Letter from the Editor

From the rare to the common

A decade ago, I witnessed one of the biggest Great Gray Owl invasions of my lifetime in Minnesota. Driving along curving one-lane roads, my companion, Steve Bailey, and I saw Great Grays perched perhaps every few miles, their white bibs standing out against their dark bodies in the snowy landscape.

A farmer invited us into his yard to get closer to one that was living in his field, and Steve took beautiful photos of the bird, which gave us a lasting impression of the joy we felt in experiencing such a rare occurrence.

Last winter season, we witnessed one of the biggest invasions of White-winged Crossbills right here in Illinois, and we had more Common Redpolls at our backyard bird feeders than we likely ever will have again. At one time, Steve counted more than 120 redpolls perched on thistle feeders, in the serviceberry and on the ground, voraciously snatching food for sustenance. I recorded the event with my new camera – taking one rather poor photo of a redpoll.

We saw White-winged Crossbills perched on a Douglas fir, Norway spruce and blue spruce in our yard. We observed crossbills drinking water from melting snow at St. Mary's of the Lake Seminary. We watched males and females extract seeds from cones and observed falling seed coverings that would lead us to another group of crossbills. Steve documented the types of cones the birds fed upon and watched as they moved to Norway spruces later in the season. Steve kept telling me – this may be the only time in our lives we see this magnitude of an invasion of crossbills in Illinois.

So, revel we did in this rare experience - especially Steve.

This winter season, we bemoaned the fact that crossbills, siskins and redpolls did not grace our backyard. Hopefully they have found sufficient food in their northern breeding grounds and did not need to fly south.

Still, we longed to see pink birds perched atop evergreens and feisty redpolls with their black chins shooing away the goldfinches from "their" feeders.

Winter birding this year is going to be boring compared with last year, Steve told me. I concurred.

Recently, Steve led an owl prowl at the Reed Turner Woodland. After his talk, he led us outdoors under a full moon and tried to call in an Eastern Screech-Owl. The stars were aligned that night to treat 16 observers to close looks of not one, but two screech-owls. One sat right above us giving its tremolo call on a cold, but windless evening when we again witnessed the miracle of nature. One flew in, landed, posed, then flew across the line of observers, landing for another pose. We could clearly see it was a gray phase, and no one even needed binoculars.

Screech-Owls are numerous in Illinois, Steve tells me. "They're easy to find," he says. Well, maybe for him. But that magical night gave me just as much of a thrill as seeing a White-winged Crossbill sipping snow and picking out a Hoary Redpoll amongst all the Commons at the Chicago Botanic Garden last year.

Mind you, if I had to choose, I might go with the crossbills, redpolls and Great Gray Owls. But that evening with the screech-owls was a reminder that when we pause to go beyond our daily lives and enter another dimension called birding, there's always something wondrous to see.

See you in the field.



Winter Gull Identification Challenges at Carlyle Lake and Melvin Price Locks and Dam in Illinois

Identification of the large white-headed gulls can make for exciting birding in late winter.

Given the complexity of plumages within the American Herring Gull complex (*Larus argentatus*), documenting potential vagrant gulls becomes quite a challenge.

Included here are photos of interesting gulls observed during the 2008-2009 winter season at Carlyle Lake, Clinton County and the Melvin Price Locks and Dam, Madison County. Each of the birds is unique in that the field marks suggest an identification other than American Herring Gull. As of yet, none of the records has been evaluated by the Illinois Ornithological Records Committee (IORC), and all tentative identifications are still open to further research and debate.

GULL #1

25 January 2009, Melvin Price Locks and Dam, Madison County: In the field, this was a very clean bird with an unmarked head, which is atypical for American Herring Gull in late January. The iris was dark and the legs were straw yellow. Compared with the nearby American Herring Gulls, the bird was similar in size, but the bill seemed narrow and did not display a strong gonydeal angle. In flight, P9-P10 had large white mirrors, and the tongues extended well into the black of the primaries. These features match best with Caspian Gull (L. cachinnans), a species from eastern Europe and Central Asia. This represents an outlandish identification, but I'm at a loss to offer any other suggestion.

GULL #2

28 January 2009, Carlyle Lake, Clinton County. Photographed from atop the dam, this very cooperative gull circled lazily overhead to provide for an excellent set of flight shots. This was a huge gull with a




Figure 3. Western Gull? Photo taken 28 January, 2009 at Carlyle Lake, Clinton County by Dan Kassebaum.

very large torso and bill. The outer primaries were dark on the outer webs but pale on the inner webs. The tail, which may be the best field mark, was entirely dark without the spotting or marbling typical of an American Herring Gull. These photos were circulated among several west coast birders, which yielded comments such as "definitely not a Herring Gull" and suggested identifications of Western Gull (L. occidentalis) or Slaty-backed Gull (L. schistisagus).




Figure 4. Western Gull? Photo taken 28 January 2009 at Carlyle Lake, Clinton County by Dan Kassebaum.

GULL#3

16 February 2009, Carlyle Lake, Clinton County. A set of rather distant photos of American Herring Gulls at roost along the rocks. One bird seemed unusual with a bulbous bill and the development of a dark mantle. Visible when its wings were stretched, the primaries were brown, not black, and the inner primaries had brown tips. In flight, this bird had wings with very low contrast that resembled that of a Thayer's Gull (*L. thayeri*). These field marks are associated with 1st cycle Slaty-backed Gull.




Figure 6. Vega Gull? The bird behind the dark-plumaged first-year American Herring Gull on right. Comparison with other gull species reveals the subject gull's darker mantle coloration. Photo taken 8 March 2009 at Carlyle Lake, Clinton County by Dan Kassebaum.

GULL #4

22 February and 8 March, 2009, Carlyle Lake Clinton County. At roost with American Herring Gulls, this bird's mantle seemed a shade darker. Photos reveal an orange/pink orbital ring and bright pink feet.

In flight, the string-ofpearls pattern associated with Slaty-backed Gull can be seen as well. Vega Gulls, like American Herring Gulls are quite variable, especially in regards to iris color which can range from typically dark to pale. This bird had been shot through the wing, but appeared healthy and seemingly unhampered by the injury.

Fifteenth Report of the Illinois Ornithological Records Committee

Evaluations by the Illinois Ornithological Records Committee ("IORC," or "the Committee") are reported here for a total of 36 records, including 33 accepted records of 26 species, and two unaccepted records of two species. A total of 48 observers contributed reports, including descriptions or photographs documenting the records included in this report. Included are reviewed species evaluations by the Committee from 2007 though 2009.

