#### President's Message

#### Birding in 2032

As IOS celebrates its 20th Anniversary, no one can doubt how much birding has changed since the organization began in 1992. Remember those phone chains, set up to alert a whole group of birders when a rarity or vagrant appeared? My wife, Karen, and I remember. Since we were usually around to answer the phone, we typically had to call a half dozen (or more) of the people below us on the list, before we actually got a real person rather than an answering machine. That sounds like sour grapes (and maybe it was, just a little bit), but our phone frustration was balanced by the great birds we got to see by being part of the chain.

Not being a psychic, nor a futurist, I can only guess what our great hebby will be like in 2032. One thing is certain, the technology of electronic devices, and the software used to make those devices so easy to use, is advancing so rapidly, that abilities we haven't even thought of today will be commonplace 20 years from now. That's good as well as bad news for the hobby. For people like me, who are too lazy, or too technologically challenged, or who just don't want to increase our dependence on technology, there are still bells and whistles that will make our birding life easier. One of those will surely be scopes and binoculars with high-quality digital camera technology as an integral part of the optical devices.

Think about it: Digiscoping directly from your scope or binocs. No reason (or excuse in my case), to ever miss out on getting images documenting that rarity or vagrant, for all the world to see. IORC and other records committees will undoubtedly be overjoyed in not having to spend time reading lengthy diatribes about why the bird I was watching was a Plain Chachalaca and not just an odd barnyard chicken. Yet this good news has to be tempered just a bit. Some birds will still be challenging to ID, even with 100 photos, as witness the elaenia sp., found by the Gyllenhaals in Humboldt Park. If only it had vocalized...

We already can instantly access a whole library of songs and calls using a smart phone or an iPod. Many who read this remember dragging around a tape player, then trying to find the right track to be sure that was a Kirtland's Warbler singing in the jack pines. How long will it be until birders will just use a high-quality microphone, probably built into their smart phone, hear a song, hold up the device to record it, engage the voice recognition software, and in a few seconds, there's the ID on the display?

Leaving aside the issue of the overuse of playback to call in birds, there's another real downside to song recognition software. Birders won't have to learn the songs and calls, and my personal view is that this is a step backward. Birding by ear is still one of the best ways to increase your skill and ability.

Bird life will also most certainly change in the next 20 years. We're already seeing many traditional 'southern' species advancing farther north, due to climate change. Look at Blue-gray Gnateatchers for example by checking Tara Beveroth's article in this issue. Scissor-tailed Flycatchers nesting at Midewin in northern Illinois? I'll bet it happens. There is a downside to climate change. Less adaptable species might become rarer or even disappear completely. And can we stem the tide of habitat loss, not just here in Illinois, but globally?

Those questions relate directly back to technology. If better technology means easier entry into birding, then more birders, coupled with their ability to instantly connect, means more voices speaking in support of the birds, influencing public policy and corporate behavior to the benefit of the birds. IOS and other organizations will be vital in spreading the word, and the word is bird. That's where I'm going right now —birding! See you out there in 2032!

### An avian census of Lowell Park


Overlooking the Rock River from its western bank in northern Lee County, Lowell Park is a 200-acre wooded parcel full of history. It changed ownership many times after surveying was completed by Col. William Hamilton, son of Alexander Hamilton. Charles Russell Lowell purchased the property for \$1,375 in 1860 after visiting the estate immediately adjacent to the south. He was married in 1863 to Josephine Shaw but died a year later at the Battle of Cedar Creek following his enlistment during the Civil War, leaving behind

Josephine moved to New York City in 1874 and was an acquaintance of Frederick Law Olmsted, landscape architect of New York's Central Park and Chicago's Riverside Landscape Architecture District. Like Olmsted, Josephine held the beliefs that parks have social and spiritual benefits. After her passing in 1905, Carlotta Lowell, in memory of her father and mother, offered the property to the City of Dixon. Initially this gift was not met with thankfulness; the city council strongly opposed the gift, deeming it too expensive to maintain and too remote for the citizens to enjoy. It was only after a change in state legislature and many discussions with local merchants that the gift, Lowell Park, was accepted in 1907.

a pregnant wife who gave birth to

Carlotta Lowell six weeks later.

Years later in 1926, fifteen-yearold Ronald Reagan applied to be a lifeguard along the river. After his first season of 12-hour days, he asked to be kept on the following year and continued for seven seasons overlooking the beach. Over those seven years, Reagan watched over some

1,000 bathers each day and is reported to have saved seventy-seven people from the Rock River.

