heavy migratory activity with more than 45 species noted as new arrivals, 15 of which were war-

blers. The most unusual migrants of this wave were an adult male Rufous Hummingbird in Adams County and a Spotted Towhee in Clinton County. From 26 April to month's end, temperatures were about average. April yielded a few record spring high counts: 13 Surf Scoters at Illinois Beach State Park, a total of 349 Common Loons in Lake and McHenry Counties, and a second-passage high count of 600 American Pipits at Carlyle Lake. Additional noteworthy observations through April included a Glossy Ibis in Alexander County 23 April-5 May, six White-faced Ibises in Union County on 25 April, and an extralimital Swainson's Hawk (pending IORC review) in Cook County on 26 April.

Gusty south winds initiated the month of May and persisted through 7 May. This system boosted temperatures to above average statewide through 6 May. A minor low pressure disturbance that passed through 7-9 May added more rain, shifted winds to the north, and dropped temperatures back to normal. Some interesting species were found during this period: a Pacific Loon at Emiquon National Wildlife Refuge, a Glossy Ibis in Lawrence County, and - very rare downstate - a Whimbrel in Brown County. An intense low pressure system entered Illinois the evening of the statewide Spring Bird Count on 10 May, dumping more rain onto an already saturated region and bringing wind gusts in excess of 40 mph. An immature Black-legged Kittiwake at Waukegan was among the finest of species recorded during the count. Reported just two days after the count were two extralimital Fish Crows in Cook County (pending IORC review). A series of insignificant weather systems occurred on 13-14 and 16-21 May that provided some limited south winds favorable for migration. A record-late Red-necked Grebe on 18-21 May was noted during this time. The center of a moderate low pressure system passed through Illinois the night of 25-26 May, providing some intense migratory activity, particularly in central Illinois. From the 28th through the end of May, a fairly strong and slow-moving low pressure system provided the last movements for the month. An adult Thayer's Gull on 28 May was record late. An overmigrant Mississippi Kite in Lake County was noted on 30 May. The month of May provided some record high spring counts, including 78 Blacknecked Stilts on 25 May, 101 Spotted Sandpipers on 9 May, 848 Caspian Terns on 10 May, 11 Connecticut Warblers in Urbana on 26 May, and 915 House Sparrows on 19 May.

Spring migration proceeded well into June. More than 85 species were noted as June departures, and of these, at least 15 were noted on or after 15 June. A large number of June departures were worthy of highlighting due to their significant tardiness; see the individual species accounts that follow.

Records not contained in original submissions by some of the cited observers in this report were contributed by local subcompilers for Chicago's Jackson Park (fide PRC) and Coles County (fide LBH). Several reports included in this compilation were extracted from text within correspondence to electronic mailing lists titled Illinois Birders Exchanging Thoughts (IBET) and Birdnotes (Champaign-Urbana area sightings). Dan Kassebaum provided useful historical summaries of Illinois data on warblers in particular. Many of the remarks regarding specific weather patterns, as well as historical references to such, were guided by data found at www.wunderground.com and www.nws.noaa.gov.