Format: The format of this report follows the conventions used in the first through fourteenth reports of the Committee (e. g. Goetz and Robinson 1988; Goetz 1989; Johnson, Deaton and Clyne 1998; Johnson and Stotz 1999; Stotz and Johnson 2000; Stotz 2001; Stotz and Johnson 2003, Stotz 2008). The records below are divided into two major groups: Accepted and Unaccepted. Each of these groups is then further divided into First State Records, Review List Records, and Other Records. The sequence of species conforms to that of the seventh edition of the American Ornithologists' Union's checklist, (1998) and its supplements, through the 50th (Chesser et al. 2009).

An accepted record is entered with the locality, including county, the date, and (in parentheses) the IORC record number (the first four characters of which give the year of the first observation), and the initials of the primary observer(s) who contributed specimens, descriptions, and/or photographs. Similar information is provided for unaccepted records, except the observers remain anonymous, and a brief explanation of why the record was not accepted is given. Photographic evidence is noted following a contributor's name by an

asterisk (*). When the photographic evidence is known to be a videotape, a "v" is appended (*v); *p,v indicates both photographic and video evidence presented by same contributor. Many contributing photographers also submitted written descriptions a practice the Committee encourages. Sound recordings are indicated by a + following the contributor's name. If the observer who first discovered the bird is known to the committee, their initials are set off from the initials of other contributors by a semicolon. Initial observers who did not submit documentations are not always listed. For specimen records, a sharp (#) follows an abbreviation for the institution holding the specimen, along with that institution's catalog number of the specimen if available.

Several records that were seen by several to many observers were documented by only one or two of these observers. The Committee would like to encourage all observers to document all the review list species they see. Documentation by multiple observers can provide additional evidence and support for the identity of rarities. Often records that have not been accepted suffer from incomplete information, a problem which additional documentation by other observers could help overcome.

Information on the age and sex of the birds reported may be an opinion of the person(s) submitting the evidence and is not necessarily an accepted position of the Committee. All other remarks are the author's, although most of the information comes from the Committee files which are now stored in Chicago, Illinois, in the Bird Division of the Field Museum.

In several cases there are discrepancies between the details present-

ed here vs. other published sources, especially regarding dates of occurrence. The data in this report provide the Committee's best assessment of all available information. We have not generally commented on records that are published elsewhere with more limited data than contained here. The Committee accepts responsibility for any inaccuracies or misrepresentations of information herein. Errors that come to our attention will be published as corrigenda in a future IORC report.

Abbreviations: References to seasonal reports in the journals Illinois Birds and Birding; Meadowlark, A Journal of Illinois Birds; American Birds and North American Birds are abbreviated by IBB, MJIB, AB, and NAB, respectively, followed by volume and page numbers. Months are abbreviated by their first three letters.

"Northern", "central", and "southern Illinois" refer to specific subsections of the state as first defined by Gault (1922); see also Bohlen (1978). The terms "region" and "regional" apply to the Middlewestern Prairie Region as used in NAB and include Illinois as well as Iowa, Missouri, Indiana, and most of Ohio and Kentucky.

Review List: The Review List includes species for which the committee will review all records or all records outside of some determined range within the state. These are species that, in general, average two or fewer records per year in the state, or which are extremely rare in all but a few counties in the state. The current review list was approved at the 21 September 2008 committee meeting. IORC requests and welcomes evi-

dence concerning all records for the review species listed on the review list on the IOS/IORC website: www. illinoisbirds.org/iorc.html.

In addition, any species not listed in the checklist of Illinois state birds (IORC 1999) should be documented. Documentation of regular species may be appropriate when they occur out of season—i.e., exceptionally early arrival dates or late departure dates for migratory species. All first state nesting records should also be documented. Exceptionally high counts of species may also merit documentation. These documentations of nonreview list species should generally be sent to the seasonal editor of the Field Notes in the Meadowlark, Both the Christmas Bird Count and Spring Bird Count require documentation of a greater range of species. Such documentations should be sent to the appropriate compiler. Some records from each of these long-term projects are reviewed by IORC, and the

documentations supporting observations of rare birds on them are largely stored at the Field Museum with the other IORC archives.

ACCEPTED RECORDS

New State Records (four records of two species)



Mountain Plover (Charadrius montanus) One photographed in sod farm at Momence, Kankakee Co. on 13 to 18 Sep (2008.026; JBH*; GN). This bird was found on the 13th. Numerous observers looked for the bird on the 14th, but it was seen by only a handful of observers. It was not seen subsequently until it was photographed again on the 18th. Mountain Plover is quite a rare vagrant into the eastern United States. There are fewer than ten previous records from east of the Mississippi River (AOU 1998, Knopf and Wunder 2006).

The Cave Swallow was officially added to the Illinois bird species list in 2008. The photo of a Cave Swallow was taken in Olney, Richland County on 16 November 2008 by Bob Shelby.

This photo was published in Meadowlark: Vol 18, No. 2 and credited to the incorrect photographer. The photo was taken by Jed Hertz, who discovered the Mountain Plover in a sod farm at Momence, Kankakee County, and documented the first state record of this species.

Cave Swallow (Petrochelidon fulva) An immature bird was photographed in a large mixed flock of swallows at Clement Township, Clinton Co. on 13 Sep (2008.027; DMK*, MSS*). Both observers believed that at least two birds were present, perhaps more. However, the photographs do not clearly document more than a single bird. One adult female found dead at McCormick Place, Chicago, Cook Co. on 10 Nov (2008.042; DEW, MH, spec. FMNH #461103). One adult was photographed at East Fork Lake, Richland Co. on 15-16 Nov



(2008.043; RES*, CLH). Based on plumage, the McCormick Place specimen is referable to the subspecies pallida that breeds in the southwestern United States. The bird photographed in Richland Co. also appears to belong to the subspecies pallida. The photos of immatures from Clinton Co. do not seem to be identifiable to subspecies. This species has become a fairly regular vagrant in fall to the eastern United States especially the Great Lakes region and the northeastern United States. Previous records of fall birds in the Great Lakes region and

the northeastern United States identifiable to subspecies, both specimens and some photos, have all been pallida (McNair and Post 2001, Spahn and Tetlow 2006). Birds from the Florida breeding population and the northeastern United States in spring have been identified as nominate fulva, the West Indies breeding subspecies (Smith et al. 1988, McNair and Post 2001).