In 2008, forty-nine acres of Lowell Park were dedicated as an Illinois Nature Preserve. Prior to completing habitat modifications to facilitate ecological health, additional surveys were deemed necessary to better understand the inhabitants of the park and create a control to compare to after changes are made to the plant community. An outdated survey, finished in the park's infancy, was put on file a century ago and depicts an area much different than it is today.

#### The 1908 Survey

With a new piece of property to maintain, the Dixon City Council created the Lowell Park Commission to manage the park, later giving the Commission more city parks to maintain. Unable to afford park plans written by the Olmsted Brothers of Boston, Lowell Park commissioners sought out a superintendent with a background in landscape architecture who was willing to create plans and perform park duties.

In February of 1908, Arthur C. Comey was hired as the park superintendent. Within his first month, Comey wrote an article for the local newspaper describing a sample of "commoner" winter birds in the park so that

identification of migrants would be easier in the spring. His tenure as superintendent lasted a mere six months when he was asked to resign for not fulfilling his caretaker duties in August. Comey agreed but was contracted to finish his incomplete plans for \$300.

In the "First Report of the Lowell Park Commission," Comey submitted a personal letter on the future of the park, detailed drawings of the park's historic stone structures and a list of bird life in the vicinity of the park, which is most interesting. In those six months as the superintendent of the park, Comey documented nearly 150 species in the vicinity of the park. There is a bit of uncertainty, as his report did not define the "vicinity" in which he observed his documented species but in other writings, he mentioned that "on the way, too, you may find one or two sorts of birds that you will not see afterwards in the park itself" (Comey, 1908). It is possible that Comey only recorded birds while traveling between the park and Dixon but in his letter to the Lowell Park Commission, dated January 6, 1909 from Utica, NY, Comey is well aware of the native white pine stands in what is now called White Pines State Park, more than seven miles north of Lowell Park. Large or small, the vicinity in which he made his recordings will never be known but nonetheless, its reveals a great diversity at the turn of the last century.

Comey's 1908 survey (see below) recorded 148 species and six probable species from numerous habitats, including second-growth oak woodlands, agricultural fields, pasture, dense hazel thickets, the Rock River, and adjacent wet areas. In addition to recording the individual species, Comey also made reference to their seasonal abundance, giving insight into not only what species inhabited the area but also the health of the population.

As reflected in other surveys at the time, Field Sparrows were considered abundant throughout the year, as

were Dickcissels during the summer. Comey also had migrant (Loggerhead) Shrike, to be a tolerably common summer resident. Unfortunately that is not the case today. Two other tolerably common birds for the times were the Northern Cardinal and Redbellied Woodpecker, which did not have much of a presence in northern Illinois in the early 1900s (Walk 2010). Notably absent from the list was Great Horned Owl. The survey also listed 27 warbler species, 16 sparrow species, Ruffed Grouse, prairie hen and Whip-poor-will.

#### The 2010-2011 Survey

Since the time of the original survey, Lowell Park has undergone a few changes, however none has been drastic or detrimental to the park in its entirety. A small quarry was opened to provide stone for the historical structures in the park and permanent hard-surfaced roads were paved

for access and fire protection. In the 1980s, the lower terrace was clearcut for financial reasons and has filled in with mesophytic species, quite the opposite from the oak species that dominated prior to the logging. The lack of fire for the last century has also allowed typically non-dominant trees to enter the canopy, as a result lowering light levels in the understory and ground layer, preventing oak regeneration from the large, mature trees that remain. Exotic species exist in the park - bush honeysuckle, barberry, multiflora rose, and garlic mustard, but have yet to totally replace their native counterparts. Lowell Park maintains healthy populations of spring ephemeral wildflowers and native woodland shrubs. Due to its plant diversity, 49 acres were dedicated as an Illinois Nature Preserve in 2008, protecting Lowell Forest Nature Preserve for eternity.

Prior to starting any aggressive management techniques, it was deemed important to obtain an updated bird survey at the park throughout

the year. The landscape has changed greatly over the last century and that certainly would be reflected in the species found in the park. With a generous grant from the Illinois Ornithological Society, the services of Tara Beveroth from the Illinois Natural History Survey were obtained to create census points and conduct seasonal surveys throughout the year. The census was modeled after the Critical Trends Assessment Program (CTAP) and nine census points were created. Point counts lasted 10 minutes. Two visits were completed in each season with visit dates in 2010 on 23 May, 5 June, 20 September, and 1 November and 2011 visits on 30 January, 16 March, 12 April and 19 May.