Black-bellied Whistling-Duck (Dendrocygna autumnalis) Eleven videotaped at Iola, Clay Co. on 7 May (2008.012; CLH*, RES). Four photographed at Ware, Union Co. to Grand Tower, Jackson Co. on 6-11 July (2008.035; DMK*). Five adults were shot out of a reported flock of

15 birds at Chautauqua NWR, Mason Co. on 9 Nov (2008.049; JS*, three spec. to FMNH). The committee examined photos of the five collected birds. Three of the birds were sent to the Field Museum for preparation as specimens. There were previously two accepted records for Illinois of this species.

Brant (Branta bernicla) One immature moved around Chicago's Lake Michigan lakefront, Cook Co. from 26 Oct to 14 Dec (2008.044; WJM; CSF*, GN*, GAW, CBT, DFS, PRC). A Brant was reported off and on through fall 2008 throughout the southern Lake Michigan lakefront. The first report came from Calumet Park on 26 October. Later, observers found one in Lincoln Park on 29 October, where it remained until at least 2 November. It was subsequently found on the Museum Campus in Grant Park on 11 November, remaining there until 19 November. Finally it was found in Jackson Park on 8 December, and was last seen on 14 December. The close proximity of the reports, the non-overlapping dates of

occurrence between the various sites, and some details of how the plumage changed across time as the bird matured across the fall led the committee to conclude that only a single bird was involved in this record.


Eurasian Wigeon (Anas penelope) An adult male was photographed at Downs, McLean Co. on 2-4 Apr (2008.010; MEF; DMK*).

Barrow's Goldeneye (Bucephala islandica) A female was seen and photographed along the Lake Michigan shoreline at Loyola Park in northern Chicago and the southern edge of Evanston, Cook Co. on 14 to 28 Feb (2009.011; SGS*; NAL*). This bird engendered extensive discussion with some arguing that the bird represented a hybrid Barrow's X Common Goldeneye. The two characteristics that doubters focused on were head shape and the extent of white in the wing. Numerous photos of this bird showed a variety of apparent head shapes, mostly as a result of the active diving in which the bird often engaged. Immediately following a dive the head shape would appear atypical. However, many photos show a typical head shape for a Barrow's Goldeneye. The white in the wing may be more extensive than average for a Barrow's Goldeneye, but clear photos of the spread wing indicate the white to be within the variation shown by female Barrow's Goldeneves. The committee unanimously accepted this bird as a female Barrow's Goldeneye.

Brown Pelican (*Pelecanus occidentalis*) An immature photographed near Alton, Madison Co. on 11 May to 26 Aug (2009.017; BR*; GN*, MST*). A subadult was photographed at Crystal Lake, McHenry Co. on 3-4

Up to four individuals were observed and one photographed between Ware, Union County and far southern Jackson County near Grand Tower in September 2008.

June (2009.016; KP; KL*, GAW*, CSF*). The latter bird may have been present for 2 to 3 days before birders became aware of it according to reports from residents of the area (fide KL). The Alton Brown Pelican moved between Illinois and Missouri waters. The last specific report from Illinois that I could locate was on 2 July.

Magnificent Frigatebird (Fregata magnificens) One adult male photographed near Forest Glen Preserve at Meeks, Vermilion Co. on 4 Sep (2008.021; MFC*). This record followed the passage of the remnants of Hurricane Gustav, which made landfall along the Gulf Coast of Louisiana, with its remnants traveling across Illinois. The photograph does not show any identifying features to distinguish Magnificent from Great Frigatebird (Fregata minor). However, given that Magnificent Frigatebird is a regular post-hurricane wanderer throughout the eastern United States. it is the only regular frigatebird in the Gulf of Mexico, and there are only two records of Great Frigatebird in continental North America, the committee unanimously agreed that this record was best treated as Magnificent Frigatebird.

Anhinga (Anhinga anhinga) One female photographed along Cache River, Pulaski Co. on 30 May (2009.029; CKM, JDM; DMK*). Anhingas (up to six) began to be reported from along the Cache River beginning on 1 May, although there were earlier secondhand reports. Birds continued into summer; further details on these birds will be

forthcoming. A soaring female photographed at the end of May was the only documentation received of these spring birds.

Roseate Spoonbill (*Platalea ajaja*) Up to four individuals observed (and one photographed) between Ware, Union Co. and Grand Tower, Jackson Co. on 5-28 Sep (2008.024: DKv; DMK*).

White Ibis (Eudocimus albus) One immature at E. Cape Girardeau on 6 Sep (2008.038; MSS*). One immature at Horseshoe Lake, Madison Co. on 3-10 Aug (2008.025; FH, JZ; BR*). After a hiatus of about fifteen years with no records of this species, there have been at least seven accepted records since 2003.

Black Vulture (*Coragyps atratus*) One photographed at Washington Co. CA on 20 May (2009.012; MSS*) This record is from approximately 35 miles north of the area of regular occurrence of this species in southern Illinois.

Swallow-tailed Kite (Elanoides forficatus) Two photographed south of Carbondale, Jackson Co. on 23-25 August (2008.023; RMR; TAM*). Swallow-tailed Kites occurred throughout much of Illinois until the very early part of the 20th century (Bohlen 1989). For much of the next century, there were essentially no records in Illinois. There have now been three accepted records in Illinois since 2005, and other records in the Upper Midwest. The species appears to be increasing on its southeastern US breeding grounds, and vagrant records should continue to increase.

Swainson's Hawk (*Buteo swainsoni*) An immature was photographed at Carlyle Lake, Clinton Co. on 25 Oct (2008.052; CLH; DMK*). This is the latest in the year report in the last two decades, although there are some November reports from the 1980s, and a late October specimen from 1917 (Ford et al. 1934). Although the breeding population centered on northwestern Kane County, seems to barely be hanging on, records of migrants in the fall appear to be on the increase.

Curlew Sandpiper (Calidris ferruginea) A bird in partial alternate plumage was seen and photographed at Greene Valley FP, DuPage Co. on 23 August (2008.022; MAM; NAL*). After some dozen reports in the 1960s though 1980s, this is only the second accepted record since 1987.

Pomarine Jaeger (Stercocorarius pomarinus) One photographed at Horseshoe Lake, Madison Co. on 8-15 December (2007.064; FH*). This bird was seen on the Collinsville CBC on 15 December.

White-winged Dove (Zenaida asiatica) One at Montrose, Chicago, Cook Co. on 2 May (2009.022; LK; MMC, MTr*). Since the first state record in 1998, there have been at least 16 accepted records in Illinois of this expanding species. Most of these records fit the pattern shown here of a single bird seen in May for only a short period.

Burrowing Owl (Athene cunicularia) One photographed at Montrose, Chicago, Cook Co., on 29 Oct (2008.045; RDH, BV*). This bird

was killed by a Cooper's Hawk later in the day.

Townsend's Solitaire (Myadestes townsendi) One photographed at Montrose, Chicago, Cook Co. on 31 Oct-1 Nov (2008.046; RDH; KH*, NAL*).

Varied Thrush (*Ixoreus naevius*) One photographed in an Evanston yard on 25 Mar (2009.027; MMC*).

Kirtland's Warbler (*Dendroica kirtlandii*) A male was photographed in Lincoln Park, Chicago, Cook Co. on 21 May (2008.011; TA*).

Swainson's Warbler (Limnoth-lypis swainsoni) Two were in Alexander Co. on 2 July-28 August (2008.036; RE, APS; DMK*). Birds were seen and/or heard by a number of observers before one bird was photographed in early August.

Golden-crowned Sparrow (*Zonotrichia atricapilla*) One adult male was seen and heard singing along the Jane Addams Trail at Scioto Mills, Stephenson Co. on 16-24 Apr (2009.021; AS; ESS*, DP*, SM*).

Western Tanager (*Piranga ludo-viciana*) An adult male was photographed at Mahomet, Champaign Co. on 27-28 May (2008.017; D&MA*; EJC, HP).

Painted Bunting (*Passerina ciris*) An adult male was photographed at a feeder in Harrisburg, Saline Co. on 13 May (2008.016; KS*).

Hoary Redpoll (Acanthis hormemanni) One, apparently a female, was seen and photographed irregularly at Chicago Botanic Garden, Cook Co. between 24 Jan and 3 Mar (2009.023; AFS, RE, AHr; ABB*, NAL*). One adult male was seen regularly and photographed at Merwin Nature Preserve, McLean Co. on 25-30 Jan (2009.003;





TB*; MEF). There were later undocumented reports of presumably the same bird at this site until 5 Mar 2009. One adult male was photographed at a feeder in Wheaton, DuPage Co. on 21 February (2009.026; VM*). Other records from winter 2007-8 and 2008-9 remain in review. The number of Hoary Redpolls reported in Illinois during these winters is unprecedented. The Hoary Redpolls did accompany two of the largest Common Redpoll invasions of the past two decades. However, more knowledge of identification criteria, and increasing photographic documentation because of digital cameras have played an important role in improving our knowledge of this species in Illinois.

Other accepted records

(Three records of two species)

White-faced Ibis (*Plegadis chihi*) An adult photographed at Prairie Green FP, Kane Co. on 27 May (2009.013; MB*; AH*).

California Gull (Larus californicus) An adult was at North Point Marina, Winthrop Harbor, Lake Co. from at least 16 Mar to 12 Apr (2009.020; CSF*). Another adult was at North Point Marina, Winthrop Harbor, Lake Co. on 30 May (2009.019; TL*). The committee concluded that because of the lengthy period between the first and second bird without any sightings, despite regular coverage by a number of observers, these records were best treated as separate birds.

UNACCEPTED RECORDS

First State Records

Bullock's Oriole (Icterus bullockii) A male photographed along the Hennepin Canal at Kneiff Rd in Whiteside Co. on 12 May (2009.018) was identified as a possible Bullock's Oriole. The committee reviewed the photos of this bird, a subadult oriole. They concluded that the bird was a young male Baltimore Oriole with a somewhat atypical pattern of black on the head. Although this pattern was unusual-looking, it did not match Bullock's Oriole. The bird also did not match the wing or tail pattern of a Bullock's Oriole.

Review List Records Unaccepted

(one record of one species)

Garganey (Anas querquedula) A female teal at Sauer Family Prairie Kame FP, Kane Co. on 22 May (2009.028) was documented as this species with detailed written documentations by two observers. Despite this, a majority of the committee did not feel the documentation firmly established the identity of this bird as a Garganey. In particular, some committee members felt the written descriptions were not completely consistent with female Garganey, and that the possibility of a hybrid between other species of "blue-winged" Anas could not be convincingly eliminated.

The 2008/2009 Illinois CBC Season

The 2008/2009 Illinois Christmas Bird Count season was a study in contrasts. Seven counts reported high temperatures below 20 degrees F, while 14 reported highs of at least 50 degrees F, including several counts in the northern part of the state. Windy conditions were common – 29 counts reported peak winds of over 20 mph, while 13 reported winds of at least 30 mph.

A total of 63 counts were reported in Illinois during the 2008/2009 Christmas Bird Count season, with 166 species reported on the counts and three additional species reported only during the count period. Four counts exceeded 100 species; Rend Lake tied last year's state record with 114. There were 1095 field observers who put in 3313 party-hours, covering 20,583 miles. All of these totals were down somewhat from last year. Two-hundred eighty-eight feeder observers contributed an additional 478 hours.

Fermilab again had the most field observers with 96, and Waukegan had the most feeder observers with 68.

No new species were added to the state's CBC list this year. There were, however, a number of notable observations. Several lingering fall migrants put in an appearance, winter finches were present in reasonable numbers, and gulls, while nowhere near last year's display, were still worth mentioning.

Ducks through Herons

Trumpeter Swans continue to increase. This year they were found on 12 counts, with a high of 10 at Rushville. Tundra Swans were reported on 4 counts. One Bluewinged Teal was seen at Evanston-North Shore. One Harlequin Duck was reported count-week at Calumet-Sand Ridge, while Calumet and Collinsville reported count-week Surf Scoters. White-winged Scoters were reported on 4 counts, with Waukegan the only Lake Michigan count to report them. A lone Black Scoter at Waukegan was the only one seen on count day — Calumet-Sand Ridge had a count-week bird. Long-tailed Ducks showed a surprising pattern — eight counts reported them, with the count-week bird at Calumet-Sand-Ridge the only

one on Lake Michigan. Sixteen of those reported on count days were downstate, with an impressive 8 at Rend Lake, and one at Clinton-Savanna on the Mississippi River. The 10,681 Common Goldeneyes at Rend Lake constituted a new state high.