Highlights of the Beveroth's census (Tables 1 and 2) included 14 warbler species and seven woodpecker species. The most numerous species observed was the American Robin, with White-breasted Nuthatch, Red-bellied Woodpecker, Northern Cardinal, and Black-capped Chickadee in the top five most abundant species. European Starlings were the 11th most numerous species and House Sparrow was not recorded by the census. A total of 1,866 individuals from 75 species was observed during the census year.

#### Discussion

Although the goal of both surveys was to record the species inhabiting the park, it is difficult to compare the two due to the unknown protocol and vicinity of Comey's work. The survey completed by Comey gives us a glimpse of the diversity over 100 years ago but no information on the location of identified birds or how often he recorded individuals throughout the year. It is quite possible that Comey simply recorded birds as he fulfilled his park superintendent duties, jotting down his observations as he cut brush and drew plans while sitting along the river. In comparison, Beveroth's census was completed on eight selective mornings in all four seasons, observing birds at nine predetermined points for 10 minutes. The CTAP census reveals the occupancy and abundance in the park and when relating that informa-

tion with the habitat characteristics at each point, we can foresee what habitat modifications will affect certain species the most.

Census point five hosted the most Red-headed Woodpeckers over the course of the year. It happens to be the most open section of the woodland, with mature northern oaks in the canopy and relatively few understory trees like black cherry and hackberry. If adjacent areas were selectively cut to reduce competition on the oak species, it would be likely that more Red-headed Woodpeckers would use this larger open woodland setting.

Cedar Waxwings inhabited the area around census point two during the January 2011 visit. This area of the park has been overwhelmed by exotic burning bush. Its removal is imminent for the benefit of native plant species and Cedar Waxwings will be less likely to use the area.

Over the last 100 years, the composition of Lowell Park has changed greatly. The woods have certainly matured, growing from overstocked 50-year-old trees to dominant 150-year-old giants. Open fields have changed from agricultural and pasture land to picnic areas and ball fields.

Some birds met these changes well, adapting to new pressures and thriving and others no longer found it habitable. The surveys that have been completed are vital for park management. Comey's work shows us where we were in the aspects of plant and bird life. The new census by Beveroth demonstrates our current state and as we move forward enhancing the park to a more beneficial state, subsequent censuses will show us how we are doing and if we are headed in the right direction.

# Birders act to protect Black-crowned Night-Heron rookery in Lincoln Park

would Who have thought that historic Lincoln Park would ever become home to the Black-crowned Night-Heron (Nycticorax nycticorax) in the spring and summer? Nevertheless, a rookery was discovered on Lincoln Park Zoo property on a small island in South Pond by Greg Neise in 2006. The 35-acre zoo is on Chicago's lakefront on the north side and serves 3 million visitors per year.

The discovery presented a different kind of challenge to Lincoln Park Zoo staff. Although the organization operates one of the largest zoo-based conservation and science programs in the country, the presence of the Black-crowned Night-Heron rookery created a very real, not artificial, predicament.

At the time of the rookery discovery, the zoo had solidified construction plans to create a \$12-million New Urban Oasis Nature Boardwalk on 14 acres surrounding and stretching across South Pond. As the herons migrate south during the fall, their expected return to Chicago was in the middle of March 2010, and the breeding season would overlap with the premier opening of the nature boardwalk project on 24 June 2010.

Since the night-heron is listed as endangered in the state of Illinois, and nested within the vicinity of the boardwalk project, the Lincoln Park Zoo and the Illinois Department of Natural Resources agreed on a protection footprint that outlined the area within which construction activity

would not occur if the bird returned. It also marked where construction could continue outside the perimeter while the species is on site. The zoo counted about 63 pairs nesting on the densely vegetated island in 2008 and 2009.

#### 2009

During 2009, in preparation for the restoration project, the zoo pumped out the water in the South Pond. A few Lincoln Park residents, Chicago Bird Collision Monitors and

Chicago Audubon Society notified the zoo they were concerned the night-heron rookery and other wildlife could be harmed by the draw down, and contacted officials about their concerns

#### 2010

However, no one anticipated the ghastly news that broke on IBET (Illinois Birders Exchanging Thoughts listsery, June 2010) that revealed a troubling scene at Lincoln Park.