Ring-necked Pheasants were reported on 29 counts, but only 299 were reported, significantly below last year's 417. Wild Turkeys were also down somewhat, with 1776 reported on 43 counts. At Newton, there were 77 Greater Prairie-Chickens. Northern Bobwhite was reported on 19 counts, and Gray

Partridge went unreported this year.

Rend Lake had the only Red-throated Loon, as well as two of the year's three Common Loons – the other one was at Baldwin Lake. Horned and Pied-billed Grebes were present in typical numbers, while only 4 counts reported American White Pelicans. Double-crested Cormorants were only reported on 13 counts, although in typical numbers. Springfield reported the only Great Egret, while Black-crowned Night-Herons were found on 4 counts – 3 of them in northern Illinois.

Raptors through Cranes

Black and Turkey Vultures were both reported in reduced numbers — Black Vultures were at their lowest level in 15 years. Bald Eagles were reported on a record 55 counts this season, with an all-time high state total of 2315. Accipiters were present in typical numbers, with Clinton Lake reporting the region's only Northern Goshawk. After a banner fall in 2008 at Illinois' two hawk watches, Golden Eagles put in a notable appearance, with 6 seen on 5 counts. Twelve Merlins were seen on 10 counts, and 12 Peregrine Falcons were seen on a record 11 counts. A Prairie Falcon was at Arklands Pyramid — only the 8th time that species has been reported on Illinois CBCs.

Four Virginia Rails were seen on 3 counts, with 2 at Union County. Union County also had the only Sora. Nine Sandhill Cranes were seen on 3 counts, including one at Carlyle, well away from the usual migration route for cranes in Illinois.

Shorebirds through Gulls

Three species of shorebird were reported in Illinois this CBC season, with 5 Least Sandpipers on 3 counts

the only notable ones. Ten species of gull were reported this year, with a Glaucous-winged Gull at Collinsville the most notable. A Laughing Gull was at Rend Lake. Sixteen Thayer's Gulls were reported on 5 counts, and 3 Iceland Gulls were reported on 2 counts, including one at Lake Shelbyville. Glaucous Gulls were reported on 4 counts, including a lone bird at Decatur. Great Blackbacked Gulls were only found on 2 counts, but the 18 at Calumet was a new state high by 10 birds. Finally, Lesser Black-backed Gulls were seen on a record 10 counts.

Doves through Owls

Eurasian Collared-Dove was seen on 26 counts, a new record. Joliet only reported one Ringed Turtle-Dove. Only 69 Monk Parakeets were reported from 3 counts. No Barn Owls were reported in the state. There were 3 Snowy Owls – one at Calumet-Sand Ridge, one at Starved Rock, and a count week bird at Chicago Urban. Only 45 Short-eared Owls were seen, perhaps unsurprising given the windy conditions. Seven Northern Saw-whet Owls were reported on 6 counts.

Flycatchers through Warblers

Forty-five Eastern Phoebes were reported on a record 10 counts, with 12 at Horseshoe Lake and 13 at Union County. Six counts reported a total of 10 Loggerhead Shrikes, the lowest since 1950. In contrast, 41 Northern Shrikes were reported on 19 counts, with a notable 9 at Fermilab-Batavia. American Crow numbers appear to be recovering, with more than 212,000 reported, including 162,000 at

Middlefork River Valley. Only 278 Redbreasted Nuthatches were reported, after 635 last year. Nine House Wrens were reported on a record 5 counts, while Sedge Wrens were reported at Newton and Baldwin Lake. The 11 Marsh Wrens reported included 1 at Baldwin Lake, 4 at Rend Lake, and a state record 6 at Union County.

Hermit Thrushes were reported in normal numbers, with 233 on 35 counts. Three Gray Catbirds were reported, as were 36 Brown Thrashers. Forest Glen had 7 well-described Bohemian Figure 1: codes for the spreadsheets

Waxwings. Collinsville had an Orange-crowned Warbler, while Meredosia Island had a Common Yellowthroat. Six Pine Warblers were reported on 3 counts, while 5 Palm Warblers were reported on 3 counts. Finally, Horseshoe Lake had a state record 387 Yellow-rumped Warblers.

Sparrows through Weaver Finches

Only one Spotted Towhee was reported, from Collinsville. Thirteen Chipping Sparrows were reported

from 13 counts. One well-written documentation for Chipping Sparrow clearly described American Tree Sparrow - this continues to be an issue. A LeConte's Sparrow at Champaign County was rather far north. Lone Vesper Sparrows were at Baldwin Lake and Morton Arboretum-Lisle. Union County had a Lincoln's Sparrow, while a countweek Lincoln's was at Chicago Urban. Lone Harris's Sparrows were at Quincy, Monroe County, and Champaign. The 3194 Lapland Longspurs at Newton were a new state high, while the Smith's Longspur photographed at Newton marks only the 6th time the species has been reported on an Illinois CBC. Lone

Dickcissels were at Carlyle Lake and Champaign County.

The 806 House Finches at Rockford were a new state high. Winter finches were present in decent numbers. Seven-hundred-sixty Purple Finches were counted in 51 circles. Five counts reported Red Crossbills, while 3 counts had White-winged Crossbills. The CBC counts had Common Redpolls reported only at Chicago Urban and Freeport. Pine Siskin was reported on 46 counts, while Evening Grosbeaks were at Rushville and Forest Glen. Eurasian Tree Sparrows were reported on 14 counts.

Exotics

Several exotics were reported this year – Mandarin Duck, Bar-headed Goose, Budgerigar, 17 White-winged Pheasant, 6 Greylag Geese and a Black-headed Parakeet.

A 'gracious man' and ... 'excellent' teacher

I was hired at Eastern Illinois University as Barrie Hunt's replacement in 1990 after he retired. Those were impossible shoes to fill. He left an outstanding study skin collection that he put together on his own as well as a legacy of excellent instruction in both ornithology and ecology. Barrie was very gracious in helping me get my feet on the ground at Eastern including taking me around to all the local birding hotspots. In addition, for many years after I arrived at E.I.U., Barrie

was nice enough to host a bird banding demonstration lab at his home. At the end of the lab, Barrie's wife, Shirley, would always bring out hot doughnuts for the students. It was always the students' favorite lab. He was an excellent field ornithologist and a warm, kind, generous person.

"Friends, colleagues recall the nature of Barrie Hunt"

There was something allegorical, those who knew him agreed, in the fact that Barrie Hunt left this world on the fall migration.