Joann and Emil Martinec posted on line that most of the nesting activity seemed to have moved off the island in South Pond with the birds relocating into the canopy of the tree-lined prome-

nade that is the major walkway in the park segment extending southward from the South Pond to the LaSalle Drive underpass. They counted about 100 nests in the aftermath of a storm that devastated many of the nests. There were many twigs and eggshells lying about the ground under the trees, some with fresh yolk; perhaps 20-30 eggs in total, though it was hard for them to tell with all the foot traffic having crushed and scattered shell remnants. They reported a few eggs contained fetal birds, in a rather developed state.

Michael Ferguson posted he noticed four more dead night-heron fledglings along the path under the trees. Plus there was a concert stage being set up by the Chicago Park District that he thought was certainly

not a good thing for the birds either. Another post from Dawn Smith stated: "Several live BCNH nestlings have been picked up this season and transferred to Flint Creek Wildlife Rehabilitation.... So many dogs off leashes in their current area, the nestlings hardly have a chance if they do end up grounded."

After reading the disturbing posts, I visited South Pond on 28 June with Joan Norek who lives near Lincoln Park. We were upset that the promenade wasn't closed to the public yet. Later I called Steve Thompson, senior vice president, conservation and science programs. He knew the herons had moved off the island to the promenade and that only two or three heron nests remained on the island.

Many days passed and eventually

the promenade was fenced-off some time in July.

#### 2011

The following year the herons didn't return to nest on the island either; Christine Williamson and Norek separately saw only one nest on the South Pond island. The removal of too much vegetation, including willow and mulberry trees on the island, probably contributed to their return to the dense ash and linden tree canopy over the promenade. At the end of April, Steve Huggins and Norek observed the herons were back again nesting on the promenade.

Though the zoo had data that the herons could possibly be in the egglaying stage, they still considered the herons as migrants passing through and not necessarily nesters. Birders, not wanting to witness the repeated disturbance of the nests as in the previous year's nesting cycle, persisted and convinced zoo officials to fence-off the area as soon as possible. By 4 May the Chicago Park District, in cooperation with Lincoln Park Zoo, erected protective fencing with educational signage along the promenade.

Consequently the rookery succeeded. Zoo numbers indicated a high count of 211 active nests on 14 July 2011. Dozens of fledglings were seen at park benches inside the protective fencing, and juveniles were found roosting at South Pond.

### Acknowledgement and Author's Note:

Thanks to all the birders who successfully lobbied on behalf of the Black-crowned Night-Heron. The heron rookery has become a main attraction in Lincoln Park with a dedicated following of park users. Herons began to return to the nesting site 19 March 2012, providing viewers with an unforgettable natural world experience.

# The northward movement of the Blue-gray Gnatcatcher in Illinois

Birders most likely hear the Blue Gray Gnatcatcher's (*Polioptila caerulea*) high-pitched wheezy song before they see it. One of the most unique characteristics of this 4-inch long bird with a bluish gray back and white underside is the long white-edged black tail it flicks from side to side to flush insects off of foliage. After flushing the prey, this bird hovers and sallies to catch a meal.

The Blue-gray Gnatcatcher is a neotropcial migrant found farther north than any other species of gnatcatcher, with most other species from its genus found only in the neotropics. Its range extends from Maine and southern Ontario to Belize and El Salvador, and from New England west to northern California. While wintering, it may be spotted along the western coast of Mexico, parts of Central America, Cuba, sections of the Caribbean, and even along the southeastern coast of the United States. Although Blue-gray Gnatcatchers can be found in wooded habitats including mature forest and shrubland, they prefer moist areas with broad-leaved trees, often near edges (Kershner and Ellison 2012). In 1979 Graber et al. considered riparian woods to be the primary habitat for this species in Illinois (Grettenberger 1991). What is especially intriguing about this bird is that during the 20th century, and even more dramatically in the last 25 years in the northeastern U.S. and southeastern Canada, it has shown a significant range expansion.

In the 1920s and 1930s Bluegray Gnatcatchers started to arrive in






Minnesota and expanded northeast to Pennsylvania. Expansion of the Blue-gray Gnatcatcher in the East coincided with warmer than average winter temperatures in peninsular Florida during the 1940s to 1950s, and early 1970s (Ellison 1991). Data also support the bird's northern movement and expansion within Illinois. Eight species including the Blue-gray Gnatcatcher have been shown to have expanded their range northward (Walk et al. 2010). The gnatcatcher over the last 100 years has gone from having very low occupancy to almost 100 percent occupancy at sites surveyed by Walk et al. Spring Bird Count data from the last 35 years, also show that the Blue-gray Gnatcatcher


population has grown rapidly within the state (Figure 1). Furthermore, the number of counties that are detecting Blue-gray Gnatcatchers has nearly doubled over the last 35 years, again based on Spring Bird Count data (Figure 2). When looking at Breeding Bird Survey (BBS) data from Illinois from 1966-2010, the trend estimate is 0.3% per year, and when looking at BBS data from 2000-2010 the trend estimate is 1.2%, which indicates a significant increase (Sauer et al. 2008).