Hunt – teacher, ornithologist, and conservationist – died at the age of 77 on the first day of autumn in 2009, during the height of the seasonal flight of the birds he loved over the places he loved.

Barrie Hunt was the dean of Coles County birders – a combination of learning, experience and field skills surpassed by no other local birder and admired by all of them.

"When it came to ornithology, I don't think I know anyone who had the depth of knowledge he had," said David Mott, a close friend and site superintendent at Douglas-Hart Nature Center in Mattoon, where Hunt was a long-time presence.

Barrie was equally admired for his own nature.

"What struck me most about Barrie was his great personal integrity," said Ruth Riegel, a student of Hunt during the years when he taught ornithology and biology at Eastern Illinois University from 1967 to his retirement in 1989. "In class he was very intimidating — he took what he did extremely seriously and did not tolerate people who did not put in the effort — but in the field he was very patient with those who were less experienced than he was, and it was always lovely to go out with him."

Hunt graduated from Asheville School in North Carolina and earned degrees from Miami University and the University of Wisconsin-Madison. He was a U.S. Air Force pilot and taught in Kenosha, Wis., and at Eastern. He served on the boards of the Illinois Audubon Society and the Douglas-Hart Foundation.

Hunt also served on the editorial advisory board for the Illinois Ornithological Society and wrote two articles for the *Meadowlark*, examining migratory patterns of birds in spring and fall in the Illinois/Indiana region (see Meadowlark11:88-93 and Meadowlark 5:122-128). He also wrote articles for a variety of other scientific birding journals on topics such as DDT poisoning in robins and wing chord differences in Common Grackles, as well as extreme nesting dates for the

Mourning Dove in Illinois, which was published in Wilson Bulletin 90:458-60.

Hunt regularly contributed his bird sightings from the Charleston, Illinois, area to all of the various Illinois birding journals for at least 40 years. He was also a bird bander.

One of his most gratifying accomplishments was his establishment of Warbler Woods, an Illinois Department of Natural Resources-recognized 200-acre nature preserve located west of Illinois Route 130 off Daileyville Road between Fox Ridge State Park and Charleston.

As demanding as Hunt was as an ornithologist, however, he was as patient with youngsters and inexperienced birders. Hunt started the tradition of Thursday morning bird walks at the Douglas-Hart Nature Center during the spring and fall migration seasons, where birders of any level of experience can walk the trails of the preserve with veterans and sharpen their skills.

Barrie got his doctorate at the University of Wisconsin, and his teachers had been the students of Aldo Leopold, author of "A Sand County Almanac," one of the primers of the land stewardship and environmental movements in the United States in the 20th century, Mott said. "Those people were his teachers. Most of his beliefs about conservation and wildlife management came in a direct line from Aldo Leopold."

About 15 years ago, Hunt was diagnosed with chronic lymphocytic leukemia – a type of cancer of the blood and bone marrow.

"He was so courageous and strong willed in his battle with his disease," Mott said. He just refused to give up. So many times when he would go for his chemo it would take him a couple of days to bounce back, but he didn't want help. He wanted to stand on his own legs. The last four or five months it was difficult for him to be confined indoors. He was an outdoorsman."

A Tribute to Laurence C. Binford

I was saddened to learn of Laurie Binford's death in September 2009 at his home off Agate Harbor in the Upper Pennisula of Michigan.

Laurie was a very dear close friend and birding mentor for more than 20 years.

Our association began when I met his mother, Irene. His family lived four blocks from our home in Glencoe, where I grew up. One day in 1979, Irene saw a bird coming to a feeder in her yard that wasn't in her Peterson's field guide. Irene, an accomplished artist, drew a colored sketch of the bird and sent it to her son at the California Academy of Sciences where he worked as the curator of birds and mammals.

He immediately called her upon receiving and identifying the sketch to tell her it was a Black-throated Sparrow. Later I gave Irene a black-and-white photograph of the rarity she hosted in her yard that winter.

When Laurie came back to Glencoe to take care of his mom as she got older, I met him when I found a Ross's Goose at McGaw Park in early December 1988 near Waukegan on the north side of what was then Lakehurst Mall. Laurie came with Larry Balch, Gerry Rosenband and Walter Kraweic to see the goose which was, at that time, only the second or third Chicago area record.

Laurie had just published a site guide on Pt. Diablo California near San Francisco as the article appeared in one of the first HMANA journals as a premier hawk watching site on the west coast of the United States. In fact, it was Laurie who discovered this hawk site, one of the biggest on the West Coast.

Laurie was instrumental in developing the Illinois Ornithological Records Committee, a standing committee of the Illinois Ornithological Society. He also gave much time and advice to the fledging Illinois Ornithological Society organization in the early 1990s when Eric Walters founded the organization.

Laurie also developed and published the Chicago Botanic Garden Bird Checklist with Richard Biss, Michael Hogg and Jim Steffen. This Checklist would later serve as a model for the Illinois Beach State Park Bird Checklist. See Meadowlark 2:131-134 for Laurie's site finding guide to this great birding location.

Laurie also discovered and documented the first state record of Sandwich Tern at Waukegan Beach in Lake County (Meadowlark 2:13-14), and he discovered (or rediscovered) the first Illinois Record of MacGillivray's Warbler which was left unidentified for years in the specimen collection of the Field Museum of Natural History. (Meadowlark 2:47-50).

Laurie co-authored "First Confirmed Illinois Record of the Glaucous-winged Gull" (Meadowlark 4: 47-50), which was discovered by Louise Augustine, Andy Sigler, Pat Geis and Alan F. Stokie.

Laurie and I birded a lot together even in the Upper Penninsula of Michigan. My family and I visited him both up north at Eagle and Copper Harbor and at Baton Rouge, Louisiana where he spent winters. Once in Baraga County, Michigan, he pished up a storm of warblers—and even White-winged Crossbills. He was the best of pishers.

We also discussed the undertail coverts and rumps of young teal and how to separate Blue-winged from Greenwinged Teal young with Green-winged Teal having the creamier yellowish rears. We toured every local sewage pond up there and Laurie found a Ruff at one of these locations. At Copper Harbor we both were amused by an immature Northern Goshawk trying to chase a Belted Kingfisher, only to plunge into a pond—getting itself all wet and flapping its way to shore.