A few factors are affecting the Blue-gray Gnatcatcher's northerly movement. While Illinois lost much of its grassland habitat over the past 200 years, it actually recovered some forests during the 1900s, primarily in central and northern Illinois (Walk et al. 2010). Available habitat can affect how species cope with movement as well and whether they can actually move (Root et al. 2003). The Bluegray Gnatcatcher, a forest-dependent bird, has benefited from the recovered forests now available in central and northern Illinois. This species is now detected in greater abundance in these parts of the state.

Another determinant that may affect the Blue-gray Gnatcatcher distribution is food availability. Since the gnatcatcher primarily eats small insects and spiders, the temperature has to be warm enough to support this food supply and the habitat must be sufficient to sustain insect and arachnid populations. Has global climate change influenced the movement of the Blue-gray Gnatcatcher as well?

During the last century, the global average temperature has increased by approximately 0.6°C and it may continue to increase rapidly (Root et al. 2003). Between 1950 and 2004, the spring maximum temperature increased 1.1° C in the northern hemisphere (Hitch and Leberg 2007). Researchers are using large avian datasets to analyze geographic changes in breeding distributions of birds throughout the world. One study used Breeding Bird Survey data to analyze distributions of North American birds (Hitch and Leberg 2007) and found that many species showed significant movement northward. This study was consistent with Thomas and Lennon (1999) from Great Britain, supporting the idea that northward expansions of multispecies groups are due to climate warming (Hitch and Leberg 2007). Illinois had a warming trend through about 1940, followed by a cooling trend until about 1980. Over the last half century the average annual temperature has increased within Illinios (Illinois State Water Survey) (Figure 3). Illinois has also had longer heat waves, less snow, and more rain (Walk et al. 2010).

It is likely that climate change will continue to be one of the biggest factors. The climate change bird atlas has formulated future General Circulation Models showing the distributional abundance may change for Blue-gray Gnatcatchers (Figure 4). Based on this model, Blue-gray Gnatcatchers will continue to move northward if temperatures continue to increase. While this trend might seem beneficial for the Blue-gray Gnatcatcher, it may not be so for other species suffering from habitat loss and food availability. Because not all species can cope with climate change, communities of species may become extirpated with others increasing (Hughes 2000).

# 2 Rising numbers of American White Pelicans in Illinois: a perspective

I remember years ago watching American White Pelicans (*Pelecanus erythrorhynchos*) fishing in a circle at the Ding Darling National Wildlife Refuge in Florida. I looked forward to this experience whenever I visited the panhandle state, because, after all white pelicans could rarely be found in Illinois.

Today, Illinois birders know better. The white pelican can be found in large numbers in spring and fall on the Illinois and Mississippi Rivers and along locks and dams in the prairie state. And as reported in

the *Meadowlark*, the American white pelican was confirmed breeding at the Upper Mississippi River National Wildlife Refuge in Illinois in 2009. It was the first time this species had been documented as a breeder in the state.

American White Pelicans have been mentioned in Illinois by ornithologists for at least a century. Robert Ridgway in "The ornithology of Illinois" wrote that the species passed through the state in April and late September through early October. H. David Bohlen in his 1989 book, "The Birds of Illinois" labeled the white pelican an occasional migrant in western Illinois and a rare migrant elsewhere in the state, rarely if ever seen in spring, sometimes in summer and most often in fall. The largest number of pelicans he mentions is 291 at the Mark Twain National Wildilfe Refuge in October 1985.

The numbers began to grow, and by the autumn of 1993, just a year after the Illinois Ornithological Society was founded, pelicans were spotted in flocks of 200, 300, and even 710 along the Mississippi River during fall. Twenty years of field notes in *Meadowlark* show the pelican's continual rise over the past two

decades. In 2007, observers reported 3,000 at Lake Chautauqua in August in Mason County, and 8,000 at Carlyle Lake in Clinton County in October. Sigurd and Richard Bjorklund tallied a record number of white pelicans for Illinois, 18,071, at Lake Chautauqua on 10 October 2009.

In his 1993 breeding season report written for Meadowlark, Vernon Kleen wrote, "Watch for this species to establish a nesting colony in Illinois." His prediction came true in 2009 when the American white pelican successfully raised young on an island on the Mississippi River at the Illinois/Iowa border. Six chicks were reported in Illinois on June 17, 2009, and 25 chicks were reported by July 15. White pelicans have also recently established breeding colonies in Wisconsin at Cat Island near Green Bay and at Horicon Marsh National Wildlife Refuge with 13-500 breeding pairs in two locations. A new breeding colony of white pelicans was also discovered in the early 1990s in south-central Minnesota.

Why are these birds changing their migratory patterns and beginning to breed in Wisconsin, Illinois and Minnesota? Some researchers have suggested that pelican populations have been increasing over their entire range and are now searching for more places to breed. But why have their numbers increased? Is it due to climate change - does the warming of the earth at least for now offer a benefit to these huge creatures? Have habitat changes created more ideal places for these birds to raise young?

This phenomenon is not yet understood, but one fact is for certain, the rise in populations of American White Pelicans in Illinois has been documented right here in the pages of *Meadowlark*. The information is readily available as ornithologists research the change in population status of this bird, and for that matter, all the other birds that have been mentioned in field notes and articles in this 20-year-old journal.

It's exciting to think about the trends that will occur in another 20 years, and that all of you who observe birds, write about them and send data to be published in *Meadowlark*, will contribute to knowledge about the state's aviafauna.

Two years ago, I enjoyed watching American White Pelicans—dozens of them—feeding and resting on the Chain O'Lakes in Lake County. I never would have guessed 20 years ago that I'd be standing near my home observing these "Florida" birds. What will we know in another 20 years about all the birds that call Illinois home?

# 3 Cooper's Hawk: from rare to abundant, a suburban success story?

Is there a connection? I think so, and I wonder if their newfound abundance (relatively speaking; apex predators in the food chain are rarely abundant) is another one of those unintended consequences of human behavior and human alteration of the natural landscape.

Various North American databases deliver a mixed message. The Raptor Population Index doesn't refine its data to the state level, but the data for central North America suggests a flat population trend, neither up nor down. Cornell's Feederwatch data on the percentage of winter feeder watch locations visited by Coops in Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Kentucky is constant until the late 1990s. After that a steady increase occurred. Specifically in Illinois, only 1 percent of feeders were haunted by Coops in the winter of 1991-92, the year that IOS began. That jumped to 8.5 percent 10 years later.

Those numbers represent wintering birds. What about the breeding population? Are there really a lot more breeding pairs here in Illinois today than there were 20 years ago? The Illinois Breeding Bird Atlas, conducted from 1986 -1991, showed breeding Cooper's Hawks in the collar counties around Chicago, Vermillion County on the Indiana border, Rock Island and Jo Daviess on the Mississippi River, Winnebago, LaSalle, Poe and Union Counties. Most of the rest of the state had none. More recently, as chronicled in "Illinois Birds: A Century of Change," main author Jeffrey Walk noted the presence of summering (presumably breeding) Cooper's Hawks in the northern, central and southern regions of Illinois during the 2000s.

Examining historical Spring Count data might make the picture a little

clearer. The Spring Bird Count has now been conducted in most all of Illinois counties for 38 consecutive years, beginning in 1975. In 1979, five years after the SBC began, only eight counties reported seeing Cooper's Hawks. From 1975 through 1988, only 17 Coops on average were seen per year. Right around 1990, sightings began to steadily increase, so that in 2011 an all-time high of 325 Coops were seen across the state. To avoid getting emails pointing out that more birders are counting today, I did check out Coops/party hour, and the same substantial increase in numbers is confirmed, though at a slightly lower rate than is suggested by the number of birds observed statewide.

Another intriguing question: Is there a geographic or landscape use effect tied to this increase? The answer to the first part of this question is no. The north, central and southern regions (as defined on the IOS website) all showed increases in numbers. In 2011, 63 percent of the state's counties reported Cooper's Hawks during the SBC. But was the growth in numbers greater in urban/suburban counties with higher populations (and more bird feeders) than in rural counties? The data on this question is inconclusive. Bigger urban/suburban counties show a somewhat higher number of By Robert Fisher

Coops per party hour than the very small rural counties over the last 10 years, perhaps due to a simple fact: Fewer eyes out in the field on count day decreases the likelihood of seeing a Coop flying through or just over the trees of their preferred habitat. And in heavily agricultural rural counties with limited woodlands, this woodland specialist may be largely absent.