Laurie loved discovering rare birds or out-of-season birds on Christmas Bird Counts. Often he would scout for several weeks preceding counts in search of rarities. He once observed the Black-backed Woodpecker and Sage Thrasher on an Evanston North Shore count.

We saw the Northern Gannet together in Vernon Hills at Little Bear Lake on 9 November 1993 in a Vernon Hills shopping mall area. Laurie exclaimed, "It was the most out of place location for a rare bird sighting."

He also loved seeing the LaSalle County Gyrfalcon with Richard Biss atop a farm building southwest of the nuclear plant.

Once when I showed Laurie an unidentified immature jaeger photo from Carlyle Lake, he took one look and said, "This is a Long-tailed Jaeger." He was never wrong on identification of birds, and was legendary on that aspect.

Larry Balch recounted this story showing Laurie Binford's identification skills:

"In 1987, I invited Laurie to come along with us to Attu. (He happily accepted, but was not nearly as happy when I accidentally tipped over the cart he was riding in and dumped him into a mud puddle.) On that trip, Frank Gill's wife Sally decided to play a trick on the group. She stood up at dinner and said 'I found this feather out on Alexai Point today and I can't figure out what it's from. Can anyone help me?' She passed it around and people puzzled over what Attu vagrant could have lost it. There was much speculation and guessing, but no one knew, until it reached Laurie, who took one look and immediately said, 'It's an Oilbird feather,' Which it was."

Binford also founded the Western Field Ornithologists and the California Bird Records Committee. He described the nest of Marbled Murrelet, the last species in North America to have its nest discovered and was one of the last birders to see an Eskimo Curlew in Galveston, Texas, during the 1960s.

Laurie published the American Ornithologists Union monograph on Birds of Oaxaca, Mexico and his latest work was "Birds of Keweenaw Peninsula."

Among his many articles published in scientific journals was an account in the Auk (74:264-265) in which he watched an Eastern Phoebe catching and eating small fish in a lagoon at Chicago's Jackson Park, with two phoebes catching seven fish in 20 minutes.

He was a true professional ornithologist and birder in the utmost sense of the word.



Field Notes

The 2008-2009 Winter Season

December temperatures ranged from substantially below normal to well above normal. A winter storm on 1 December dropped 1-4 inches of snow across the northern half of Illinois. Two days later, 2-3 more inches of snow fell in the northern section of the state, along with a mix of rain and snow in the central region, and moderate rainfall in the south. On 8 December, another winter storm produced rain, freezing rain, and 4 inches of snow in the north, and moderate amounts of rain in the central section of the state. Nearly a week passed before the next major storm dropped heavy rain, freezing rain, sleet, and snow across most of the state on 14-15 December. This was followed immediately on 16 December by another storm which brought 2-6 inches of snowfall over the northern third of Illinois, and substantial freezing rain over the central third. A very strong winter storm slammed into Illinois on 18-19 December, producing freezing rain, sleet, and 2-10 inches of snow in the northern portion of the state, a severe ice storm with up to 1 inch of ice over the central region, and rain across the south. A fast moving storm on 20 December left 1-2 inches of snow in the north, coupled with winds at 25-30 mph statewide and wind chills at 25-35 degree below zero. A couple of days later (23-24 December), another storm dropped 2-4 inches of snow in the north, a quarter inch of ice through the central region, and substantial rain and freezing rain across the south. Additionally, 10-20 mph winds created severe wind chills ranging from 10 to 20 degrees below zero. On 25 December, light rain and freezing rain fell across the northern 2/3 of Illinois. A quickly-following storm the next two days dropped 1-2 inches of rain statewide, turning to light freezing rain in the north.

January was very cold, with temperatures ranging from severely below normal to nearly normal, and with continued frequent storms. Minor weather events at the start of the month included light rain and freezing rain across the northern third of the state on 3 January; light rain over the southern third and northeastern sections of the state on 6 January; and light snow in northern Illinois on 8 January. A more significant storm moved across the state on 9-10

January, producing 2-8 inches of snow over the northern half of the state and light rain and freezing rain across the southern half. The middle of January was exceptionally brutal. A major storm on 12-13 January yielded 2-6 inches of snow in the north and 1-3 inches of snow in central sections of the state, coupled with high winds creating severe wind chills of 20-30 degrees below zero. Immediately following this, another major winter storm on 13-14 January dropped an additional 6-10 inches of snow in the north, 3-6 inches in the central, and 1-3 inches in the southern sections of the state. Once again, very strong winds resulted in record cold wind chills of -40 to -50 degrees. The month ended with a series of minor storms. On 17 January, 1-2 inches of snow fell across the northern two thirds of the state, while another 1-2 inches of snow fell across the northern third on 19 January. A storm producing a quarter inch of ice moved across the southern region on 26 January.

Extreme temperatures in February ranged from substantially below normal to record highs. Precipitation continued fairly frequently in the last third of the season. After a two-week period free of storms, up to half an inch of rain fell over much of the state on 9 February. On 11 February, Illinois was soaked by another 0.5-1 inch of rain. Two days later, 1-2 inches of snow was dropped over the northern third of the state, and light rain fell over the central third. Another noteworthy storm yielded 0.5-1 inch of rain across most of Illinois on 17 February. The final snow of the season fell on 21 February, when a significant storm dropped 2-6 inches of snow in the northern portion of the state, moderate rain and freezing rain over the central region, and light rain over the southern section of Illinois. The last precipitation of the season occurred on 26 February, in the form of heavy rainfall. This storm produced 0.75-1.5 inches of rain in the northern half and 0.5-1 inch of rain in the southern half of the state.

Bird diversity in the winter of 2008-2009 was very high, with 189 species reported below. The total included a large variety of lingering fall migrants and "semi-hardy" species, as well as numerous species that are scarce to accidental in winter in Illinois. By season's end, very little early spring migration had been observed within Illinois.

Many species groups showed declines in overall abundance compared to the previous winter. These included: dabbling ducks, doves, "open country" birds, mimids,

sparrows, and blackbirds. Groups showing population increases and decreases in about equal numbers were: geese, upland gamebirds, "waterbirds," shorebirds, owls, woodpeckers, and "permanent residents." A few species groups showed increases: swans and diving ducks, gulls, thrushes, and finches. Most diurnal raptors and "semi-hardy" species were recorded in fairly typical numbers.