So what does it all mean? Cooper's Hawks are clearly more abundant summer residents and breeders than they were 30 years ago. Are they higher in numbers in Illinois than during pre-European settlement times? Maybe. Are we the cause, by concentrating their prey around our feeders? Maybe. A reliable food source may increase winter survival of hatch-year birds. And they're certainly less likely to be shot as pests than they were 50 or more years ago.

There may be unintended adverse consequences to their population gains. Some evidence exists of predation of American Kestrel, a raptor species in decline in the eastern United States. Some also wonder whether our declining Red-headed Woodpeckers might be another easy target. It will be interesting to see the status of this bird in the next 20 years and how it might affect the status of other birds of Illinois.

Editor's Note: In addition to the reasons mentioned by Bob Fisher above regarding the rise in numbers of Cooper's Hawks in Illinois in the past 20 or 30 years, we must also consider the banning of DDT. When the bird was taken off the Illinois Endangered Species list in the late 1990s, the voting board said one reason the hawk was making a comeback was because DDT was banned in the 1970s. DDT interfered with how the predator's body produced calcium, causing egg shells to be very thin. The birds would sit on the eggs to incubate and the shells would break.

Grackle, European Starling, American Robin, House Sparrow, Ring-billed Gull, American Goldfinch, Brown-headed Cowbird, Blue Jay, Northern Cardinal, Mourning Dove, Canada Goose, American Crow, Chimney Swift, Eastern Meadowlark, Barn Swallow, Mallard, Song Sparrow, Rock Dove, and House Wren.

- Take County, Illinois, witnesses its first Blacknecked Stilt on 22 April 1992, as reported by David B. Johnson.
- A Violet-green Swallow visits the state 18 July 1991 as reported by Eric Walters.
- The state's first confirmed breeding Red-breasted Merganser is discovered on 4 August 1991 by Ralph Herbst.
- Tillinois birders complete the avian atlas and confirm the nesting success of 176 species, according to an article written by Peter Friederici. Mary Jane Easterday confirms the highest number—121—during the 10-year long breeding season study. Her proudest moment is when she confirms the nesting of Henslow's Sparrow after she sat for 20 hours in the 90-degree heat. "I got stung by seven bees while I was waiting," she said.
- The Rose-breasted Grosbeak is moving farther south during the breeding season, while the Blue Grosbeak is expanding northward, according to Robert Montgomery who helped compile the breeding bird atlas.
- The state's only colony of nesting Forster's Tern is discovered in June 1991 at the Chain O' Lakes State Park by Randy Heidorn. He writes that it far exceeds any other reported colony sizes in Illinois history.
- Red Crossbills are confirmed building a nest in an 80-year-old Austrian and Scotch pine plantation at Illinois Beach State Park on 7 April 1991, by Andrew Sigler.
- Thirty-five species of shorebirds have been seen at Rend Lake since Todd Fink and Judy DeNeal began birding there. Todd Fink has seen 25 shorebird species in one day in late summer at Rend Lake.





# Field Notes The 2011 spring migration

This spring featured the highest levels of April rainfall in recorded Illinois history, contributing to its being in the top 10% of wettest springs. Average temperatures were overall close to normal throughout the period, but large swings in temperature were frequent. In early February, snow and cold were felt over much of the state with a major snowstorm hitting the northeast portion. Harbors along Lake Michigan froze solid. The cold temperature persisted until to mid-February, when the weather warmed up significantly, for instance with temperatures reaching the upper 50's in Chicago on 18 Feb. The snow cover vanished, and ice retreated. At this time swans and geese were noted to be moving, with many reports during the week of 14 Feb. There were also some reports of Sandhill Cranes heading north at this time.

In the first week of March, many rivers and streams in Illinois were swollen by rain and snow melt and there was a lot of flooding; the Kankakee and Iroquois Rivers were at flood stage. Several subsequent pulses of warm weather peaked with temperatures way above normal on 21 Mar, reaching 80°F in Carbondale that day. A period of colder-than-normal weather settled in to close out March and welcome April, but temperatures soared again and were 25°F above normal statewide on 10 Apr, reaching 82°F in Carbondale, 85°F in Springfield, and 84°F in Rockford. Though the southern tier saw one more push of warm air during April, heavy rains also arrived. Near Carbondale, some 10" fell between 22 and 27 April, and the month closed out with 13.5" there. Water levels were high statewide, but especially in the southern regions, and many fields were inundated. On 2 May, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers breached a levee near the meeting of the Mississippi and Ohio Rivers, and the floodplains filled with water too deep for shorebirds to forage. Observers noted that shorebird numbers in many areas were well below the usual, and they attributed this to the high water levels. Richard Bjorklund referred to shorebird numbers at Chautauqua National Wildlife Refuge as "far below their historic norms." Black-necked Stilts were among the species reported in low numbers in southern Illinois, but they were also seen well north of their usual locations, reaching even to the top of state, perhaps in search of appropriate habitat given the flooded conditions in the south.

In the middle and northern tiers, the last part of April was colder than average, and the southern portion joined in during the first of May with temperature 10 to 14°F cooler than normal during the 3rd and 4th of the month. Though a warm front brought raised temperatures quite high during the 10th to 12th (they reached 91°F in Rockford), another cold period followed. Perhaps because of the chilly May temperatures, the migration appeared to several observers to be running late,

especially across the northern section. Paul Clyne commented that in Chicago's Jackson Park, the migration was weak and ended early, with few of the species that normally linger into June being observed in that month. Dan Williams noted from Rockford that the weather "held migration back in significant ways as compared to the prior 10 to 15 years." Arrival dates were much later in Rockford in comparison with Lake Michigan shoreline dates.

As is the case with every season, there were aspects that are significant in regard to numbers or timing of migration for individual species or groups of species. Some of this season's highlights are summarized below.

Black-bellied Whistling Ducks were reported for the fourth consecutive spring; perhaps the flooded conditions were conducive to this species making another appearance. Good numbers of Ross's Geese continue to be reported in spring, with the peak count of 70-80 being one of the highest on record (though well-eclipsed by last year's 1000-2000). High counts for American Wigeon this spring, as with the preceding four, remained significantly below the average for the last couple of decades. Reported numbers of American Black Duck and Mallard were also below normal. As is now expected, no Gray Partidges were noted.

The loon migration was strong this spring. The count of 492 Common Loons by Dave Johnson in Lake County was quite impressive; if you add his McHenry County sightings his total for the day reached 528. Also outstanding were the season totals - 42 - for Eared Grebes. Exceptional numbers of ibis, including reports of all three species, were present this spring. As with the whistling-ducks the wet conditions may have been a factor in their occurrence. Numbers of extralimital Mississippi Kites were simply incredible. Sightings came from all over the central and northern sections of the state. This year's peak count of American Golden-Plovers, some 13,300 seen 18 Apr in Jasper County, topped all counts since 1994. Piping Plovers, like last year, made a strong showing, with the passage of seven of them noted. Overall the large shorebirds had strong flights this spring, especially Willets and the two godwit species. Among the 14 species of gulls reported, the standout was the Ross's Gull photographed at Montrose. It overshadowed even the Black-legged Kittiwake and Little Gull reports. An early record arrival date of 19 Mar was set by the Caspian Tern noted in White County. Though Whitewinged Doves seem less unusual these days, the one found this spring was the earliest on record. The count of eight Blackbilled Cuckoos (21 May in Cook County's Plum Creek Forest Preserve) was exceptional.

The tally of 120 Eastern Kingbirds tied the spring record high count, and four was the best seasonal total for Scissortailed Flycatcher since 2001. Record-early arrivals were set for Red-eyed Vireo and Tennessee Warbler, both on 9 Apr; two American Redstarts seen 13 Apr tied the record arrival date. Record spring high counts of warblers set this year included 14 Orange-crowneds and 126 Yellows, both coming from the Spring Bird Count, and the 75 Blackpoll Warblers tallied during an IOS Spring Birding Weekend field trip provided the second highest spring total. The count of 514 White-crowned Sparrows in Jackson Park on the Spring Bird Count was the best spring tally in 11 years. Also notable was the number of Gambel's White-crowned Sparrows that were seen; there were at least nine reported.

This summary of the spring season would not be possible without the submission of sightings, field notes, and commentary by observers throughout the state. As the seasonal compiler, I extend my thanks and appreciation to those who sent reports directly to me, as these reports are especially helpful and include informative context. Sightings were also gleaned from the various birding list-serves in operation around the state, from the Illinois Birders Forum, and from submissions to eBird. Those who contributed sightings mentioned in this report are listed below. The observers for individual records are credited in the report by including their initials immediately following mention of the record. The order of the list is alphabetic in relation to the observers' initials. In some cases, the cited observer is an organization or institution. Abbreviations for these are listed separately.