Waterfowl to Cranes

Most waterfowl species were reported in greater abundance this winter, although dabbling duck numbers were reduced overall, and there was a conspicuous absence of dabbling duck concentrations at traditional southern and central wintering sites. Similarly, diving ducks showed no major concentrations within the state. Unusual species of waterfowl were confined to Lake Michigan, including a Brant lingering through 14 December (see the fall 2008 summary), a female Barrow's Goldeneye in February, and three to five Harlequin Ducks, one of which lingered for nearly two months. There were no reports of Blue-winged Teal.

Upland gamebird populations were rather weak. Gray Partridge went unreported again this season.

Loons and grebes were found in normal to low numbers, with no unusual species reported. American White Pelican and Double-crested Cormorant showed modest increases over last winter, but no large concentrations. An overwintering concentration of 15 Black-crowned Night-Herons in Madison County was noteworthy, as was the overwintering Great Egret, but the only other reports of herons involved Great Blue Herons in comparatively low numbers.

Diurnal raptors showed little change in population compared to the previous winter, with the exception of Black Vulture and Bald Eagle, both of which occurred in notably poor numbers. It was not a flight year for Northern Goshawk, with only two singles reported. Two Prairie Falcons were recorded, with one photographed in central Illinois, and it was a good year for Golden Eagles, with five birds noted in several areas of the state.

One of the four Virginia Rails found this season lingered into January in Lake County—surprisingly far north in the wake of a cold, snowy December. One location produced two calling Virginia Rails and a Sora! It was an exceedingly poor season for American Coots statewide. Modest numbers of Sandhill Cranes continued into early December and began returning in the last third of February; other records involved four individuals in southern Illinois in January.

Shorebirds to Woodpeckers

Shorebird diversity for the season was high, with eight species noted. Unusual shorebirds for winter included an early December Baird's Sandpiper and a late February Lesser Yellowlegs in northeastern Illinois, as well as a Spotted Sandpiper overwintering at Rend Lake.

Winter 2008-2009 was excellent for gulls, with numbers overall reversing the trend of recent winter seasons. Only Bonaparte's Gull showed declines compared to last winter. A season total of five Laughing Gulls provided a record high for winter, and Ring-billed Gull tied its previous winter high

count of 80,000 birds at one site. A Franklin's Gull put in a rare winter appearance in mid-February. Reports of several extralimital gulls remain under review, including a Western Gull (previously confirmed in Illinois only from a specimen taken in 1927), a Slaty-backed Gull, and two Glaucouswinged Gulls. There were also documentations of two forms of gulls not previously confirmed for Illinois ("Vega Gull" and "Caspian Gull"), both of which are currently treated as subspecies of Herring Gull but considered good species by some authorities. The former was reported from two sites in southern Illinois.

The rapid expansion in population and distribution of Eurasian Collared-Dove seems to have slowed, and Monk Parakeet numbers are also showing a declining trend.

Owl populations were more-or-less stable, with the exception that none of the concentrations of Short-eared Owls found over the past several winters were reported. A good number of Snowy Owls appeared this winter, including four that were noted in a traditional La Salle County location, as well as one which was remarkably far south, in Clinton County.

Woodpeckers showed little significant change in populations over the previous winter, other than the unfortunate continued decline of Red-headed Woodpeckers.

Flycatchers to Warblers

Eastern Phoebes were recorded in fairly good numbers, especially on Christmas Bird Counts. Loggerhead Shrike had its second worst winter of the past decade. It was an above-average flight year for Northern Shrike, including one that appeared as far south as Clinton County. A **Yellow-throated Vireo** at Sand Ridge State Forest provided a first winter-season record for Illinois.

Red-breasted Nuthatches were fairly widely distributed in modest numbers. A tally of 110 Brown Creepers at Rockford tied the state Christmas Bird Count record first set there in 1995. Wren numbers and diversity were about normal but for some reduction in Carolina Wren populations. A new record winter high count of six Marsh Wrens was established at a traditional southern Illinois winter location for the species, the birds likely responding to background wren calls on a recording of rail calls. Golden-crowned Kinglet numbers were on the low side of average.

Data on thrushes included single reports of **Townsend's Solitaire** and **Varied Thrush** in northeastern Illinois, a healthy distribution of Hermit Thrushes, and notably strong numbers of American Robins statewide. Mimids were all less plentiful this winter. Cedar Waxwings were widely encountered in routine numbers.

Warbler diversity was amazingly high, at seven speciesthe most reported in the winter summaries in over a decade. The most remarkable report was of a **Cape May Warbler in February**, coming to a suet feeder. Two Orange-crowned Warblers evidently overwintered at Urbana, at separate urban cemeteries two miles apart. Data on the other warbler species (other than Yellow-rumped Warbler) suggest notably late fall migrants.

Sparrows to Weaver Finches

Highlights among sparrows included a record number of Chipping Sparrow reports and near-record numbers of Lapland Longspurs. The second Illinois winter record for Smith's Longspur was documented and photographed near the location of Illinois's first accepted Illinois winter record. Snow Buntings were also found in high numbers, and were very widespread even making it to several areas in the far southern reaches of the state. A few Lincoln's Sparrows are found lingering most years into December, but one on 31 January was exceptional. Most other sparrows were in average to low numbers. Scarcer sparrows included two lingering Spotted Towhees at opposite ends of the state, healthy numbers of Le Conte's Sparrows, and two overwintering Harris's Sparrows.

A male Rose-breasted Grosbeak on 27 Feb added to the handful of previous post-December records of this species in Illinois. Dickcissel remains rather rare and irregular in winter, so this season's total of seven Dickcissels provides a noteworthy seasonal high count.

Blackbird populations were generally weak, with particularly poor numbers for Rusty and Brewer's Blackbirds. Yellow-headed Blackbird, which remains unusual in winter, was located at two southern sites.

It was an exceptionally good flight year for winter finches. White-winged Crossbills were found in all-time record numbers and were reported in several areas in central Illinois. There were record flock totals from several northeastern Illinois locations. These were part of a massive irruption of the species into the east and other Midwestern states. Common Redpolls were also remarkably widespread in near-record numbers, and documentations of five Hoary Redpolls, also a record number of reports for Illinois, are pending review or have been accepted. Pine Siskin numbers, while not encountered in exceptionally large flock sizes in most locations, were none-the-less strong and especially widespread throughout the state, also part of a huge irruption of the species extending to the Gulf Coast states. Purple Finches were also encountered in above average numbers and locations. Even a single well-observed male Pine Grosbeak was documented in northeast Illinois. Despite the invasion, no Evening Grosbeaks were reported.








